

This past year has been a time of struggle and uncertainty as we continue to face a world-wide pandemic compounded with an already uncertain economic outlook caused by the oil and gas industry crisis. We need to fully understand the impacts as we strive to develop a sustainable recovery plan.

Community Futures Yellowhead East along with our many community and regional partners, have completed a COVID-19 Impact To Businesses Survey, and submitted a SIP grant application for the development of local training hubs that will address business training and employment gaps by creating local training hubs that meet local industry needs.

The board has approved a \$100,000 Interest-Free Loan Program for Youth/Student Entrepreneurs and is finalizing a CFYE Regional Business Resiliency & Diversification Partnership Initiative Fund, that will provide funding partnership opportunities for municipalities and our regional businesses requiring support to remain sustainable. CFYE distributed \$2.2 million in RRRF loans on behalf of the federal government, in addition to our regular loan portfolio and continues to guide our regional businesses and member communities in a recovering but bright future.

CFYE was able to increase their staffing numbers to include a one-year term position, to assist the office through the COVID-19 pandemic. The position has been extended through the 2022 year.








CFYE Regional Relief & Recovery Fund Distribution






CFYE Phase II Regional Relief & Recovery Fund






CFYE Regional Relief & Recovery Top-Up Loans





CFYE RRRF Loans By Municipality







COVID-19 Status

Cases in Alberta

The province's COVID-19 numbers remained relatively stable. As of March 10, there were 4,488 active cases of COVID-19 in the province, 125 fewer than the previous week (representing a 2.7 per cent decrease) despite a spike in cases in the South Zone.




The table below shows the number of active cases for each zone for each of the last two weeks.

The average number of daily new cases also remained stable, with an average of 340 daily new cases for the seven-day period ending March 10, compared to 337 cases the previous week (Feb. 25 to March 3). The Calgary Zone had the largest number of new cases this week with 837, representing slightly more than a third of all new cases in the province. Over the same period, there were 1,181 new cases among individuals aged 20 to 49 years, representing half of all new cases.

Hospitalizations and ICU admissions

After nine weeks of declining hospitalizations, the total number of individuals being treated for COVID-19 in Alberta's hospitals climbed slightly. On March 10, there were 259 individuals in hospitals across the province compared to 256 on March 3, a 1.2 per cent increase. There were 38 individuals in ICUs on March 10 compared to 45 on March 3, a 15.6 per cent decrease.



The breakdown of hospitalizations by zone as of March 10 is as follows:


Other notable COVID-19-related information:

- As of March 10, a total of 137,137 cases of COVID-19 have been detected in Alberta and a total
 of 6,127 individuals have been hospitalized, which amounts to 4.5 individuals for every 100
 cases. In all, 130,716 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.
- As of March 10, 1,933 individuals have passed away from COVID-19, including 22 new deaths
 between March 4 and March 10. We extend our condolences to the families of these individuals,
 and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- From March 4 to March 10, 58,305 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 8,329 tests
 per day. During this period, the daily positivity ranged from 3.73 per cent to 4.60 per cent. As of
 March 10, a total of 3.5 million tests have been conducted and more than 1.84 million individuals
 have been tested.
- The R value, also known as the reproduction number, describes the ability of a disease to spread. It tells us the average number of people that someone with COVID-19 will infect. An R value of 1 means an infected person will infect one other person on average. Values below 1 mean transmission is decreasing; above 1, transmission is increasing. The province wide R value from March 1 to March 7 was 0.95.
- For the winter school term, as of March 10, AHS has confirmed 1,886 individuals with COVID-19
 were present at schools while infectious or acquired the disease in the school setting. A total of
 644 out of 2,415 schools in the province have reported an individual has attended their school
 while infectious or had in-school transmission.

Updates on variants of concerns

Alberta Health has reported 775 cases of COVID-19 variants of concern (VOC) as of March 10: 760 are B.1.1.7 variant (U.K. variant) and 15 are B.1.351 variant (South African variant). This represents a 34.6 per cent increase from one week earlier on March 3 when there were 576 VOC cases. VOCs have been detected in all zones, with the South Zone reporting its first cases this week.

The figure below shows new VOC cases by bar (grey bars) and the percentage of VOC cases identified compared to other cases of COVID-19 (blue line); between March 2 and March 8, the percentage of VOC cases ranged from 7.8 per cent to 15.2 per cent.



(Note: People are identified as COVID-19 cases prior to VOC identification. As such, VOC reporting is delayed compared to date the case was reported to Alberta Health.)

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

We continue to update the testing data for healthcare workers. These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of March 10:

- 77,967 employees (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 4,769 (or 6.1 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 2,123 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 519 (or 24.4 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 2,646 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.
- 5,015 physicians (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 201 (or 4.0 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 80 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 11 (or 13.8 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 121 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

COVID-19 Immunizations

COVID-19 Immunization Update

By the Numbers

As of 10 a.m. March 12, more than 313,300 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine have been administered by AHS, including:

- 97,300+ doses to Albertans 75 years of age and older.
- 85,400+ doses to healthcare workers other than LTC/DSL.
- 57,300+ doses to long-term care (LTC) and designated supportive living (DSL) residents.

- 54,000+ doses to LTC/DSL staff.
- 13,300+ doses in other congregate living environments.
- 4,500+ doses Covishield/AstraZeneca
- 1,200+ doses for others (including non-healthcare essential service workers and spouses of Albertans 75+)

Percentage of eligible individuals identified in Phase 1, have received at least one dose:

- Healthcare workers: 98 per cent.
- LTC/DSL staff: 81 per cent.
- LTC/DSL residents: 79 per cent.
- Albertans 75 years of age and older: 48 per cent.

In total, about 90,000 Albertans have received both Dose 1 and Dose 2, and more than 133,200 have received Dose 1 only.

Covishield/AstraZeneca Rollout

As of 1 p.m. March 14, more than 53,000 eligible Albertans have been booked to receive COVID-19 immunization with the Covishield/AstraZeneca vaccine.

Eligible Albertans, including healthcare workers, can choose to receive the Covishield/AstraZeneca vaccine now or wait until their sequenced phase to receive one of the mRNA vaccines (Pfizer or Moderna), which we anticipate will be sometime in May.

In general, Alberta Health is recommending Covishield/AstraZeneca vaccine for Albertans, 18 to 64 without a contraindication, such as a severe reaction to a vaccine ingredient.

Rollout of Phase 2A

<u>Phase 2A</u> of the COVID-19 vaccine program begins today, March 15. Phase 2A includes Albertans between the ages of 65 and 74, and First Nations, Inuit and Métis people ages 50 and older. More than 437,000 Albertans will be offered the vaccine in this upcoming phase.

To reduce wait times, avoid overwhelming the AHS booking tool, and vaccinate people as quickly as possible, AHS will be offering appointment bookings by age group. Immunizations will also be offered to the entire Phase 2A cohort through pharmacies across the province. Participating pharmacies are listed on the <u>Alberta Blue Cross</u> website.

Starting today (March 15) at 8 a.m., all Albertans born in 1947 will be eligible to book an appointment. These individuals can book through both the AHS online booking tool or through Health Link at 811 if they need help booking an appointment.

First Nations, Métis and Inuit people born in 1962 will also be eligible to book an appointment. Those living on reserve and on Métis Settlements who are aged 50 and older will have access to immunization within their communities. For both cohorts, more appointments will open by year of birth, adding one additional year at a time, as vaccine is available.

We recommend all healthcare workers who become eligible in Phase 2A due to age, or other eligibility criteria, get their vaccine as soon as possible.

Once someone becomes eligible, they remain eligible.

The faster individuals get vaccinated, the more quickly our communities will have protection against continued spread of the virus, and reduce the chances of hospitalization. Widespread vaccination will help all Albertans return to a more normal way of life, sooner.

We encourage everyone to review <u>current evidence</u> in order to make the best and most informed decision about your health, the health of your loved ones and the greater community. The Alberta Health Services and <u>Alberta Health</u> websites will continue to provide information to Albertans on the next eligible cohort as we expand one year at a time to include more Albertans.

Also watch for more information on the AHS Twitter account, @AHS_media, and our website, where the

latest information on the next eligible cohort will be released each afternoon in advance of the 8 a.m. launch the following day.

Second-Dose Spacing Clarification

As part of ongoing efforts to reduce community transmission of COVID-19, Alberta is offering second doses of the COVID-19 vaccine approximately 16 weeks after the first dose.

This aligns with the approach recommended by the <u>National Advisory Committee on Immunization</u> (NACI) and will allow as many Albertans as possible to receive at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine in the coming weeks.

All Albertans who have received a first dose or who booked a first-dose appointment prior to March 10 will have their second doses provided according to the previous timeline (within 42 days).

Current evidence suggests high vaccine effectiveness against symptomatic disease and hospitalization for several weeks after the first dose, including among older populations. Evidence also shows longer spacing between doses does not reduce protection or duration of immunity for multi-dose products.

While the vast majority of long-term care (LTC), designated supportive living (DSL) and licensed supportive living facility residents will have received one or both doses of COVID-19 vaccine prior to this change, residents of seniors congregate care receiving their first dose on or after March 10 will be offered their second doses at the 16-week interval in alignment with the new recommendations.

- The previous distinction in vaccine spacing recommendations for the LTC/DSL population is no longer recommended.
- Data from studies in healthcare workers, LTC residents, elderly populations and the general
 public show vaccine effectiveness is approximately 80 per cent after a single vaccine dose with
 sustained high levels of protection.
- Real-world vaccine effectiveness is typically lower than what you would see in clinical trials, which report 92 per cent protection from symptomatic disease two weeks after a single dose.

It remains important to have both doses of COVID-19 vaccine to ensure long-lasting protection. Immunization recommendations, including spacing, will continue to be assessed based on the most up-to-date information available.

Why is AHS' online booking tool not available to First Nations, Métis and Inuit people? Due to technical constraints, AHS' online booking tool cannot yet be configured to include a cohort of one birth year without allowing every Albertan born in that year access. This means if it was opened up to 1972 and 1973 birth years to allow First Nations, Metis and Inuit people to book an appointment for the AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine through the online AHS booking tool, we could not exclude non-Indigenous Albertans (who are not yet eligible).

We felt that it was important to offer immunization appointments to those eligible First Nations, Métis, & Inuit people born in 1972-73 as soon as possible, so rather than wait for a fix to the online tool, we worked with Health Link to provide them with an opportunity to book immediately. We realize this isn't ideal and we are working on a solution.

Influenza Immunization Update

As of March 6, 1.56 million doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta. Immunizations are up by more than 147,000 doses compared to the same time last year.

For the 18th week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta. Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) has tested 102,555 respiratory swabs for influenza from Aug. 23, 2020, to March 6, 2021. Click here for more information on influenza immunization clinics.

Devon General Hospital extends emergency department hours

Effective today, March 15, the Devon General Hospital (DGH) emergency department (ED) will further extend service as part of its phased reopening, accepting patients from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily.

The DGH ED reopened with limited phase one hours on Aug 18, 2020. It had been temporary closed on April 20, 2020 as part of Alberta Health Services' COVID-19 response. The closure was implemented to help protect long-term-care residents at the hospital, who are at heightened risk for severe illness if exposed to COVID-19.

To help protect these residents, a temporary barrier remains in place to allow ED patients to access services separate from inpatient areas of the hospital. As well, staff are designated to one area of the hospital and do not transition between the ED and inpatient units.

AHS will continue to monitor patient volumes and acuity regularly to determine when the hospital's ED can resume 24-hour service. Until then, local residents seeking after-hours emergency care are advised to visit the Leduc Community Hospital or the Westview Health Centre in Stony Plain.

New COVID-19 immunization site at Calgary Genesis Centre opens

Genesis Centre offers another option for eligible residents of northeast Calgary to receive their COVID-19 immunization, closer to home. The new immunization site at Genesis is one of two AHS-run sites, and eight participating pharmacies, providing COVID-19 vaccine to Calgarians in the northeast quadrant of the city. The site has 10 vaccination stations and has the ability to roll out approximately 60 vaccines per hour.

Genesis is one of 24 AHS immunization sites in the Calgary Zone. Currently, AHS has a total of 116 immunization sites across the province. With available vaccine supply, AHS is committed to immunizing 10,000 people across the province on average, per day. That amount will increase pending more vaccine supply.

Large-scale vaccination site to open in downtown Calgary

A large-scale, easily accessible COVID-19 vaccination site will open at the Calgary TELUS Convention Centre on April 5 through a partnership between Alberta Health Services, the City of Calgary and the convention centre. The convention centre's central location, as well as access to transit and parking, makes it an ideal site for a large-scale vaccination centre. The City of Calgary is providing free parking for those getting vaccinations at this location.

The addition of the TELUS Convention Centre will bring the total number of AHS immunization sites in the AHS Calgary Zone to 25. Once operational, the convention centre site will host approximately 100 vaccination stations with capacity to expand to 120 stations depending on vaccine availability. At 10 vaccination stations working to full capacity for eight hours, 500 Albertans could be vaccinated by appointment each day at this site.

The convention centre location will operate between eight and 16 hours, seven days a week, for those eligible and with pre-booked vaccination appointments. Hours of operation will be based on vaccine supply. Albertans can check their eligibility and book their appointment using AHS' online booking tool, available at www.ahs.ca/covidvaccine, or by calling Health Link at 811. Booking for this facility is expected to open later this month. As with all AHS COVID-19 vaccination sites, there are no drop-in appointments.

Currently, AHS has 117 immunization sites across the province. With available vaccine supply, AHS is committed to immunizing an average of 10,000 people daily across the province. That amount will increase pending more vaccine supply.

Mobile mammography service to visit Athabasca

Athabasca residents are invited to book appointments for a mobile mammography trailer that will be stationed at Athabasca Community Health Services on April 10, 12, 13 and 14. Residents can book an appointment or learn more about the program by calling 1-800-667-0604.

Free online nutrition classes for parents & caregivers

North Zone residents are invited to register for <u>free online nutrition classes</u> for parents and caregivers of infants and young children. Classes are being offered via Zoom. Led by North Zone Registered Dietitians, participants will have the opportunity to learn more about feeding infants and young children. <u>Registrations</u> are open for classes in March and April.

Screen Test mobile mammography to visit Boyle

A mobile mammography trailer will be stationed at the Boyle Health Care Centre (5004 Lakeview Road) on April 5-9. Appointments can be made for mammography services, cervical and colorectal cancer screening by calling Screen-Test at 1-800-667-0604.

Virtual Nursing Mentorship Network launches at AHS

COVID-19 has led us to reimagine the way we do many things at AHS, including how we offer opportunities for growth, collaboration and mentorship.

A virtual Nursing Mentorship Network has launched at AHS, offering nurses at any stage in their careers a safe space to connect, collaborate and join discussions about mentorship. Flags at AHS sites were lowered to half-mast from sunrise to sunset on March 11 to acknowledge the National Day of Observance for COVID-19. The Government of Canada has designated March 11 as a National Day of Observance to commemorate those who lost their lives and the significant impacts we have all felt because of COVID-19. More than 1,900 Albertans and 22,000 Canadians have died from COVID-19. We remember all those who have lost their lives and we extend our deepest condolences to the loved ones of these individuals.

Participants Sought for Vaccine Safety Survey

The Canadian National Vaccine Safety (CANVAS) Network is seeking participants to participate in a webbased survey to track any potential adverse reactions to COVID-19 vaccines. To assess events that are related to the vaccines, the network is looking for both persons who have been immunized as well as persons who have not been immunized to be in a control group.

Investigators across Canada, including here in Alberta, are working to monitor the safety of COVID-19 vaccines in large numbers of people in real time.

Participants can join the monitoring program in multiple ways, including through the CANVAS website, through the online booking tool, or where they are immunized. Participants will be asked to complete online surveys eight days after they receive the first COVID-19 vaccine, another eight days after the second dose — if they receive a two-dose vaccine — and then a final survey six months after that

Unimmunized control participants will complete the same survey either one or three times. The CANVAS Network conducts active safety surveillance for pandemic vaccines (e.g., H1N1 influenza vaccine in 2009), seasonal influenza vaccines (2010-2020) and other new vaccines (e.g., meningococcal B vaccine in Quebec in 2014) to inform Canadians about their safety.



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COVID-19 Status

Cases in Alberta

The average number of daily new cases increased the week of March 11 to March 17 for Alberta as a whole, with 436 cases for the seven-day period ending on March 17, compared to 338 cases the previous week (March 3 to 10).


From March 11 to 17, there were 1,552 cases among individuals aged 20 to 49 years, which is about 51 per cent of new cases during that time period. However, cases continue to occur in every age group. For instance, this week, 637 new cases were reported among school aged children (5 to 19 years) and 355 new cases were reported among older adults (aged 60 years and older).

As of March 17, there were 5,084 active cases, which is 596 more active cases than the previous week. With the exception of the North Zone, all zones saw increases in their active case counts this week. The South Zone had a particularly large spike in active cases this week, up 47.7 per cent from the previous period. The Calgary Zone had the largest number of new cases this week at 1,231, which is 40.4 per cent of all new cases in the province, with an average of 176 new cases per day.

The full breakdown of the number of active cases by zone comparing Mar. 17 to the week previous is below:


The total number of individuals being treated for COVID-19 in Alberta's hospitals was relatively stable again this week, though the number of individuals in intensive care units (ICUs) increased slightly. On March 17, there were 264 individuals in hospitals across the province, compared to 260 hospitalizations on March 10. There were 43 individuals in ICUs on March 17 compared to 37 in ICUs on March 10, a 16.2 per cent increase.



Hospitalizations and ICU admissions

The breakdown of hospitalizations by Zone as of March 17 is as follows:

- 90 hospitalizations with 15 of those in ICUs in the Calgary Zone
- 87 hospitalizations with 11 of those in ICUs in the Edmonton Zone
- 30 hospitalizations with 6 of those in ICUs in the Central Zone
- 30 hospitalizations with 4 of those in ICUs in the North Zone
- 27 hospitalizations with 7 of those in ICUs in the South Zone




Other notable COVID-19-related information:

- As of Mar. 17, a total of 140,127 cases of COVID-19 have been detected in Alberta and a total of 6,272 individuals have ever been hospitalized, which amounts to 4.5 individuals for every 100 cases. In all, 133,086 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.
- As of Mar. 17, 1,957 individuals have passed away from COVID-19, including 24 deaths over the
 past seven days (Mar. 11 to Mar. 17). We extend our condolences to the families of these
 individuals, and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- From Mar. 11 to Mar. 17, 61,557 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 8,794 tests per day. During this period, the daily positivity ranged from 4.57 per cent to 5.95 per cent. As of Mar. 17, a total of 3,564,100 tests have been conducted and 1,863,885 individuals have ever been tested.
- The R value, also known as the reproduction number, describes the ability of a disease to spread. It tells us the average number of people someone with COVID-19 will infect. An R value of 1 means an infected person will infect one other person on average. Values below 1 mean transmission is decreasing; above 1, transmission is increasing. The province-wide R value from Mar. 8 to Mar. 14 was 1.07, whereas R value the previous week was 0.95.
- For the winter school term, as of Mar. 17, AHS has confirmed 2,183 individuals with COVID-19 were present at schools while infectious, or acquired the disease in the school setting. A total of 691 out of 2,415 schools in the province have reported that an individual has attended their school while infectious, or had in-school transmission.

Updates on variants of concerns

Alberta Health has now reported 1,188 cases of COVID-19 variants of concern (VOC): 1,169 are B.1.1.7 variant (U.K. variant), 17 are B.1.351 variant (South African variant) and two are P.1 (Brazilian variant). The Brazilian variant was identified for the first time in Alberta this week. As of Mar. 17, there were 599 (11.8 per cent of total) active VOC cases.

The figure below shows new VOC cases by bar (grey bars) and the percentage of VOC cases identified compared to other cases of COVID-19 (blue line). Between March 9 and March 15, the percentage of VOC cases ranged from 12.0 to 17.8 per cent.



(Note: People are identified as COVID-19 cases prior to VOC identification. As such, VOC reporting is delayed compared to date the case was reported. Changes in case counts can occur due to the nature of the screening and sequencing process.)

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

We continue to update the testing data for healthcare workers. These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of March 17:

- 78,264 employees (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 4,826 (or 6.17 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 2,469 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 557 (or 22.6 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 2,357 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.
- 5,015 physicians (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 201 (or 4.01 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 104 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 11 (or 10.6 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 97 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

COVID-19 Immunization Update

By the Numbers

As of 10 a.m. March 19, more than 381,000 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine have been administered by AHS, including:

- 122,500+ doses to Albertans 75 years of age and older living in the community
- 86,700+ doses to healthcare workers (excluding LTC/DSL)
- 57,800+ doses to long-term care (LTC) and designated supportive living (DSL) residents
- 54,700+ doses to LTC/DSL staff
- 42,100+ doses Covishield/AstraZeneca
- 13,600+ doses in other congregate living environments
- 3,600+ doses for others

Percentage of eligible individuals identified in Phase 1, who have received at least one dose:

- Healthcare workers: 100 per cent
- LTC/DSL staff: 82 per cent
- LTC/DSL residents: 79 per cent

In total, more than 199,500 Albertans have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine and more than 90,800 have received both Dose 1 and Dose 2.

Update on Rollout of Phase 2A

Phase 2A of the COVID-19 immunization program began March 15.

Albertans eligible to book through the AHS online immunization booking tool or through Health Link 811 include Albertans born in 1956 or earlier and First Nations, Métis and Inuit people born in 1971 or earlier. Immunizations are also being offered to these same Phase 2A groups through participating pharmacies across the province.

We encourage all Albertans to get their vaccine as soon as they are eligible.

Phase 2B and 2C, Expected to Begin in April

We expect to begin Phase 2B and 2C in April, once vaccinations in Phase 2A are complete.

Please note, appointment bookings are not yet available for either of these groups.

Exact timing will depend on vaccine supply and will be announced closer to the start of each phase.

We are very hopeful that vaccine supply will increase in the next month or two and we can move quickly into these next phases. We continue to target the month of June to complete first doses for all Albertans who wish to have the vaccine. We thank you for your enthusiasm to get immunized and for your patience as we continue the rollout.

Phase 2B eligibility

In Phase 2B, vaccine will be available to Albertans with underlying conditions as they are most at risk of severe outcomes. You can refer to this list for a detailed clinical breakdown of these conditions and who is eligible.

Underlying conditions included in Phase 2B were chosen by Alberta Health as they are associated with a higher risk of death or hospitalization for those under the age of 64. Alberta will operate on the honour system, and a doctor's note or other proof of an underlying condition will not be required.

Phase 2C eligibility

The following groups will be eligible to receive the vaccine in Phase 2C:

- Healthcare workers working in patient care facilities or providing direct patient care in the community, in order to limit spread to high-risk individuals, including: physicians, nurses, pharmacists, dentists and all other regulated health care professionals and their office or support staff. This includes:
 - AHS, Covenant, Alberta Precision Labs and DynaLife staff who work in patient care facilities or provide services directly to clients in the community
 - Healthcare workers on First Nation reserves
 - Students undertaking their placement practicums in clinical areas

- Residents and support staff at eligible congregate living and work settings at risk for large outbreaks, including: correctional facilities, homeless shelters, group homes including disability, mental health and other types of licensed supportive living.
- Caregivers of Albertans who are most at risk of severe outcomes.

Community Physicians to Administer Vaccine Soon

On March 16, the <u>Government of Alberta announced</u>, in partnership with the Alberta Medical Association (AMA), that community physicians will soon begin administering COVID-19 vaccines. This announcement follows the release of an <u>Expression of Interest (EOI) from AMA</u>, requesting community physicians and their partners express interest in participating in the Alberta effort to deliver COVID-19 vaccinations. This EOI resulted in over 500 responses from Alberta physicians.

The Government of Alberta will post more details on alberta.ca about this opportunity in the coming days.

New Study confirms rare fungal infection now calls Alberta home

A new study led by Alberta Precision Laboratories researchers, in partnership with the University of Alberta, has confirmed that histoplasmosis – a rare fungal infection transmitted through bat and bird droppings – is now found in Alberta. The study extends the known range of the disease much further northwest from its traditional home in the central United States and parts of southern Ontario and Quebec. Dr. Dingle said that the researchers used epidemiologic data and genetic analysis to determine that 15 out of the 45 confirmed cases of histoplasmosis in Alberta between 2011 and 2018 were locally-acquired. The cases were primarily found in rural areas in central Alberta including Sundre, Stettler and county, Stony Plain and Spruce Grove.

Previously, the geographic range of the fungus was not thought to expand further northwest than Minnesota, some 2,000 km away. Dr. Dingle explained that the number of cases of histoplasmosis remains stable, with a handful of new cases diagnosed each year. The fungus can be present in contaminated dust particles, and when inhaled, patients experience respiratory infections with flu-like symptoms, including cough, fever, chills and headache. Cases are typically related to individuals who have come in contact with bat or bird droppings in old homes, churches, construction sites and parks.

Online prenatal class offers support to new parents in Central Zone

Central Zone residents who are pregnant or trying to become pregnant to a free online prenatal class called *Growing Your Baby: What to Eat During Pregnancy* on March 23, 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. During the 90-minute class led by registered dietitians, participants will learn about meal and snack ideas, nutrients they need in pregnancy, safe foods to eat during pregnancy and more. AHS dietitians will be available to answer questions, provide resources and handouts.

Participants can register on the <u>Central Zone Eventbrite Page</u>. You will receive an email with a Zoom link two days before the workshop and a reminder email two hours before the workshop.

Mobile mammography service to visit Okotoks, Evansburg and Peace RiverWomen ages 50 to 74 - the group most at risk of developing breast cancer - will have local access to mammography services this month when Alberta Health Services' Screen Test program visits Okotoks, Evansburg and Peace River.

A mammogram is an X-ray of the breast and has proven to be the most effective way to detect breast cancer. Early detection allows for a greater number of options for treatment and a better chance of survival. Due to COVID-19, Screen Test is taking a number of precautions to ensure the safety of our clients and staff. Details will be shared when you call to book your appointment.

A mobile mammography trailer will be stationed at:

- Okotoks Recreation Centre (99 Okotoks Drive), March 30, 31 and April 1.
- Evansburg Baptist Church (4804 48 Avenue), March 30, 31 and April 1, 2021.
- Peace River Community Health Centre (10101 68 Street, behind the hospital in the staff parking/service entrance area), April 15-17 and April 19-20.

Influenza Immunization Update

As of Mar. 13, 2021, 1,565,155 doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta. Immunizations are up by more than 150,000 compared to the same time last year.

For the 19th week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta. Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) have tested 105,443 respiratory swabs for influenza from Aug. 23, 2020 to Mar. 13, 2021. We continue to make exceptional progress this season. Let's continue to protect each other from this vaccine-preventable illness and reduce the strain on our healthcare system.



Participants Sough for Vaccine Safety Survey

The Canadian National Vaccine Safety (CANVAS) Network is seeking participants to participate in a web-based survey to track any potential adverse reactions to COVID-19 vaccines. To assess events that are related to the vaccines, the network is looking for both persons who have been immunized as well as persons who have not been immunized to be in a control group.

Investigators across Canada, including here in Alberta, are working to monitor the safety of COVID-19 vaccines in large numbers of people in real time.

Participants can join the monitoring program in multiple ways, including through the CANVAS website, through the online booking tool, or where they are immunized. Participants will be asked to complete online surveys eight days after they receive the first COVID-19 vaccine, another eight days after the

second dose - if they receive a two-dose vaccine - and then a final survey six months after that.

Unimmunized control participants will complete the same survey either one or three times. The CANVAS Network conducts active safety surveillance for pandemic vaccines (e.g., H1N1 influenza vaccine in 2009), seasonal influenza vaccines (2010-2020) and other new vaccines (e.g., meningococcal B vaccine in Quebec in 2014) to inform Canadians about their safety.

COVID-19 Status


Cases in Alberta

This past week Alberta experienced a sharp spike in COVID-19 cases across the province, including a 57.2 per cent week-to-week increase in active cases in the Calgary Zone.

As of March 24, there were 6,835 active cases in the province, 1,751 more than the previous week, a 34.4 per cent increase. For the 11th consecutive week, the Calgary Zone had the most active cases, with 3,099, although active cases were up in the other four zones, as you can see in the table below.



For the seven-day period ending March 24, the number of average new COVID-19 cases rose to 597, compared to 434 the previous week, a 37.5 per cent increase. While all zones reported increases in their average new cases this week, the Calgary Zone had a particularly large spike, reporting 1,970 new cases (an average of 281 per day) this week compared to 1,223 new cases (an average of 175 per day) the previous week, a 61 per cent increase. Provincewide, individuals ages 20 to 49 represented about half of all new cases.



Hospitalizations and ICU admissions

Hospitalizations and ICU admissions also climbed this week, the latter significantly. On March 24, there were 55 individuals in ICU with COVID-19, compared to 40 on March 17, a 37.5 per cent increase. A total of 239 individuals were in non-ICU hospital beds on March 24 compared to 235 individuals in non-ICU hospital beds on March 17, a 1.7 per cent increase.



The breakdown of hospitalizations by zone as of March 24 is as follows:


Other notable COVID-19-related information:

- As of March 24, a total of 144,311 cases of COVID-19 have been detected in Alberta and a total
 of 6,418 individuals have been hospitalized, which amounts to 4.4 individuals for every 100
 cases. In all, 135,500 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.
- As of March 24, 1,976 individuals have passed away from COVID-19, including 19 deaths over the past seven days (March 18 to March 24). We extend our condolences to the families of these individuals, and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- From March 18 to March 24, 75,112 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 10,730 tests
 per day. During this period, the daily positivity ranged from 4.85 per cent to 6.71 per cent. As of
 March 24, a total of 3.6 million tests have been conducted and 1.9 million individuals have been
 tested.
- The R value, also known as the reproduction number, describes the ability of a disease to spread. It tells us the average number of people that someone with COVID-19 will infect. An R value of 1 means an infected person will infect one other person on average. Values below 1 mean transmission is decreasing; above 1, transmission is increasing. The provincewide R value from March 15 to March 21 was 1.14, compared to 1.07 the previous week.

Updates on variants of concerns

Alberta Health has now reported 2,301 cases of COVID-19 variants of concern (VOC): 2,276 are B.1.1.7 variant (U.K. variant), 20 are B.1.351 variant (South African variant) and five are P.1 (Brazilian variant). Of all these VOC cases, 1,400 are active (20.5 per cent of total active COVID-19 cases), 881 people have recovered and 20 people have died.

The figure below shows new VOC cases (grey bars) and the percentage of VOC cases identified compared to other cases of COVID-19 (blue line). Between March 16 and March 22, the percentage of VOC cases ranged from 21.8 per cent to 37.2 per cent.



(Note: People are identified as COVID-19 cases prior to VOC identification. As such, VOC reporting is delayed compared to date the case was reported. Changes in case counts can occur due to the nature of the screening and sequencing process.)

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

We continue to update the testing data for healthcare workers in the AHS Healthcare Worker COVID-19 Testing dashboard. These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of

positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of March 24:

- 78,745 employees (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 4,917 (or 6.2 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 2,640 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 592 (or 22.4 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 2,277 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.
- 5,070 physicians (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 204 (or 4.0 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 106 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 11 (or 10.4 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 98 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

COVID-19 Immunizations

COVID-19 Immunization Update COVID-19 Immunization Milestone

On March 25, more than 20,000 doses of COVID-19 vaccine were administered at more than 120 AHS immunization sites across Alberta.

We have hit another major milestone and another all-time high in AHS' COVID-19 immunization campaign.

From our front-line immunizers to the Public Health, Logistics, IT and Communications teams involved in the online booking tool development, and everyone who made this possible, thank you for your hard work and preparation that has culminated in this outstanding achievement. The level of co-operation and coordination you have displayed is truly outstanding. This is more than 20,000 lives changed for the better.



Doses of COVID-19 Vaccine in a Single Day (March 25)

We will continue to work towards our goal to complete first doses for all Albertans who wish to have the vaccine by June, as vaccine supply allows.

Thank you again for sharing your skills, knowledge and expertise. We appreciate and value all the work you have done and continue to do.

By the Numbers

As of 10 a.m. March 26, more than 451,600 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine had been administered by AHS. More than 267,200 Albertans have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine and more than 92,100 have received both Dose 1 and Dose 2.

Update on Rollout of Phase 2A

As of 10 a.m. today (March 26), AHS has booked 110,629 COVID-19 immunization appointments for eligible Albertans in Phase 2A. More than 50,100 Albertans received their COVID-19 immunization at AHS sites last week alone. Together with the pharmacy program in the province, we are hoping to complete Phase 2A by this week.

Albertans eligible to book through AHS online immunization booking tool or through Health Link 811 include Albertans born in 1956 or earlier and First Nations, Métis and Inuit people born in 1971 or earlier. Immunizations are also being offered to the entire Phase 2A cohort through participating pharmacies across the province.

We encourage all healthcare workers who become eligible in Phase 2A due to age or other eligibility criteria to get their vaccine as soon as possible.

We expect in early April to begin Phase 2B, which will target Albertans with <u>underlying health conditions</u>. Phase 2C is anticipated to begin later in April. Exact timing will depend on vaccine supply and will be announced closer to the start of each phase. *Please note: appointment bookings are not yet available for either Phase 2B or 2C.*

We understand there are many people anxiously waiting to receive the COVID-19 vaccine and many staff have questions about the eligibility criteria for healthcare workers in Phase 2C, which was announced by Alberta Health last week.

Update to rollout of Phase 2B

As announced by Alberta Health earlier today, the next group of eligible Albertans will be able to start booking COVID-19 immunizations through participating pharmacies on March 30 as part of phase 2B. By the end of phase 2B, all Albertans born in 2005 or earlier (ages 16 and up) with any one of a list of eligible underlying health conditions will have the opportunity to receive the vaccine.

Health conditions included in phase 2B

In phase 2B, Albertans born in 2005 or earlier (ages 16 and up) with the following underlying conditions are included in this phase:

- A missing spleen or a spleen that is no longer working
- Cancer
- Chronic heart disease and vascular disease
- Chronic kidney diseases requiring regular medical monitoring or treatment
- Chronic liver disease due to any cause
- Chronic neurological disease
- Chronic respiratory (lung) diseases
- · Diabetes requiring insulin or other anti-diabetic medication to control
- A weakened immune response due to disease or treatment
- Anyone is who is currently pregnant
- Severe mental Illness or substance use disorder requiring a hospital stay during the past year
- Severe obesity which includes a Body Mass Index (BMI) or 40kg/m2 or more
- Severe or profound learning disabilities or severe developmental delay
- Solid organ, bone marrow or stem cell transplant recipients

A full list of associated underlying health conditions is available at alberta.ca/covid.

The conditions included in phase 2B were recommended by the Alberta Advisory Committee on Immunization and were chosen by Alberta Health as they are associated with a higher risk of death or hospitalization.

Phase 2B is the largest eligible group to date and includes an estimated 945,000 eligible people. We anticipate calls to Health Link to increase with this cohort and have ensured staffing is on hand to assist all Albertans seeking advice.

Commitment to Comfort Resources for COVID-19 Immunization

Commitment to Comfort (CTC) is an evidence-based quality improvement initiative, which was initially developed at the Alberta Children's Hospital in 2014 and has now been expanded to support adult populations. The initiative aims to reduce pain and distress with any needle or medical procedure to improve comfort and overall client experience.

Up to a quarter of adults have needle fears and 10 per cent of those adults have such significant fear that they avoid immunization. CTC has five simple core principles, which are derived from research and current clinical practice guidelines and supported by internationally renowned experts in vaccine pain and fear management.

The CTC team within the AHS COVID-19 Vaccine Task Force has expanded these principles and strategies to adult populations for the COVID-19 immunization program in Alberta. These principles have also been integrated into AHS' provincial COVID-19 immunization policy.

Several resources have been developed for immunizers and clients and are available on the <u>COVID-19</u> Resources Table for AHS Staff & Health Professionals. We encourage teams to embed these resources into their work.

Booking through a participating pharmacy begins March 30

Pharmacies across Alberta are offering immunizations to all Albertans born in or before 1963 with underlying health conditions. Eligible individuals wanting to book their appointment through a participating pharmacy can book directly through the pharmacy of their choice, which can be found on the Alberta Blue Cross website: COVID-19 Immunization Program | Alberta Blue Cross

Additional pharmacies will offer bookings starting the week of April 5, as more doses arrive. Albertans are asked to not call pharmacies that are not on the Alberta Blue Cross list, as they will not have any appointments available. Please only call pharmacies if you are eligible to book an appointment.

Booking through Alberta Health Services begins April 5

AHS is offering appointments in a staged approach and will start with those born in or before 1959 with underlying health conditions. All eligible Albertans wanting to book their appointment through AHS can do so through the online booking tool or by calling Health Link at 811.

Additional birth years in phase 2B will become eligible as more vaccine arrives.

During this phase of the vaccine roll out, Alberta will operate on the honour system. A doctor's note or other proof of an underlying condition is not required. Individuals who are pregnant, immunocompromised or with an autoimmune disorder are encouraged to consult their healthcare provider prior to booking their appointment if they have any questions.

Updates to online booking tool

In conjunction with the launch of phase 2B, AHS has made enhancements to the online booking tool to allow other eligible family members to book vaccines at the same time.

Starting on April 5, the tool will provide options for eligible Albertans to book appointments at the same time, and at the same clinic for up to three additional family members. Family members will need to indicate eligibility as well as demographic information when booking their vaccine appointment.

Things You Need to Know

Verna's Weekly Video Message - Rapid Flow-Through Clinics Contingency PlanningSince the provincial COVID-19 immunization program began in December, we have been following a phased immunization approach, aligned with anticipated vaccine supply.

As we have seen in the past, we have to be ready to adapt our approach in case the vaccine supply changes. That includes earlier this year, when we had to re-book second-dose appointments due to a vaccine shortage.

However, it's just as important to be prepared to manage unexpected surges of vaccines coming into Alberta, and be able to administer immunizations as quickly as possible.

That's why we have been developing a contingency plan that would be activated at the direction of Alberta Health, should we see a vaccine surge. This plan revolves around the mobilization of rapid flow-through clinics.

Influenza Immunization Update

As of March 20, 1.6 million doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta. Immunizations are up by more than 193,800 compared to the same time last year. For the 20th week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta.

Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) has tested 107,820 respiratory swabs for influenza from Aug. 23, 2020, to March 20, 2021.

\$33M Investment to Reduce CT, MRI Wait Times

Today Alberta Health and AHS announced a \$33-million investment to improve access to CT and MRI diagnostic imaging healthcare services.

AHS has developed a three-year action plan to reduce wait times, and we will now take immediate steps to implement it, ensuring Albertans have more timely access to CT and MRI services.

The CT and MRI Implementation Plan will minimize wait times, decrease costs and better manage demand by using data to more accurately estimate where demand pressures may occur. This will allow us to allocate resources where they are most needed by reinvesting savings created by cost containment, clinical appropriateness and efficiencies back into diagnostic imaging.

The \$33-million commitment for Year 1 of the three-year plan will enable AHS to perform 50,000 additional CT scans in 2021/22 and 45,000 additional MR scans in 2021/22 throughout the province.

New EMS Station Announced for Slave Lake

A new Emergency Medical Services station for Slave Lake will allow for more efficient deployment of resources in life-and-death emergency situations. More than \$4.7 million will be spent on the new facility at the Slave Lake Healthcare Centre through the Rural Health Facilities Revitalization Program (RHFRP). Work on the new EMS station is expected to begin in the coming months and more detailed timelines will

be shared once the project is underway.

In the last few years, more than \$1.2 million has also been spent at the Slave Lake Healthcare Centre on Infrastructure Maintenance Program (IMP) projects including the replacement of the acute care reception desk and upgrades to the security system. Currently almost \$2 million is being spent on IMP projects at the healthcare centre including the replacement of the chiller and fire alarm system. Both projects are currently in the design phase and anticipated to be complete by early summer.

Fort Saskatchewan Community Hospital resumes labour and delivery services

The Fort Saskatchewan Community Hospital's Women's Health Program has restored obstetrical services for patients who are not COVID-19 positive or COVID-19 presumptive. All appropriate infection prevention and control measures have been implemented to ensure safe patient care as the FSCH labour and delivery unit. Midwives and physicians with privileges at the FSCH will work with their patients to screen for COVID-19 prior to delivery and ensure the patient is directed to the appropriate hospital. For the duration of the pandemic response, COVID-19 positive and COVID-19 presumptive positive patients will be referred or transferred to an alternative labour and delivery site in the Edmonton Zone, if delivery is not imminent.

Consort Emergency Department re-opens

Alberta Health Services (AHS) will be reopening the Emergency Department (ED) at the Consort Hospital and Care Centre today, March 29, 2021. Admission to the community support beds at the facility have also resumed. Patients not requiring emergency care will continue to be directed to contact a physician's clinic to book an appointment.

The Consort ED was temporarily closed last spring as part of AHS' response to anticipated demands for acute care and ED spaces due to COVID-19. These changes not only helped create acute care capacity at other sites who have been able to transfer patients to Consort, but further reduced the risk of potential illness spread between patient populations by creating a single patient group at the site. Not having COVID-19 positive patients under the same roof as continuing care residents has limited exposure and potential illness spread to seniors, who remain most vulnerable to COVID-19.

Alberta Health Services continues to closely monitor the pandemic situation and remains ready to enact temporary changes again if necessary to protect patients, residents and communities. As COVID-19 immunization continues to roll out across the province, it is important to remember that vaccination is just one of the many ways to prevent the spread of COVID-19. All Albertans must remain diligent in following all public health guidelines.

AHS Screen Test to visit Nanton and Claresholm in April

A mobile mammography trailer will be stationed at the Nanton Baptist Church (2410, 26 Avenue), from April 5 through April 9 and the Claresholm Aquatic Centre (212 Fairway Drive West), on April 10, 12-17, 19 and 20.

Screen Test is improving access to cancer screening for hundreds of women in Alberta communities where mammography is not readily available. Cervical and colorectal cancer screening project joins mobile mammography program in Grimshaw



The next group of eligible Albertans were able to start booking COVID-19 immunizations through AHS starting today, April 5, at 8 a.m. as part of Phase 2B.This phase includes Albertans who are 16-64 years of age with any one of a list of eligible chronic conditions. A full list of associated underlying health conditions is available at alberta.ca/covid.

AHS is offering appointments in a staged approach and will start with those born in or before 1963. All eligible Albertans wanting to book their appointment through AHS can do so through the <u>online booking tool</u> or by calling Health Link at 811. AHS will continue to expand eligibility to include additional birth years in the days to come.

Pharmacies across Alberta will continue to offer immunizations to all Albertans born in or before 1963 with underlying health conditions. Eligible individuals can book their appointment through a <u>participating pharmacy</u>.

During this phase of the vaccine rollout, Alberta will operate on the honour system. A doctor's note or other proof of an underlying condition is not required. Individuals who are pregnant, immunocompromised or with an autoimmune disorder are encouraged to consult their healthcare provider prior to booking their appointment if they have any questions.

Family booking starts today, April 5

In conjunction with the launch of Phase 2B, AHS has made enhancements to the online booking tool to allow other eligible family members to book vaccines at the same time. Starting today, April 5, the tool will provide options for eligible Albertans to book appointments at the same time and at the same clinic for up to three additional family members.

COVID-19 vaccine for homebound Albertans

On March 29, AHS began immunizing eligible homebound Albertans. Homebound individuals are physically unable to leave their home, such as for medical and personal appointments. This population is considered vulnerable and requires immunization to be provided in their homes.

Similar to how the annual influenza vaccine is provided to homebound individuals, the COVID-19 vaccine is administered by AHS public health or home care staff, depending on the zone. Eligible home care clients will be contacted directly by AHS to arrange immunization.

Albertans who think they may be eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine at home but are not a home care client are encouraged to contact Health Link at 811. Health Link staff will do an initial screening to check eligibility. The zone teams will then follow up to do a second eligibility check and book their COVID-19 immunization if appropriate.

Only homebound individuals are eligible to be immunized through this program at this time. This will ensure homebound individuals are immunized as quickly as possible, with the resources and vaccine supply available. For more information, see lmmunization-Booking-Your Appointment.

Thank you

Thank you to all eligible Albertans who have received their COVID-19 vaccines or booked their immunization appointment. We will continue to work to ensure all adult Albertans who want a vaccine will get their first dose by the end of June. Outbreak Control Strategy Introduced

As part of a province wide strategy to manage acute care outbreaks, AHS will now offer COVID-19 immunization to healthcare workers when there are two or more concurrent variant of concern (VOC) outbreaks on-site.

As such, and in support of the ongoing outbreaks at the Grey Nuns Community Hospital, as well as at the Royal Alexandra Hospital, involving VOCs on two units, all on-site staff, physicians, residents, students currently doing their clinical placement and contracted service providers are being offered immunization over the coming days.

We are currently working with Alberta Health on future sequencing as quickly and safely as possible. For the full list of phases, please visit the Government of Alberta's website.

Immunization of all healthcare workers — including students who work in acute care facilities — are part of Phase 2C, which is expected to begin later in April.

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Verna's Weekly Video Message - Cancer Awareness During COVID-19


We know many people have not been seeking care for serious health concerns since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. In Alberta, there has been a steady decrease in the number of new cancers being diagnosed and this trend is happening across Canada and the world.

In response, AHS launched a province wide public health cancer awareness campaign last winter to remind Albertans to listen to their bodies and book an appointment to see their family physician, even during a pandemic. The healthcare system in Alberta has been and continues to be available to help screen for, diagnose and manage cancer, with steps being taken to ensure we can do so safely.

Dr. Douglas Stewart, Physician of Internal Medicine, Medical Oncology; Provincial Medical Director of the Cancer Strategic Clinical Network; and campaign lead joins me (Verna) to talk about the campaign and why it's so important to respond appropriately to any issues people may experience with their health or body, and to stay up to date with routine cancer screening.

Doug shares what trends we are seeing in cancer diagnosis during the pandemic, what important symptoms to look for and when to seek medical help, and how the campaign is helping spread awareness to all Albertans.

Influenza Immunization Update

As of March 27, 1.6 million doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta. Immunizations are up by more than 191,600 compared to the same time last year.

For the 21st week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta.

Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) has tested 110,426 respiratory swabs for influenza from Aug. 23, 2020, to March 27, 2021.

Please note: the 2020-2021 Alberta Influenza Immunization program has ended for the general public. March 31 was the last day for members of the general public to receive influenza immunization. Eligible

children under the age of nine, who have received one dose of the influenza vaccine prior to March 31, will be offered their second dose until April 30.

Supporting Our Healthcare Teams - Physician Assistant Regulation

The <u>Government of Alberta announced</u> that, as of April 1, physician assistants academically skilled professionals who function as physician extenders became a fully regulated health professional in Alberta.

Physician assistants work under the supervision of a physician or group of physicians within a team, and their scope of practice is negotiated by the relationship with the physician(s) and the care setting. Physician assistants collaborate and work alongside physicians, nurse practitioners, registered nurses and licensed practical nurses, blending their individual skills and knowledge to provide optimum patient care.

Mobile mammography service to visit Westlock

Women ages 50-74 - the group most at risk of developing breast cancer - will have local access to mammography services when the Alberta Health Services Screen Test program arrives in the community next month.

A mobile mammography trailer will be stationed at the Westlock Healthcare Centre (10220 93 Street, on MRI pad, clients can park west side of the trailer) on April 28-30 and May 1, 3, 4 and 5. Residents can book an appointment or learn more about the program by calling 1-800-667-0604.

Screen Test is improving access to cancer screening for hundreds of women in northern Alberta communities where mammography is not readily available.

A mammogram is an X-ray of the breast and has proven to be the most effective way to detect breast cancer. Early detection allows for a greater number of options for treatment and a better chance of survival.

Due to COVID-19, Screen Test is taking a number of precautions to ensure the safety of our clients and staff. Details will be shared when you call to book your appointment. Infant nutrition classes offers support to parents in Central Zone

Parents who have questions about feeding their growing babies have access to a free, online infant nutrition class offered by Alberta Health Services (AHS).

Led by a registered dietitian, the 90-minute workshop highlights why babies need to start on iron-rich foods at six months, how to start introducing solid foods and why progressing to different food textures is important.

AHS dietitians will answer questions and show parents how to make their own baby food using a variety of kitchen tools they may already have at home. Parents will learn how to prepare vegetables, fruit, meat and meat alternatives using a number of different tools, including hand mixers, food mills and food processors.

The class is an online version of AHS' infant nutrition workshops, which are offered regularly in 29 communities across AHS Central Zone. The classes are moving online in order to follow public health guidelines on physical distancing during the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19 Status


Cases in Alberta

This past week all COVID-19 numbers are up - and up sharply - with variants of concern (VOC) now comprising almost half of all active cases. In response, the Government of Alberta updated mandatory health measures to try to slow the spread of COVID-19 and the VOCs (see item below).

As of April 7, there were 12,187 active cases, up from 8,653 the previous week, a 41 per cent increase. Calgary Zone has the most active cases in the province for the 13th consecutive week, although every zone reported an increase in active cases, as you can see in the table below.


There was an average of 1,104 daily new cases in the province for the seven-day period ending April 7, compared to 715 cases the previous week (March 25-31*), a 54.4 per cent increase. The Calgary Zone reported the largest number of new cases, with 3,636, compared to 2,301 new cases the previous week, a 58 per cent increase.



*Note: This week's report uses the regular Thursday-to-Wednesday interval, not the truncated interval used for last week's report, which compensated for the stat holiday. Individuals aged 10 to 49 accounted for 71 per cent of new cases in the province over the past week.

Hospitalizations and ICU admissions

As expected, hospitalization and ICU numbers are starting to reflect the rising number of COVID-19 cases reported in Alberta over the past several weeks.



On April 7, there were 83 individuals in ICUs compared to 58 on April 1, a 43.1 per cent increase. A total of 257 individuals were in non-ICU hospital beds on April 7 compared to 235 on April 1, a 9.4 per cent increase.

The breakdown of hospitalizations by zone as of April 7 is as follows:

Other notable COVID-19-related information:


- As of April 7, a total of 156,905 cases of COVID-19 have been detected in Alberta and a total of 6,746 individuals have been hospitalized, which amounts to 4.3 individuals for every 100 cases. In all, 142,713 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.
- As of April 7, 2,005 individuals have passed away from COVID-19, including 11 deaths between April 1 and April 7. We extend our condolences to the families of these individuals, and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- From April 1 to April 7, 84,059 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 12,008 tests per
 day. During this period, the daily positivity ranged from 8.51 per cent to 10.27 per cent. As of
 April 7, a total of 3.8 million tests have been conducted and 1.9 million individuals have been
 tested.
- The R value, also known as the reproduction number, describes the ability of a disease to spread. It tells us the average number of people that someone with COVID-19 will infect. An R value of 1 means an infected person will infect one other person on average. Values below 1 mean transmission is decreasing; above 1, transmission is increasing. The provincewide R value from March 29 to April 4 was 1.17, whereas R value the previous week was 1.09.
- For the winter school term, as of April 7, AHS has confirmed 3,624 individuals with COVID-19
 were present at schools while infectious or acquired the disease in the school setting. A total of
 871 out of 2,415 schools in the province have reported an individual has attended their school
 while infectious or had in-school transmission.

Updates on variants of concerns

Alberta Health has now reported 8,278 cases of COVID-19 variants of concern (VOC): 8,229 are B.1.1.7 variant (variant originating in the U.K.), 26 are B.1.351 variant (variant originating in South Africa) and 23 are P.1 (variant originating in Brazil). Of the 8,278 VOC cases, 5,457 are active (44.8 per cent of total active cases), 2,791 people have recovered and 30 people have died.

So far, evidence suggests variants of concern spread more easily than the original strain, meaning they are more contagious. These new variants may also cause more severe illness.

The figure below shows new VOC cases (grey bars) and the percentage of VOC cases identified compared to other cases of COVID-19 (blue line); between March 30 and April 5, the percentage of VOC cases ranged from 47.1 per cent to 55.7 per cent.



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Alberta Health announced April 8 that the province has now reached the point where variants of concern are the dominant strains of new COVID-19 cases in Alberta.

By far the most common is the variant originating in the U.K., with 99 per cent of all the variant cases confirmed to date. We have now reached the point that, when individuals test positive, they should assume they have the variant originating in the U.K.

Those who test positive for COVID-19, regardless of whether they have a variant strain, are still required to isolate immediately for at least 10 days from when their symptoms started, or from the date they were tested. (See Change to Quarantine Requirements for Household Contacts item below.)

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

We continue to update the testing data for healthcare workers. These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of April 7:

- 79,585 employees (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 5,167 (or 6.5 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 2,961 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 660 (or 22.3 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 2,206 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.
- 5,126 physicians (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 209 (or 4.1 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 114 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 12 (or 10.5 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 95 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

Second COVID-19 Test for All Close Contacts

All close contacts of a confirmed case of COVID-19 – original strain and variants of concern – are recommended to be tested twice during their quarantine period. By testing all close contacts twice, we have a better chance of quickly identifying new cases and stopping their spread.

All close contacts of a confirmed COVID-19 case are asked to book a first <u>COVID-19 test</u> as soon as they receive confirmation they are a close contact of someone who tested positive for COVID-19. If the first test is negative, a second test is recommended 10 days or later after the last exposure to the confirmed case but before the quarantine period ends on Day 14. If symptoms develop at any time during the quarantine period, a test should be booked immediately.

Change to Quarantine Requirements for Household Contacts

For original and B.1.1.7 (variant originating in the U.K.) cases, if a case has a separate bedroom and bathroom, and remains completely separated from the rest of their household contacts for their infectious period, the 14-day quarantine period for household contacts begins on the last day of contact with the case. For B.1.1.7, every day the case is isolating at home is no longer considered a new exposure to household contacts if the case remains completely separated from their household contacts as noted above.

If household contacts cannot stay completely separate from the case in the house, the 14-day quarantine period for household contacts begins when the infectious period of the case ends.

For B.1.351 variant originating in South Africa and P.1 variant originating in Brazil cases, every day the case is isolating at home is considered a new exposure to household contacts, even if they have a separate bathroom and bedroom. Household contacts must quarantine during the case's isolation period (10 days) plus an additional 14 days after the case's isolation period ends. Contacts will be notified by AHS if this applies to them.

For cases and contacts who cannot safely isolate from others in the same household, it is recommended to isolate in a different location, such as an isolation hotel. Call 211 to access isolation hotels.

While the COVID-19 variants of concern spread more easily, they are thought to spread in the same way as the original virus. This means that the same types of preventive strategies will be effective. To protect yourself and those around you, follow all public health guidance, including: Reduce the number of close contacts.

- Wash your hands.
- Wear a mask.
- Practise physical distancing.
- Stay home when sick.
- Get if you have any symptoms of COVID-19.tested
- Follow all public health measures in effect.
- Know the isolation and quarantine requirements.

COVID-19 Immunizations

By the Numbers

As of 10 a.m. April 9, more than 799,800 total doses of COVID-19 vaccine have been administered by AHS. More than 488,900 Albertans have received at least one dose of COVID-19 vaccine, and more than 155,300 have received both Dose 1 and Dose 2.

Launch of Phase 2B

On April 5, those eligible as part of <u>Phase 2B</u> of Alberta's vaccine rollout were able to begin booking COVID-19 immunization appointments. This includes anyone born between 1957 and 2005 with <u>high-risk health conditions</u>. Appointments can be booked through the <u>AHS online booking tool</u>, Health Link at 811 or at participating pharmacies.

Rollout of Phase 2C for Healthcare Workers

Beginning today, April 12 at 8 a.m., healthcare workers in patient care facilities or who provide services

directly to clients in the community are eligible to book a COVID-19 immunization appointment as a part of the <u>Government's Phase 2C group</u>. This includes students undertaking placement practicums in clinical areas, volunteers, and contracted providers for Alberta Health Services, Covenant Health, Alberta Precision Labs, DynaLife. It also includes regulated health care professionals and their office or support staff.

This cohort includes more than 240,000 eligible health care workers. We anticipate that incoming vaccine supplies over the next 3 - 4 weeks will allow all who are eligible to book appointments during this timeframe, if they want the opportunity to receive the vaccine.

Those who are eligible will have the option to book via the AHS online booking tool, or through a participating pharmacy. For more information about healthcare workers eligible in Phase 2C and how to book an appointment, please see our FAQ.

Anyone eligible in Phase 1, 2A or 2B of Alberta's vaccine rollout who hasn't yet received the vaccine can continue to book their appointment through a participating pharmacy or AHS. Albertans age 55-64 can also book appointments to receive the AstraZeneca/COVISHIELD vaccine.

Update on Covishield/AstraZeneca

On April 6, additional AstraZeneca/Covishield appointments opened at <u>participating pharmacies</u> across the province for Albertans aged 55-64.

Beginning April 9, COVID-19 immunization appointments with the AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine will also be available in Edmonton and Calgary through the AHS online booking tool for Albertans aged 55-64.

AHS is offering these AstraZeneca/Covishield appointments (100,000 doses) in Edmonton and Calgary through rapid-flow clinics to ensure as many Albertans are immunized as quickly as possible. These appointments are in addition to the ones that continue to be available through <u>participating pharmacies</u>.

For the recommended population, Health Canada considers the benefits of the vaccine to outweigh the risks. Incidents of rare blood clots linked to this vaccine in Europe have not been reported in Canada.

Eligible Albertans can choose if they would like to receive the AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine now, or wait to receive a Pfizer-BioNtech or Moderna vaccine, which is anticipated to be available to them later this spring.

Like all of the vaccines currently approved for use in Canada, the AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine has proven to be highly effective in preventing serious illness and death. It is provided in a two-dose regime, given approximately 16 weeks apart.

Update on Vaccine Efficacy for Variants of Concern

Work is underway by the international scientific and public health communities to better understand how the current vaccines may protect people against COVID-19 variants of concern. We are watching this information closely.

Studies by Pfizer have indicated its COVID-19 vaccine appears to work against the variants of the coronavirus first discovered in the U.K. and South Africa. Moderna has announced its COVID-19 vaccine elicits virus-neutralizing antibodies in trial participants that work against the new variants found in the U.K. and South Africa. Studies for AstraZeneca/Covishield vaccine have shown the vaccine works against the strain first discovered in the U.K. but may work less well for the variant first discovered in South Africa.

Data is evolving around the efficacy of the licensed COVID-19 vaccines against the variants of concern. We'll continue to share the latest findings.

Things You Need to Know

Government Updates Mandatory Health Measures

Updated mandatory health measures went into effect Wednesday, April 7 for retail, fitness and performance activities — and effective at noon April 9, restaurants were restricted to providing only takeout, delivery and patio service. The Government of Alberta announced these measures in response to the rapid rise in COVID-19 cases, especially variants of concern.

The following mandatory public health measures are now in effect:

Retail

- Retail services must reduce customer capacity to 15 per cent of fire code occupancy, with a minimum of five customers permitted.
- Curbside pickup, delivery and online services are encouraged.
- Shopping malls will be limited to 15 per cent of fire code occupancy.

Indoor fitness

- Only one-on-one training with an individual or household is permitted for indoor fitness activities (e.g., fitness in dance studios, training figure skating on ice, one-on-one lessons).
- No drop-in activities or unsupervised individual fitness.
- Group fitness, high or low intensity, is not allowed.
- Outdoor physical activity is allowed with up to 10 people, provided physical distancing is maintained between households.

Adult performance activities

 Adult performance activities are not permitted. Performance activities include dancing, singing, acting, playing a musical instrument and any rehearsal or theatrical performances.

Restaurants, pubs, bars, lounges and cafés

- Indoor in-person service is no longer permitted.
- Takeout, curbside pickup and delivery services are permitted.
- Outdoor patio dining is also allowed. Tables and dining parties must be two metres apart or separated by an impermeable barrier that will prevent droplet transmission.
- Household members only, or two close contacts of someone who lives alone.
- Contact information must be collected from one person of the dining party.

The Government of Alberta website outlines mandatory public health measures that remain unchanged.

Updated Acute Care Designated Support and Visitor Access Guidance and Directive Updates were recently made to the acute care designated support and visitor access guidance and directive. Both documents are a package, with the directive intended to be the overarching document, and the provincial guidance, the current operationalization counterpart to the directive.

Though these updates are limited, it is important staff, physicians, volunteers, designated support persons and visitors are aware of them. These updates were developed through consultation with clinical operations leadership, staff, patients and families throughout the province.

Guidance updates are as follows:

- Due to the increase in COVID-19 variants of concern cases, a confirmed outbreak at a site may require additional access restrictions for designated support persons and visitors. Temporary restrictions may be necessary during initial contact tracing and follow-up investigation.
- Immunized individuals are still required to follow all public health measures, including physical distancing, masking, isolation and quarantine requirements, as well as complete COVID-19 screening before entering a site.
- In pediatrics, sibling visitation can now be considered for long-stay patients in consultation with site leadership and Infection Prevention & Control. An adult must accompany children under the age of 14.
- Visitation at a patient's end-of-life continues to be supported at all sites, including for faith leaders, elders and traditional knowledge keepers. There's updated focus on the significance and importance of traditional Indigenous practices and protocols, including but not limited to end-of-

life. AHS continues to encourage the involvement of AHS cultural helpers, traditional wellness counsellors, Indigenous health and hospital liaisons or designated community health representatives, where possible.

 Visitation at continuing care and designated supported living facilities remains under the direction of CMOH Order 29-2020.

Directive updates are as follows:

- AHS site leadership is responsible for the implementation of the directive and the most current version of the guidance at their site.
- It is necessary all site leaders be familiar with the directive requirements, as well as review the guidance routinely (preferably biweekly) as this document is subject to frequent updates.
- The directive has been updated to clearly reflect expectations that sites comply with the guidance.
- Visitation at a patient's end-of-life continues to be supported at all sites, including for faith leaders, elders and traditional knowledge keepers.
- Revisions to Section 3 & 4, combining "Safe Site Access Assessment" and "Site Access Restrictions" into one new Section 3, "Restrictions in Excess of the Guidance."
- If further restrictions are required based on identified risk (e.g. outbreak), the directive provides
 expectations on how those restrictions are to be developed, reviewed, approved and
 implemented, including how this is managed/reported to the Zone Emergency Operations Centre
 (ZEOC) and Emergency Coordination Centre (ECC).
- No restrictions beyond the guidance can be applied except by following the process outlined in the directive.

Thank you for your continued support as we weigh the risk of welcoming family and designated support presence while ensuring the health and safety of other patients, as well as the staff and physicians providing their care.

Influenza Immunization Campaign Wraps with No Confirmed Cases

The 2020-2021 Alberta Influenza Immunization program ended like no other: with zero reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta. Influenza activity has been lower than expected for this time of the year across the globe, with several countries reporting low or no cases of influenza. Public health restrictions currently in place to prevent the spread of COVID-19, such as enhanced hygiene and physical distancing, have likely provided cross-protection against the transmission of influenza.

Alberta's annual influenza immunization campaign for the general public ended on March 31. Eligible children under the age of nine, who have received one dose of the influenza vaccine prior to March 31, will be offered their second dose until April 30.

As of April 3, 1.62 million doses of influenza vaccine were administered in Alberta. This is the highest uptake we've seen in our province over the last 10 years. Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) tested more than 122,000 respiratory swabs for influenza this season, compared to about 46,900 around the same time last season.

Connect Care Wave 3 Launched in North Zone

On Saturday, April 10, AHS successfully launched wave 3 of <u>Connect Care</u>, primarily on the western side of North Zone. More than 30 sites and services fully or partially launched in Wave 3, with 4,000 staff and 280 physicians and other healthcare providers joining those already working in Connect Care from Waves 1 and 2 in Edmonton Zone.

Connect Care's impact to healthcare in Alberta cannot be overstated. It significantly improves how patient information flows between patients and their healthcare providers, creating a central access point for current and accurate patient information. Within a few years, this system will be available to everyone who receives care from AHS in the province. Patients and their entire healthcare team will have the best possible information throughout their care journey.

Screen Test available in Barrhead

Screen Test mobile mammography services, including additional cervical and colorectal cancer screening,

is coming to Barrhead. A mobile mammography trailer will be stationed at the Barrhead Keir Care Centre/Continuing Care (5336 59 Avenue) on May 6-8, May 10-15 and May 17-19. Cervical and colorectal consultations will be available in in Barrhead on May 10-12 and May 17-19. Appointments can be made for mammography services, cervical and colorectal cancer screening by calling Screen Test at 1-800-667-0604.

APL Celebrates National Medical Lab Week, April 11-17

Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) is celebrating National Medical Lab Week, April 11-17. Lab Week is an opportunity to build awareness of the important role APL plays in the healthcare system in Alberta, and to recognize and highlight the hard work and dedication of APL staff throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.





Order 10 - 2021

CMOH Order 10-2021 amends Order 8-2021.

It is imperative that all public health guidance continues to be observed. Alberta is now moving back to Step 1 of the Path Forward as cases and hospitalizations rise.

Overview of new changes:

- The Government of Alberta is moving to Step one on the Path Forward. Step one will increased restrictions
 on indoor fitness and indoor dining for hospitality.
- Indoor group fitness for adults is not permitted (both low and high intensity).
- Changes to youth sport/activities:
 - Lessons, practices and physical conditioning activities are allowed for indoor and outdoor minor sports/activities and school athletics (for example, school sport activities that are outside of a physical education class or related part of the school curriculum).
 - o Games are not allowed.
- Households are no longer able to dine indoors. Patio dining is permitted as part of Step 1 of the Path Forward.

Summary of Discussion:

Path Forward:

AGMs and meetings for non-profits are still encouraged to be held online. Service Alberta recently updated the rules allowing thousands of businesses, non-profits, societies, cooperatives and condominium corporations the option to meet and vote online, as opposed to in person.

Immunization:

Rural and Urban immunization sites are expected to expand as supply increases. All Albertans born before 2005 with an underlying condition can now book an appointment through AHS or participating pharmacies.

As of April 12, phase 2C of the vaccination program is underway. 2C is targeted towards front-line healthcare workers.

Indoor Fitness/Recreation:

Multiple groups of 10 to use a shared play surface indoors/outdoor place service as long as distancing and other health guidelines <u>are followed</u>.

Summer Recreation – outdoors

Splash Parks and Outdoors pools are able to operate as part of Phase 1 with restrictions in place. Activities that are inherently distanced such as singles tennis and golf can take place as long as they align with public health guidelines.

Outdoor fitness/recreation must follow these guidelines:

- Physical distancing of 2metres between households or individuals
- 2) Group activities have a maximum of 10 people.
- If activities cannot be modified to align with public health guidelines than the activity is not permitted.

Indoor Social Gatherings:

Indoor social gatherings are not permitted.

Can we have outside agricultural shows, and outdoor softball with visitors in the tands?	 Discussions related to agricultural shows such as Cattle Shows, are on-going. As soon as a decision is made, it will be communicated publicly. Sports such as softball are not permitted under the current guidelines. As a result both the activity and having spectators are not permitted at this time. Adult team sports may be part of Phase 3 of the Path Forward.

Frequently Asked Questions - April 9, 2021

Council Meetings

Can councils still hold council meetings inperson with members of the public present?

YES. Since municipal council meetings are business meetings and not social meetings, they can be held in person, including with members of the public; however, because of the elevated risk, it is strongly recommended to move to virtual meeting formats wherever possible. It is important to note that masks are mandatory in all indoor public places and indoor workplaces.

Is the Public Meeting Procedures (COVID-19 Suppression) Regulation still in effect?

YES. The Public Meeting Procedures (COVID-19 Suppression) Regulation remains in effect until it has been repealed. The regulation enables municipalities to follow the Chief Medical Officer of Health's orders for physical/social distancing by conducting meetings electronically. While councils are encouraged to consider electronic meetings to ensure compliance with the public health orders regarding public gatherings, the decision on how to conduct meetings remains at the discretion of the council, committee or commission, while ensuring the process used complies with current public health orders.

Should councillors still be encouraged to wear masks?

YES. Masks are required to be worn indoors at all times, unless individuals are at a workstation and separated from others. If each individual seated in chambers is separated by two metres from all others then masks could be removed; however, it is highly recommended masks remain on for all in-person meetings. At this time, virtual meetings continue to be encouraged wherever possible.

Municipal Governance During the COVID-19 Outbreak

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Classification: Public

Alberta

Recreational Facilities

Can municipal facilities such as recreation centres, arenas and aquatic centres remain open?

YES. Municipal facilities used for indoor recreation may remain open only for individual or household one-on-one fitness training and youth group physical activities. At this time, libraries must close.

General Questions

Can municipalities choose to keep certain municipally controlled properties closed even if they are allowed to be open under Step 1?

YES. The decision to open facilities remains a local council decision. Municipalities and the public must continue to put safety first while gradually reopening businesses, resuming activities and getting people back to work.

Are municipalities responsible in any way for use of their community halls or facilities in contravention of the order or parameters of use under the Public Health Order?

YES. Community hall and facility operators are responsible for any contravention to public health orders that occur within their premises. If the operator is the municipality, then the municipality would be held responsible.

Should municipalities be encouraging employees to work from home?

YES. Working from home is mandatory unless the employee's physical presence is required to meet operational needs. While in the office, individuals must practice social distancing and wear masks when in public areas of the office. Municipal staff should be encouraged and supported to have remote work arrangements where feasible.

Are we able to have a small number of staff remain in the office to accept nomination papers, utility payments, etc.?

YES. It is up to each municipality to determine what is operationally required and put in place measures that adhere to the active public health orders to protect the health and safety of the public and employees that are deemed critical to operational effectiveness.

For elections, in addition to delivering nomination forms in person, the specific requirement of section 28 of the *Local Authorities Election Act* to submit nomination forms to the local jurisdiction office can be met by having forms mailed or delivered by courier. Nomination forms can also be accepted at specific times set by the returning officer, by appointment, or at a secure drop-off box.

Ministerial Order No. MSD: 130/20, remains in effect and enables nomination deposits to also be paid by debit or credit card. The need for certain modifications will continue to be monitored and reviewed to ensure municipalities will have the ability to align election operations with public health orders or recommendations.
