Specifically to use the term "Carried Unanimously" or "Carried"

Further to our MAP (Municipal Accountability Program) Review, I have followed up with Jeff Nixon, Municipal Accountability Advisor to advise that we have now completed all of the outstanding items from the Alberta Beach MAP Review with the exception of the Assessment Review Board Bylaw. He understands that we are just waiting for the Minister's approval to join Capital Region Assessment Services Commission and then we will follow up with the appropriate bylaw.

Through the review process one of the discussions I had with Jeff was regarding the Council meeting agenda and minutes; I need to ensure that the agenda and minutes clearly show the time the meeting begins, when the meeting closes to the public for confidential closed meeting session and when the meeting re-opens to the public. I advised Jeff that Council has passed a new Council Procedure Bylaw, that this has been identified in the bylaw, and is now the practice for the agenda and minutes. (I also sent a copy of the agenda template and copy of minutes).

One further discussion was regarding recording the motions; the term I use in the minutes "Carried Unanimously". He said that it is only necessary to use "Carried" and that "Carried Unanimously" was only required on the motion where Council approves three readings in one sitting for passing a bylaw. I had advised Jeff I was aware of that, however, I believe that using the term "Carried Unanimously" is very transparent to anyone reading the minutes, that all Council is in favour of the motion. If I only use "Carried" then no one knows whether the motion was supported by all Council or not. When a motion is not supported by all of Council then I use the term "Carried" unless of course the motion is defeated. When Council requests a recorded vote then I record who is in favour and who is against the motion and whether the motion is "Carried". I believe Municipal Affairs wants transparency and it surprises me that this seems to be an issue. During the MAP review he said he understood my reasoning and it was left at that, however recently Jeff commented that he noticed I am still using the term "Carried Unanimously" and that it was not necessary etc. My response was that I am just trying to be transparent. I told Jeff I would refer to Council on how they would like their motions recorded in the minutes. Jeff further commented that it's MA's position that minutes should only record as carried.



COVID-19 Status


Cases in Alberta

The Government of Alberta announced expanded public health measures December 8 (see item below), designed to reverse rising numbers of new cases, hospitalizations and ICU admissions - a trend that continued this past week.

Between Dec. 3 and Dec. 9, Alberta recorded more than 1,500 cases each day, with 1,881 reported on Dec. 4, an all-time high. Over this period, there was an average of 1,733 daily new cases, compared to 1,591 the previous week, a 9% increase. If there's a sliver of positive news, it's the fact this single-digit increase is preferable to what we've seen over the previous four weeks, when we saw week-to-week increases of between 23% and 42%.

For the week ending Dec. 9, there were 6,573 cases among individuals aged 20 to 49 years, which is 54% of all new cases. However, cases continue to occur in every age group. This week, 1,833 new cases were reported among school-aged children (5 to 19 years) and 1,891 new cases were reported among older adults (60 years and older).

Alberta surpassed 20,000 active cases for the first time on Dec. 6 and had a record number of active cases on Dec. 7 with 20,388 active cases.



As of Dec. 9, there are 20,163 active cases in the province. Edmonton Zone has the most active cases with 9,464, a 14% increase compared to the previous week. North Zone reported a 26% increase compared to the week before, the largest proportional increase among the five zones. For the second consecutive week, the South Zone reported a 5% decrease in the number of active cases compared to the previous week. The table below shows the number of active cases in each zone for the last two weeks.



Hospitalizations and ICU Admissions

As of Dec. 9, there are 682 individuals in Alberta hospitals, with 124 in ICUs. These numbers represent a

34% increase in total hospitalizations from the previous week. The breakdown of hospitalizations by zone as of Dec. 9 is as follows:

Other notable COVID-19 - related information:

 As of Dec. 9, a total of 75,054 cases of COVID-19 have occurred in Alberta and 2,465 individuals have been hospitalized, which represents 3.3 individuals for every 100 cases. In all, 54,225 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.

- Alberta has reported 666 deaths since the start of the pandemic, with 14% of those deaths
 occurring in this last week alone. We extend our condolences to the families of these individuals,
 and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- In the past week, 134,902 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 19,272 per day. A
 record 23,463 tests were performed on Dec. 5. The daily positivity rate reached a record of
 10.74% on Dec 3. A total of 2,444,373 tests have been conducted as of Dec 9.
- As of Dec 10, AHS has confirmed 3,119 individuals with COVID-19 were present at schools while
 infectious or acquired the disease in the school setting. Currently, 897 out of 2,415 schools in the
 province (37.1%) have reported an individual has attended their school while infectious or had inschool transmission.

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of Dec.9:

- 69,315 employees (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 2,546 (or 3.67%) have tested positive.
- Of the 921 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been
 determined, 302 (or 32.8%) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional
 1,625 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of
 infection.
- 4,454 physicians (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 118 (or 2.65%) have tested positive.
- Of the 44 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, seven (or 15.9%) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 74 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

Things You Need to Know

Expanded, Mandatory Province wide Public Health Measures Announced

The Government of Alberta announced <u>expanded</u>, <u>province wide public health measures</u> on December 8. All Albertans, businesses, organizations and service providers must follow all new health measures. These restrictions will be in place for a minimum of four weeks.

All indoor and outdoor social gatherings – public and private – are prohibited.

- Close contacts are limited to household members only.
- Individuals who live alone will be allowed up to two close contacts for in-person visiting, with those two people remaining the same for the duration of the restriction period.
- Festivals, parades, events, concerts, exhibitions, competitions, sport and performance remain prohibited.

The mandatory indoor public masking requirement has been extended province wide.

- Public spaces include locations where a business or entity operates and is applicable to employees, visitors and the general public.
- Applies to all indoor workplaces and facilities outside the home.
- Farm operations are excluded.
- Rental accommodations used solely for the purposes of a private residence are excluded.

All places of worship are limited to 15 per cent of fire code occupancy for in-person attendance.

- Virtual or online services are strongly encouraged.
- Drive-in services where individuals do not leave their vehicles and adhere to guidance will be permissible and are not subject to capacity restrictions.
- Mandatory mask mandate, physical distancing and other guidelines remain in place.

Retail services must reduce customer capacity to 15 per cent of fire code occupancy, with a maximum of five customers permitted.

- Curbside pickup, delivery and online services are encouraged.
- Shopping malls will be limited to 15 per cent of fire code occupancy.

Closures

- Restaurants, pubs, bars, lounges and cafes will be closed to in-person service.
 - Only takeout, curbside pickup and delivery services are permitted.
- Casinos, bingo halls, gaming entertainment centres, racing entertainment centres, horse tracks, raceways, bowling alleys, pool halls, legions and private clubs will be closed.
- Recreational facilities fitness centres, recreation centres, pools, spas, gyms, studios, day and overnight camps, indoor rinks and arenas – will be closed.
- Outdoor recreation is permitted, but facilities with indoor spaces except for washrooms will be closed.
- Entertainment businesses and entities libraries, science centres, interpretive centres, museums, galleries, amusement parks and water parks – will be closed.
- Hotels may remain open but must follow restrictions no spas, pools, gyms or in-person dining.
 Room services only.
- Personal and wellness services, including hair salons, nail salons, massage, tattoos, and piercing, will be closed.
- Health services, including physiotherapy or acupuncture, social or protective services, shelters
 for vulnerable persons, emergency services, child care, and not-for-profit community kitchens or
 charitable kitchens will remain open for in-person attendance.
- Entertainment businesses and entities community halls and centres, indoor children's play
 centres and indoor playgrounds, theatres, auditoriums, concert halls, and community theatres,
 nightclubs, banquet halls and conference centres, indoor and outdoor festivals, concerts with the
 exception of drive-in events, tradeshows, and sporting events or competitions, remain closed.

Work from home

 Mandatory work from home measures will be implemented unless the employer determines that work requires a physical presence for operational effectiveness.

First Doses of Vaccine Arrive This Week

Health Canada approved the first COVID-19 vaccine on Wednesday, December 9. The <u>Government of Alberta</u> and AHS are planning for the arrival of 3,900 doses of Pfizer vaccine in Alberta this week, with an additional 25,350 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine now scheduled to arrive the week of Dec. 21.

The Government of Alberta determines overall immunization eligibility. The first round of vaccine is arriving in Edmonton and Calgary, as these are the zones with the highest rates and cases of COVID-19. Vaccinations are scheduled to begin later this week to a small number of healthcare workers including respiratory therapists, ICU staff and physicians, and some eligible long-term care healthcare workers. Alberta Health and AHS are working closely to ensure that the healthcare workers included in this phase are selected based on their level of interaction with populations most vulnerable to COVID-19 and with COVID-19 positive cases, as well as their role within the frontlines of the COVID-19 response.

A website has been developed and an FAQ is now available and will be updated on an ongoing basis.

After almost a year of living during a pandemic, the arrival of COVID-19 vaccine brings optimism and hope to our fight against the virus. As we move forward, please continue to follow current restrictions. Remember that it will be many months before the majority of Albertans are immunized and we must continue to work together to protect each other from the virus.

Updated Guidance for Designated Family/Supports

Due to the rising COVID-19 numbers, rates of community transmission and feedback received, AHS has made the difficult decision to limit onsite designated support in all acute care facilities including ambulatory care, urgent care/emergency department and maternity settings.

Effective today, Dec. 14, access for designated support persons and visitors in AHS acute care facilities includes the following:

- One designated support person for each patient in ambulatory, emergency, urgent care, maternity/postpartum and other inpatient areas.
- Up to two designated support persons for each patient in critical care, pediatrics and NICU.
- For exceptions from the above in pediatrics and maternity, for dependent-adults, and for supporting patients at end-of-life, please go to ahs.ca/visitation.
- There are also <u>federal and provincial compassionate exemptions</u> and <u>Chief Medical Officer of Health exemptions</u> for end-of-life and critical illness when in quarantine and isolation.

The <u>updated guidance</u> includes specific responsibilities for designated support persons and clinical services to follow. The above restrictions will be maintained during the holiday season. Please review our patient and family <u>holiday season FAQ</u> for information on support over the holidays.

These changes are to increase the safety of everyone at our sites and for easier implementation and a more consistent application of the guidance across the province. Also, this will help us to balance the need for patients to get the support from their loved ones over the holidays and into the New Year, while we continue to deal with the challenges posed by the spread of COVID-19 in our communities.

Verna's Weekly Video Message — Scientific Advisory Group

Using the best possible evidence to make informed decisions is key to our pandemic response. And with the ever-changing nature of this pandemic, we often need that information quickly. That's where the Scientific Advisory Group (SAG) comes in.

SAG connects with clinicians, operations, researchers and other experts to review, synthesize and interpret emerging evidence and guidance from national and international bodies, regarding various facets of COVID-19.

The focus of these reviews is to proactively support staff and patients during the COVID-19 pandemic, and to support best practices in healthcare settings across Alberta. Topics range from exploring viral transmission in condominiums and apartments, to determining the best strategies for controlling COVID-19 outbreaks.

Joining me (Verna) to tell us more about the SAG are its two co-chairs:

- Dr. Braden Manns, Associate Chief Medical Officer.
- Dr. Lynora Saxinger, Physician and Medical Lead, AHS Antimicrobial Stewardship, North.

Braden and Lynora discuss the work of SAG, how they support our pandemic response, and what the future might have in store for this group.



AHS' COVID-19 Projections

AHS is constantly monitoring current and future demand on the healthcare system, including the growth in COVID-19 cases. The AHS "early warning system" is one tool our teams use to predict hospitalization and ICU numbers, to help us plan for changes in demand. This internal tool provides a point in time forecast our teams, and is updated constantly throughout the day.

AHS is already increasing capacity to meet this forecast, and the potential for higher demand due to COVID-19. In the coming weeks, approximately 2,250 acute care beds, and 425 ICU beds will be allocated for patients with COVID-19 across the province. This is much higher than the worst-case scenario of 194 required ICU beds – and the 1,094 required acute care beds - forecast by the early warning system tool.

In Edmonton, 51 additional critical care beds have opened in the past three weeks. In Calgary, 10 additional critical care spaces opened in late November, and a further 10 opened this past weekend. More beds will be opened in those zones, and there are plans to add additional beds in North, Central and South Zones.

Our ICU occupancy is very high, and we thank our incredible frontline teams for the care they are providing in challenging circumstances. We need everyone's help to reduce demand on our healthcare system. Please follow the restrictions outlined by Dr. Hinshaw, and ease community spread.

Surgery Postponements

In late October Edmonton Zone postponed approximately 30% of non-urgent scheduled surgeries to maintain patient and ICU capacity within our hospitals. By early November, the significant surge in COVID admissions in both Inpatient Units (IP) and Intensive Care Units (ICU) resulted in the extension of the surgical phased reductions at 30% of all cases requiring hospital stay.

With the number of COVID hospitalizations and ICU admissions continuing to rise, further measures are required to ensure we have the space to care for the critically ill patients who require care now and in the coming weeks. These temporary measures include postponing as much as 60% of non-urgent scheduled surgeries that require a hospital stay in the Edmonton zone. The type of surgery that will go ahead will be limited to cases that require emergent treatment or urgent treatment in less than 7 days. Life and limb surgery will continue to be performed as well as surgery for major and minor trauma, urgent cancer, urgent cardiac and urgent vascular patients.

We know that these decisions will be difficult for those patients who are impacted, and we acknowledge the anxiety, frustration and concern that such decisions may cause. These decisions are not made lightly, but are necessary to address current pressures on our healthcare system capacity and ensure quality patient care. Impacted patients and staff of surgeries and ambulatory visits/procedures that require postponement are notified as soon as possible.

Contact Tracing Hiring Continues

AHS has successfully hired more than 400 staff to support contact tracing, with some staff starting as soon as today - Dec. 14. Training takes two days, plus several shifts 'buddying' with experienced staff. Onboarding timelines vary based on role and operational capacity.

AHS has continued to enhance our contact tracing teams to meet demand. We are rapidly increasing our response to the unprecedented volume of COVID-19 cases in the province. Pre-pandemic AHS had 50 contact tracers. We increased this to 300 by July, and more than doubled it again by September to 700. We now have more than 800 contact tracers in Alberta and are on track to double it once more, bringing us close to 1,600 contact tracers by the end of 2020.

A medical background is not necessary; but completion of post-secondary education, experience conducting telephone-based or in-person interviews, analyzing data and strong communication skills, are required. Other clinical members of the contact tracing team will support specialists and clinical staff will handle complex case management. AHS has received hundreds of applications from people with a wide variety of qualifications and are in a good position to appropriately fill all vacancies. Contract Tracing in Schools

Previously AHS contact investigation within school environments regarded anyone in the classroom with an infectious case to be a close contact and required to quarantine. This was resulting in too many teachers/staff being excluded when they may not have actually had close contact with a student case. For this reason, AHS has moved to assessing teachers/staff on a case-by-case basis, using similar criteria to what we use in assessing close contacts outside of the school environment.

Generally, all students who share a classroom with the case for more than 15 minutes cumulative are considered close contacts and will be required to quarantine for 14 days, regardless of mask use. This is due to the various interactions that students in the cohort may have with each other in the classroom, hallways and/or outside.

Teachers and other school staff may be considered on a case-by-case basis. If teachers can confirm that they are never within two meters of their students for more than 15 minutes cumulative, that they practiced appropriate hand hygiene, and that they were wearing a mask, they may not be considered as close contacts of a student case and not require quarantine. AHS is taking measures to do more individualized assessments for teachers to ensure that our educators are not quarantining unnecessarily.

Influenza Immunization Update

More than 1.3 million doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta, an increase of more than 39,000 doses from last week. For the sixth week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta. The weekly influenza data report is available at ahs.ca/influenza.

Changes to Outpatient Laboratory at Red Deer Regional Hospital Centre

In an effort to further improve the safety of vulnerable patient populations and staff within our hospitals as the COVID-19 situation continues to evolve, Alberta Precision Laboratories is undertaking changes at some of its locations.

Effective today, Dec. 14, the Outpatient Laboratory at RDRHC will be restricted to serving patients of the hospital's ambulatory clinics, patients who are immunocompromised, and those referred by their physician for specialized lab testing. All existing appointments at the hospital outpatient lab will be honoured.

Patients requiring regular blood work and other community lab service can book appointments or receive walk-in service at the Elements@RiversEdge facility operated by DynaLIFE Medical Labs. DynaLIFE has added lab capacity and expanded waiting room space at their Red Deer location to accommodate increased patient volumes.

Connect Care Update - Change in Timing

Given the current situation across AHS related to managing COVID-19 and the pressure this has placed on the health system, AHS' Executive Leadership Team has made the decision to change the timing and scope of upcoming Connect Care launches.

Wave 3 of Connect Care will launch in two parts: the portion planned for North Zone will launch April 10, 2021 while the Calgary Zone portion of Wave 3 will be further reviewed in consultation with zone leaders and teams. We are currently assessing the situation in order to determine our new wave rollout plan and sequencing for other waves. Our commitment is to keep the full implementation within the originally planned timeframe. Dates for future launches will be discussed and communicated once we know more.

Connect Care remains one of our highest organizational priorities. Even with this change, some Connect Care work will still continue to support the needs of the organization and prepare for the next launches.

We are thankful for all the work done to successfully launch Wave 2 in late October and we want to recognize the preparations undertaken for our next launches by teams across the organization. In the meantime, our immediate priority is to support Alberta's COVID-19 response.

Midwifery services now available at Taber Health Centre

Families receiving care from a newly recruited registered midwife now have the option to deliver babies at Taber Health Centre. There are now eight registered midwives serving in AHS South Zone; the others are based in Medicine Hat, Brooks and Lethbridge. Planning is underway to recruit two additional registered midwives, giving more families supported by midwifery services the option of a planned birth location either close to home, at home, or at the health centre. Registered midwives provide a full spectrum of maternal and newborn care, from prenatal to labour and delivery, until six weeks postpartum.

Join the Conversation

Your Body Talks, Listen To It.

Detecting disease early, especially cancer, is important to save lives. There are symptoms you can look for, and if you experience any of them, book an appointment with your family doctor/nurse practitioner or health care team immediately, even during the pandemic. They will work with you to decide what tests you need.

Some examples include:

- An unusual or growing lump
- Blood in your stool, urine, or phlegm, especially if persistent or associated with other symptoms
 related to your bowels (pain, constipation), urination (pain, frequency, poor stream), or breathing
 (worse cough or shortness of breath). Also, unusual bleeding from vagina, especially in
 postmenopausal women
- Any changes to a mole (size, shape, colour)
- · Trouble urinating for men, such as needing to pee right away, more often, with difficulty or pain
- Unexplained significant weight loss (>10%)

Help AHS Shape Cancer Awareness Campaign

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic cancer diagnosis decreased by more than 30% during the first wave in the spring with some recovery through the summer and early fall. However, as we move through wave 2, we are seeing a reversal of that recovery and cancer diagnosis is declining again. This suggests there are undiagnosed cancers across all tumour types, geographies and age groups, and could be linked to symptomatic cancer patients not seeking medical attention during this period of time. Many care settings experienced decreases in visits during the early months of COVID-19, including emergency

departments and community specialists.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has a critical role in reminding Albertans that the healthcare system remains open – and safe – to assist them with their health needs.

As we explore a paid portion of this awareness campaign for Albertans (such as radio, television and online advertisements), generously funded by the Alberta Cancer Foundation, we will be hosting a virtual focus group session on **Wednesday**, **December 16 @ 5:00 p.m.** to review our creative materials. 




Sharing the Love - Gratitude from Albertans





COVID-19 Status

Cases in Alberta

Alberta's COVID-19 vaccine rollout started Tuesday, December 15 (see below for details) and for the first time in three months, the average number of new daily cases for the week has decreased. Between Dec. 10 and Dec. 16, there was an average of 1,588 new COVID-19 cases daily compared to 1,733 the previous week, an eight per cent decrease. It should be noted that the last time Alberta reported a decrease was in late September when the average number of daily cases was under 150. So while it's good that the average number of daily new cases went down this past week, clearly there's plenty of room for further improvement.




Alberta reported 124 deaths this past week — that represents 15.7 per cent of all COVID-19-related deaths in the province and brings our total deaths to 790 individuals. We extend our deepest sympathies to the families of these individuals, and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.

For the week ending Dec. 16, there were 5,846 cases among individuals ages 20 to 49 years; 2,030 new cases among school-aged children (five to 19 years); and 1,830 new cases among adults 60 years and older.

On Dec. 13, Alberta reported a record number of active cases with 21,123, and on that same day, the Edmonton Zone surpassed 10,000 active cases, before falling back to 9,525 three days later.

The table below shows the number of active cases in each zone for the last two weeks.

On Dec. 16, there was a record of 763 individuals being treated for COVID-19 in Alberta hospitals, with 138 of those intensive care units (ICUs) and 625 in non-ICUs. One week earlier on Dec. 9, there were 682 total hospitalizations, which is a 12 per cent increase in total hospitalizations this week. The breakdown of hospitalizations by Zone as of Dec. 16 is as follows:

Other notable COVID-19 - related information:

As of Dec. 16, a total of 86,168 cases of COVID-19 have occurred in Alberta and a total of 2,935 individuals have been hospitalized, which amounts to 3.4 individuals for every 100 cases. In all, 65,513 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.

- In the past week, 137,272 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 19,610 per day. From Dec. 10 to Dec. 16, the daily positivity ranged from 7.34 per cent to 9.22 per cent. As of Dec. 16, a total of 2,582,185 tests have been conducted and 1,594,292 individuals have been tested.
- As of Dec 17, AHS has confirmed 3,447 individuals with COVID-19 were present at schools while
 infectious or acquired the disease in the school setting. Currently, two of every five schools (962
 out of 2,415) in the province have reported an individual has attended their school while
 infectious or had in-school transmission.

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of Dec. 16:

- 70,877 employees (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 2,956 (or 4.17 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 986 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 304 (or 30.8% per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 1,970 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.
- 4,554 physicians (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 137 (or 3.01 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 45 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, seven (or 15.6 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 92 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

Things You Need to Know

COVID-19 Immunizations Continue Next Week; Vaccine Sequencing Announced

Alberta Health Services has rolled out the first of 3,900 doses of COVID-19 vaccine to healthcare workers in Edmonton and Calgary. As of 3 p.m. Friday, 1,306 doses had been delivered. This week we anticipate receiving an additional 25,350 doses for province wide distribution. We thank everyone involved in the vaccine rollout; the effort has been tremendous, and everyone involved has made extraordinary efforts.

Alberta Health is responsible for COVID-19 vaccine policy, including purchase and allocation of vaccine. AH has updated its website with some additional information on vaccine sequencing. With not enough vaccine available to offer immunizations to everyone at the same time, Alberta is undertaking a phased approach. To date, one product, Pfizer-BioNTech, has Health Canada approval.

AHS is responsible for administering COVID-19 vaccine as part of the provincial immunization program, and we are working within the immunization allocation parameters outlined by Alberta Health to provide immunization to groups as vaccine supply becomes available. Exact amounts and timelines are subject to change and the approach will be amended as needed depending on vaccine supply.

Alberta Health, with input from AHS, has identified the following staff to be included in the sequenced phased approach:

Early Phase 1: December - Focus on acute care sites with the highest COVID-19 capacity concerns in Edmonton and Calgary:

- Healthcare workers in intensive care units
- Respiratory therapists
- Staff in long term care (LTC) and designated supportive living (DSL) facilities

Phase 1A: January (timeline subject to change depending on vaccine supply)

- Respiratory therapists
- Healthcare workers in intensive care units
- Staff in long term care (LTC) and designated supportive living (DSL) facilities
- Home care workers
- Healthcare workers in emergency departments

Phase 1B: February (timeline subject to change depending on vaccine supply)

Healthcare workers in medical, surgical and COVID-19 units and operating rooms.

Phase 2 (April to Sept 2021)

Work to identify sequencing for Phase 2 groups is underway. Decisions will be made in 2021.
 While Alberta Health has not finalized details, frontline healthcare workers who have not been included in the Early Phase or Phase 1 A and B, are expected to be included in Phase 2.

Phase 3 (Fall 2021)

· Anticipated start of roll-out to the general public

Healthcare workers identified for immunization in Phase 1 were selected as the first to receive the vaccine as a way to support acute care capacity and to protect populations at highest risk of severe outcomes. This includes those who provide care to residents in long term care and designated supportive living, as well as home care staff, to help ensure their higher-risk clients can remain in their homes and prevent hospital admissions.

At this time the sequencing for Phase 2 is to be determined. Discussions are underway with Alberta Health. Additional information will be shared as timing and availability of vaccine is known.

Resources on COVID-19 vaccine have been developed and are available here. A website has also been developed and will be updated as information becomes available.

We appreciate the hard work and dedication of the many staff involved in COVID-19 immunization planning and applaud their willingness to adapt to the quickly changing needs and priorities.

APL Expands Clinical Pilots for Rapid Point-of-Care COVID-19 Testing

Alberta Precision Laboratories expanded its clinical pilots of rapid point-of-care testing for COVID-19 to include long-term care and designated supportive living facilities in the Edmonton Zone using dedicated mobile testing centres that will be focused on high-risk outbreak sites.

The new mobile testing centres are expected to be ready to deploy in Calgary Zone starting today, December 21. Expansion to long-term care and designated supportive living facilities outside Edmonton and Calgary zones is expected to follow shortly after.


Expansion of the rapid-testing clinical pilot began during the week of December 7 with the deployment of systems at the first non-AHS sites — Calgary's Drop-In Centre and Edmonton's isolation facility — where staff nurses have been trained to use the systems with homeless shelter clients who are difficult to reach through the existing COVID-19 testing program. Work is underway to bring the systems to more homeless shelters in urban and rural locations in the coming weeks.

Rapid point-of-care testing systems provide faster and more convenient testing, helping to identify and isolate positive cases more rapidly than previously possible. Further expansion of the clinical pilot will also include the addition of rapid point-of-care testing at 25 rural hospitals in the AHS North, Central and South zones through the rest of December and early January, enhancing the testing system in more remote rural communities that currently require all patient samples to be transported to centralized public laboratories for analysis.

PPE Question of the Week — How Does AHS Workplace Health and Safety Assess COVID-19 Exposure?

In the latest instalment of <u>PPE Question of the Week</u>, Dr. Stephen Tsekrekos, Medical Director of Workplace Health and Safety (WHS), talks about the many factors that WHS considers when a healthcare worker has had a possible exposure to SARS-CoV-2 (the virus that causes COVID-19) and whether workplace exclusion, or quarantine, might be required. These factors include the nature of the interaction between a healthcare worker and a COVID-19-positive individual, proximity to that individual, and duration of the exposure.

Influenza Immunization Update

More than 1.3 million doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta, an increase of more than 39,000 doses from last week. For the sixth week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta. The weekly influenza data report is available at ahs.ca/influenza.

AHS is Standardizing Access to Physiotherapy Services

Alberta Health Services is working to standardize access to physiotherapy services in all areas of the province. This will help ensure Albertans with similar needs will have access to the same level of care, regardless of their location.

In order to move to this standard level of physiotherapy care in Alberta, AHS will not be renewing existing contracts with current physiotherapy providers whose agreements are set to expire on March 31, 2021. Community and contracted physiotherapy providers in specific geographic areas will have an opportunity in January 2021 to apply for new contracts that align with the service standard.

Starting in April 2021, AHS will begin to move to this new standard which will ensure low income Albertans have access to AHS-funded physiotherapy services for general musculoskeletal conditions.

Rehabilitation support for Albertans, including those with general musculoskeletal concerns, will continue to be available through the Rehabilitation Advice Line 1-833-379-0563. Albertans can call anytime between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday to Friday and speak to a healthcare provider for help with:

- Strategies to manage day-to-day activities affected by these concerns
- · Rehabilitation services open for in-person or virtual visits
- Community organizations available for support.

AHS will continue to provide physiotherapy services for Albertans with fractures, specific incontinence issues or who are recovering from orthopedic surgery. Providing physiotherapy services for Albertans remains a priority. We will work to ensure there is minimal impact to patients and families during the transition.



"We'll get through this. We'll get past it," says Dr. Shapiro. "But for the next months, we're going to face quite a storm. If you're young and healthy, you feel invincible and I understand that. But at the same time, you're a potential spreader.

"Right now, we have to follow the rules. We have to (physically) distance. We have to not gather in groups. The best gift we can possibly give for Christmas this year is to follow those rules. Stay separate and not spread this disease."

Patients Invited to Virtual Concert Series

With the restriction of visitors to hospitals during Covid-19 it will be quieter in patient rooms this winter, but a team of people-caregivers and musicians are hoping to lift the spirits of patients with the gift of music.

The Calgary Zone Patient & Family Centred Care (PFCC) team, with members of the Instrumental Society of Calgary, the Asylum for Art, physiatrist Dr. Stephanie Plamondon, and the AHS IT department, have planned a series of free virtual 45-minute concerts for patients and their families, as well as staff, physicians and volunteers, which will run from December 2020 to February 2021.

"When we surveyed patients, we were told that loneliness and boredom are the common COVID-19 related challenges they have to deal with. 

COVID-19 Status

Cases in Alberta

This week we lead with our hospitalization numbers. Alberta reported a week-to-week decline in the number of individuals being treated in hospital for COVID-19. On Jan. 6, there were 871 individuals with COVID-19 in the hospital compared to 951 hospitalizations on Dec. 30, an eight per cent decrease. Also on Jan. 6, there were 139 individuals in intensive care compared to 145 on Dec. 30, a four per cent decrease.

Despite these slight drops, the number of patients in hospital with COVID-19 continues to put significant strain on our healthcare system. Albertans need to continue to follow public health measures to limit the spread of the virus in the province and continue to reduce pressures on the health system.



The breakdown of hospitalizations by zone as of Jan. 6 is as follows:

COVID-19 Cases


Alberta's average number of daily new cases remained relatively stable last week. The average was 978 for the seven-day period ending Jan. 6, compared to 995 the previous week, a two per cent decrease.

For the week ending Jan. 6, the Edmonton Zone had the largest number of new cases at 2,513 (37 per cent of all new cases in the province), an average of 359 new cases per day. The Calgary Zone had almost as many with 2,498 new cases (36 per cent of all new cases in the province), an average of 357 cases per day. On Jan. 6, the Calgary Zone recorded 402 new cases, which was nearly 100 more than the Edmonton Zone recorded at 306 new cases.

From Dec. 31 to Jan. 6, there were 3,431 cases among individuals aged 20 to 49 years, which is half of all new cases during that time period. Over the same period, there were 1,078 new cases reported among

school-aged children (5 to 19 years) and 1,173 new cases among older adults (aged 60 years and older).

As of Jan. 6, there are 13,298 active cases in the province whereas, on Dec. 29, there were 14,555 active cases, a decrease of 1,257 active cases — or 8.6 per cent. The Edmonton Zone continues to have the most active cases with 5,465, although this is a 17.5 per cent decrease from Dec. 29. The Calgary, Central and South zones also reported decreases in the numbers of active cases, whereas the North Zone had a 34 per cent increase in the number of active cases since Dec. 29.

Other notable COVID-19 related information:

- As of Jan. 6, a total of 108,469 cases of COVID-19 have occurred in Alberta and a total of 4,443 individuals have been hospitalized, which amounts to 4.1 individuals for every 100 cases. In all, 93,954 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.
- As of Jan. 6, 1,217 individuals have passed away from COVID-19, including 154 over the past seven days (Dec. 31 to Jan. 6). We extend our condolences to the families of these individuals, and to all who have lost loved ones from any cause during this time.
- From Dec. 31 to Jan. 6, 90,442 COVID-19 tests were completed, an average of 12,920 per day. During this period, the daily positivity ranged from 5.4 per cent to 9.3 per cent. As of Jan. 6, a total of 2,888,432 tests have been conducted and 1,679,738 individuals have been tested.

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

We continue to update the testing data for healthcare workers. These statistics provide the total number of AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) employees and physicians tested, including a breakdown of the number of positive tests and those who have been confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of Jan. 6:

- 73,828 employees (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 3,926 (or 5.31 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 1,047 employees who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, 333 (or 31.8 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 2,879 employees who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.
- 4,761 physicians (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19 and, of those tested, 173 (or 3.63 per cent) have tested positive.
- Of the 48 physicians who have tested positive and whose source of infection has been determined, seven (or 14.6 per cent) acquired their infection through a workplace exposure. An additional 125 physicians who have tested positive are still under investigation as to the source of infection.

Kudos and thanks to the staff at Alberta Precision Laboratories who continued working diligently over the holidays processing thousands of COVID-19 tests every day and moving ahead with the expansion of rapid point-of-care testing across the province.

The launch of clinical pilots of rapid point-of-care testing at assessment centres, hospitals, continuing care facilities and homeless shelters before Christmas set the stage for the broader implementation of rapid testing that is now underway in all AHS zones. The rapid point-of-care testing systems provided by the federal government will form an important new pillar of the provincial COVID-19 testing program.

By the end of this month, rapid point-of-care testing is expected to be in place at 48 assessment centres, 27 hospital labs and four homeless shelters in Calgary and Edmonton. The addition of mobile testing teams for long-term care and designated supportive living facilities are also a great example of the innovative approach Alberta is taking to protect populations that are most vulnerable to outbreaks. These

mobile teams are currently operating in Edmonton and Central Zone, and will be expanded to other communities in the coming weeks.

We have received more than one million rapid point-of-care tests so far, and APL's independent validation work has provided valuable information about the sensitivity and effectiveness of these systems compared to our lab-based polymerase chain reaction method, which remains the gold standard for large-scale testing programs. Rapid point-of-care testing is most effective when used on patients who are within the first week of showing symptoms of COVID-19, helping us to more quickly identify and manage positive cases in the community, especially in more rural and remote locations.

Testing continues to be a critical piece of Alberta's COVID-19 response, and our combined APL/AHS teams have now completed more than 2.8 million tests on almost 1.7 million people since the beginning of the pandemic.

COVID-19 Immunizations

Healthcare Workers in Medical, Surgical and COVID-19 Units Added To Vaccine Priority List

Starting Friday, January 8, vaccine appointments are being offered to healthcare workers in medical, surgical and COVID-19 units. This means about 3,300 COVID-19 unit staff and 15,400 medical and surgical unit staff are now eligible for the vaccine as well as roughly 3,300 related physicians. Emails with links to the AHS online booking tool have been sent out to eligible individuals.

The online booking tool provides identified healthcare workers with options to choose a preferred time, date and location to receive their immunization. The tool also ensures the healthcare worker books a second dose within the allowable date range. After booking your appointment, you may change the appointment time or date within the allowable date range for the second dose.

To further boost the vaccine roll-out effort, Alberta's Chief Medical Officer of Health issued a directive to expand the types of healthcare practitioners that can be used in the COVID-19 immunization program. The directive will support Alberta Health Services to recruit additional health professionals in more settings like LTC/DSL and increase the number of available immunizers.

COVID-19 Vaccination Updates

As of 12:20 p.m. Jan. 8, more than 38,500 Albertans received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine, including:

- 16,600+ healthcare workers
- 12,600+ long-term care (LTC) and designated supportive living (DSL) staff
- 9,400+ LTC/DSL residents

Vaccine supply

More than 13,600 additional doses of Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine have arrived in Alberta as of Jan. 6. We expect additional doses of both Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine and Moderna vaccine to arrive this week and those will be distributed across the province as quickly as possible.

Ramping Up Immunizations

A COVID-19 online booking tool launched on Jan. 4 to allow those eligible healthcare workers to book their immunization appointments. Eligible staff and physicians will receive an email with a unique link to book their appointments. As of Jan. 8, more than 10,500 appointments have been booked.

 We continue to work closely with our partners in LTC and DSL. We expect to visit 80 per cent of facilities by Jan. 19 and some zones expect to have completed their LTC/DSL sites as early as next week.

- AHS is working across every zone to increase our number of immunization locations. We currently have 45 immunization locations across the province and will expand our locations as more vaccine becomes available.
- AHS and Covenant Health are piloting a program to bring temporary satellite COVID-19
 immunization clinics to some emergency departments throughout the province. These satellite
 clinics will increase opportunities for eligible emergency department staff and physicians to be
 immunized during this phase of the sequenced COVID-19 immunization rollout.

Quarantine Requirements Still Apply Even if You've Been Immunized

Healthcare workers who meet current COVID-19 exposure criteria (e.g., unprotected close contact with a COVID-19 case, or a recent return to Alberta from international travel) are still required to quarantine. Immunization does not change quarantine requirements.

Many teams across AHS are making every effort to provide access to COVID-19 immunization clinics to eligible staff and physicians. In addition to the online booking tool, Health Link and Public Health staff in the North, Central and South zones have been calling eligible staff and physicians directly.

We understand the frustration of those who want to be immunized and are not yet eligible, and ask for patience. We would love to be able to immunize everyone who interacts with patients and families immediately, but the reality is that it's going to take some time. We are doing all we can to push hard to roll out the vaccine as it becomes available according to the direction provided by Alberta Health.

Adhere to Public Health, PPE Guidance Even if You're Immunized

Currently, there is insufficient evidence on the duration of protection and effectiveness of the vaccine in reducing transmission of COVID-19. While the vaccines being delivered have shown very high effectiveness in clinical trials, no vaccines are 100 per cent protective. Immunized healthcare workers are still required to adhere to existing PPE guidance, including continuous masking, continuous eye protection, and IPC recommendations for COVID-19. Healthcare workers who are close contacts of cases of COVID-19 will still need to isolate for 14 days. Learn more healthcare workers who are close contacts of cases

Things You Need to Know

Influenza Immunization Update

More than 1.47 million doses of influenza vaccine have been administered in Alberta. This is an increase of more than 26,000 doses from the last influenza update provided before the holiday break.

For the ninth week in row, there are no reported cases of seasonal influenza in Alberta. The weekly influenza data report is available at ahs.ca/influenza. Let's continue to work together to protect each other from a vaccine-preventable illness and reduce the strain on our healthcare system.

Edmonton Zone using automated calls to update surgical waitlists

AHS is using automated phone calls as part of an initiative to update surgical waitlists in the Edmonton Zone.

Over the next few months, patients listed for surgery with plastic, vascular, orthopedic, ear/nose/throat (ENT) and otolaryngology surgeons in the Edmonton Zone will receive an automated phone call or voicemail from the AHS Surgery Waitlist Management Team. If you receive this call or voicemail, please answer: we need to talk to you about your status on a waitlist. All patients will be asked to call back 1-888-592-2060 as soon as possible. Patients who hang up or do not call the number back will not see their position on the waitlist affected.

Please note: AHS will never ask you for financial information or for any personal information, other than your provincial personal health number or birthdate to verify your identity, during these automated calls. If the phone call or voicemail you received asks for additional information (like your Social Insurance Number or financial information), **DO NOT** call the number. Someone may be pretending to be Alberta Health Services to collect your personal information and scam you.

Approximately 4,300 surgeries have been postponed in Alberta since November; the majority of these

postponements have been in Edmonton. Despite these postponements, AHS is currently doing about 85% of normal surgery volume. All urgent and emergency surgeries are continuing.

Construction Starts on new Dialysis Clinic in High Prairie

Construction is scheduled to start this month on a renal dialysis clinic at the High Prairie Health Complex. The facility is expected to start accepting patients in early 2022, following 10 months of construction and the recruitment and training of staff.

The six-station dialysis clinic will be open three days per week with the ability to treat 12 patients a day, in privacy and comfort. AHS is pleased to be able to provide local dialysis service for residents in High Prairie and the surrounding communities now, and into the future.

Diabetes management classes offered online

Residents of Central Zone working to manage pre-diabetes and Type 2 diabetes are invited to attend free information sessions via Zoom Jan. 20, 27, Feb. 3 and 10 from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Participants can call the Alberta Healthy Living Program at 1-877-314-6997 to register, and they'll receive a Zoom link.

Mobile mammography service to visit Wainwright

Women ages 50 to 74 – the group most at risk of developing breast cancer – will have access to mammography services when AHS' Screen Test program visits Wainwright. The mobile mammography trailer will be stationed at Wainwright Health Centre, 530 6 Ave. Jan. 21-23, 25-30 and Feb. 1-2. Residents can book an appointment or learn more about the program by calling toll-free 1-800-667-0604. Due to COVID-19, Screen Test is taking precautions to ensure the safety of clients and staff. Details are shared when residents book appointments.

Calgary artists perform live online for patients and caregivers

A gift of live music, performed virtually, aims to lift the spirits of patients in hospitals this winter, thanks to a team of caregivers and musicians who have come together to organize a concert series.

The Calgary Zone Patient and Family Centred Care (PFCC) team — along with members of the Instrumental Society of Calgary, the Asylum for Art, physiatrist Dr. Stephanie Plamondon and the Alberta Health Services (AHS) Information Technology (IT) department — have planned Winter Solace, a series of 45-minute concerts to run this month through February. Their intended audience includes patients, staff, physicians and volunteers.

"When we surveyed patients, we were told that loneliness and boredom are the common COVID-19related challenges they have to deal with," says Paul Wright, manager, PFCC. "With this concert series, we are hoping to reduce these feelings, provide connectivity and comfort, and improve patients' hospital experiences."

Patients can enjoy these concerts on their own laptops, smartphones and other devices — and also on iPads furnished by AHS Information Technology through generous donations from the Calgary Health Foundation. The concerts will be performed by local professional musicians and Mount Royal University Conservatory students from venues such as the musicians' homes or the Asylum for Art, a community space for musicians. The series is wholly funded through the Instrumental Society of Calgary.



RECORD OF DECISION -- CMOH Order 44-2020 which amends CMOH Order 42-2020 and rescinds CMOH Order 43-2020

Re: 2020 COVID-19 Response

Whereas I, Dr. Deena Hinshaw, Chief Medical Officer of Health (CMOH) have initiated an investigation into the existence of COVID-19 within the Province of Alberta.

Whereas the investigation has confirmed that COVID-19 is present in Alberta and constitutes a public health emergency as a novel or highly infectious agent that poses a significant risk to public health.

Whereas under section 29(2.1) of the *Public Health Act* (the Act), I have the authority by order to prohibit a person from attending a location for any period and subject to any conditions that I consider appropriate, where I have determined that the person engaging in that activity could transmit an infectious agent. I also have the authority to take whatever other steps that are, in my opinion, necessary in order to lessen the impact of the public health emergency.

Whereas I made Record of Decision – CMOH Order 42-2020 on December 11, 2020 that sets out the measures in respect of private residences, private social gatherings, places of worship, masks, certain businesses and entities, group physical activity, group performance activity and work from one's private residence.

Whereas I made Record of Decision – CMOH Order 43-2020 on December 22, 2020 that amends CMOH Order 42-2020 to provide exceptions to certain measures for end-of-life visits and the provision of counselling services.

Whereas having determined that some of the measures in Record of Decision - CMOH Order 42-2020 require further modification, I hereby make the following Order that modifies Record of Decision - CMOH Order 42-2020 and rescinds CMOH Order 43-2020 for the purpose of consolidating the amendments in CMOH Order 43-2020 into one amending order:

Effective December 23, 2020, Record of Decision – CMOH Order 43-2020 is rescinded and Record of Decision – CMOH Order 42-2020 is amended as follows:

Part 2 - Private residences

Section 4 of Part 2 of Record of Decision – CMOH Order 42-2020 is amended by adding the following after subsection (i):

(j) to provide counselling services:

(k) for a visit between a person who is at the end of their life (last four to six weeks, as determined by that person's primary health care provider) and a family member, friend, faith leader or other person as long as no more than three visitors enter the private residence of the dying person at one time.

Part 6 - Businesses and entities

Section 28 of Part 6 of Record of Decision - CMOH Order 42-2020 is amended by adding the following after subsection (j):

(k) to provide counselling services.

Part 7 – Group physical activity

Section 38 of Part 7 of Record of Decision – CMOH Order 42-2020 is rescinded and the following is substituted in its place:

- 38(1) Subject to section 39 of this Order, all persons are prohibited from participating in an outdoor group physical activity, including but not limited to games of hockey, where:
 - (a) maintaining a minimum physical distance of 2 metres between all participants at all times is not possible;
 - (b) the outdoor group physical activity includes more than 10 persons.
 - (2) For greater clarity, a person may participate in an outdoor group physical activity consisting of less than 10 persons if a minimum physical distance of 2 metres between all participants is maintained at all times.

This Order remains in effect until rescinded by the Chief Medical Officer of Health.

RE: CMOH ORDER 42-2020 - LIMITED EXEMPTION FOR A PERSON WHO RESIDES ON THEIR OWN

Pursuant to the recommendations of the Chief Medical Officer of Health (CMOH) for Alberta, a state of public health emergency was declared in the Province of Alberta on November 24, 2020 pursuant to s. 52.1 of the *Public Health Act* of Alberta.

Further to that declaration of a public health emergency the CMOH, pursuant to her authority under s. 29(2.1) of the *Public Health Act*, made CMOH Order 42-2020 (the Order) which rescinded CMOH Orders 38-2020 and 39-2020, as modified through Orders 40-2020 and 41-2020, in that CMOH Orders 38-2020 and 39-2020 were insufficient to protect Albertans from exposure to COVID-19 and to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The purpose of the Order is to help protect Albertans from the exposure to and spread of COVID-19 by prohibiting persons from attending certain locations for certain periods of time and subjecting such persons to any conditions that the CMOH considers appropriate including prohibiting persons from engaging in activities that could transmit an infectious agent and which the CMOH considers necessary in order to lessen the impact of the public health emergency. In addition setting such conditions as the CMOH considers appropriate or necessary on businesses and entities to lessen the impact of the public health emergency when those business or entities are offering goods or services to the public.

Pursuant to Section 47 of the Order the CMOH may exempt in writing persons or classes of persons from the operation of the Order.

The CMOH has determined, based on discussions with public health officials, that a temporary exemption from certain restrictions in Part 2 and Part 3 of the Order would further support the mental health and wellbeing of a person who resides on their own during the holiday season.

Section 3 of the Order restricts who may enter or remain in a private residence subject to Section 4 and 5 of the Order.

As per Section 5 of the Order, a person who resides on their own may

(a) have two other persons with whom they regularly interact attend at their private residence; and

(b) attend at the private residence of a person with whom they regularly interact.

As per Section 6 of the Order, a single adult who only lives with one or more minors is deemed to be a person who resides on their own.

As per Section 10(b) of the Order, a "private social gathering" does not include a gathering in which a person who resides on their own interacts with the two other persons referred to in section 5 of the Order.

As per Section 13 of the Order, despite anything in Part 2 of the Order, a private social gathering of 10 persons or less may occur at an indoor or outdoor pubic or private place only for the purpose of a funeral service or a wedding ceremony.

Pursuant to Section 47 of the Order I am satisfied that an exemption be granted from Sections 3, 5(a), 5(b) and 13 of the Order to the following premises and the following persons upon the following conditions:

- 1. Subject to paragraph 4, a person who resides in a private residence is exempt from Sections 3 and 13 of the Order and may permit up to two persons who reside on their own, as well as one or more minors who live with the adult if the adult only lives with the minors, and all of whom do not normally reside in that private residence to enter or remain in the private residence for one private social gathering between December 23 and 28, 2020. To clarify:
 - a. This exemption applies to the "host" person who resides in a private residence but:
 - i. is not a person who regularly interacts with the person who resides on their own as contemplated by section 5 of the Order; or
 - ii. is a person who regularly interacts with the person who resides on their own, as contemplated by section 5 or the Order, but who also lives with one or more persons in the residence who do not regularly interact with the person who resides on their own and who will be present at the gathering.
 - b. A "minor" is a person 17 years of age or younger.
- 2. Subject to paragraph 4, a person who resides on their own, as well as one or more minors who live with the adult if the adult only lives with the minors, are exempt from Sections 5(a) and 13 of the Order and may have either two persons or one household and one other person, with whom they do not regularly interact, attend at their private residence for one private social gathering between December 23 and 28, 2020.

- 3. Subject to paragraph 4, a person who resides on their own, as well as one or more minors who live with the adult if the adult only lives with the minors, are exempt from Sections 5(b) and 13 of the Order and may attend one private social gathering between December 23 and 28, 2020 at the private residence of a person:
 - a. who does not regularly interact with the person who resides on their own as contemplated by Section 5 of the Order; or
 - b. who does regularly interact with the person who resides on their own, as contemplated by section 5 of the Order, but who also lives with one or more persons in the private residence who do not regularly interact with the person who resides on their own and who will be present at the gathering.
- 4. All persons attending the private social gathering should, to the extent possible, follow appropriate public health measures including those relating to hand hygiene, maintaining 2 metres of distance from persons who are not part of the same household and masking when unable to maintain 2 metres of distance, to protect all persons in attendance and other Albertans from further transmission of COVID-19.

The exemption may be terminated or modified by the CMOH in writing without notice and for any reason as determined by the CMOH.

This exemption comes into effect on December 23, 2020 and terminates at 2400 hrs on December 28, 2020.

We trust this is satisfactory.

<u>Door to Door Sales</u> Are door-to-door salespersons allowed to operate under the enhanced public health measures?	Yes, door-to-door salespersons may continue to operate. They must practice good hand hygiene, wear masks, and maintain 2 metres of distance between themselves and customers at all times.
Municipality Data	
Why are only communities over 2,000 listed for COVID rates? Why is the information presented to municipalities in the manner that it is?	The Government of Alberta is committed to sharing information while protecting patients the right to privacy. The current reporting threshold, including the 2,000 population cutoff, balances these two objectives. We are committed to continually reviewing and assessing our approach in the months to come.
	Alberta Health has released new municipal case data to provide a better idea of how COVID-19 case numbers have changed over time in Alberta communities. The cases are calculated by Alberta Health utilizing data provided by Alberta Health Services. Providing this information by date range ensures that municipalities can stay informed of how the spread is evolving, while continuing to protect patient confidentiality.
	The information is available here: https://www.alberta.ca/lookup/covid19-weekly-active-cases.aspx and will allow communities to view the number of cases in their areas for the last four weeks. This data set will be updated on a weekly basis every Tuesday. You also have the option to download a complete history of active cases going back to March 2020.

The population of a municipality is determined by using the postal code provided for a household, and may not be an accurate reflection of how many people actually live in a given municipality. For example, this may happen when people living in rural areas use a PO Box rather than their home address. In these cases, a person's postal code may be attributed to a town or city even when they don't live there.

The sequence of populations to be vaccinated will be addressed beginning in January.

Vaccine Rollout

Can you please speak to the next phases of vaccine administration?

Can you please clarify where EMS and Firefighters fall into the phases of vaccine?

On December 2, 2020, Premier Kenney announced the launch of the COVID-19 vaccine task force responsible for the distribution of vaccines which are expected to be received in early January. Currently, the roll out plan (https://www.alberta.ca/covid19-vaccine.aspx) involves three phases, phase 1 sequencing includes the following populations:

- Health-care workers in intensive care units
- Respiratory therapists
- Staff in long term care and designated supportive living facilities
- Home care workers
- Health-care workers in emergency departments
- All residents of long term care and designated supportive living.
- Seniors 75 and over
- First Nations, Métis and persons 65 years of age and over living in a First Nations community or Metis Settlement
- Health-care workers in medical, surgical and COVID-19 units or operating rooms

Phase 2 (April to September 2021) – continue targeting populations in sequence. At this time the sequence of vaccinating populations has not been defined.

Phase 3 (Fall 2021) — anticipated start of roll-out to the general public.

Outdoor Recreation

Can you please clarify whether outdoor team sports are allowable? The guidance document you have online still says YES, but everything else we've seen says NO? THANKS!

Can you please clarify previous comments on skating? You mentioned a skating race could take place, but our understanding is sports competitions are currently prohibited?

The outdoor winter recreation guidance doc contradicts info on the website.

38(1) Subject to section 39 of this Order, all persons are prohitbited from participating in an outdoor group physical activity, including but not limited to games of hockey, where:

- (a) Maintain a minimum physical distance of 2 metres between all participants at all times is not possible;
- (b) The outdoor group physical activity includes more than 10 persons.

(2) For greater clarity, a person may participate in an outdoor group physical activity consisting of less than 10 persons if minimum physical distance of 2 metres between all participants is maintained at all times.

Communications Over the Holidays

If changes in guidance or orders occur over the holiday period how would municipalities be notified of these changes?

Any changes would be shared through current communications channels and municipalities would be notified through those channels, as required.

Close Contact Isolation Requirements

If someone is notified that they are a close contact of a COVID case and are required to isolate but they go and get tested as negative are they free to stop isolation or must they isolate for all 14 days?

Close contacts must isolate for 14 days from their last exposure to a person who has tested positive for COVID, regardless of if they (the close contact) test negative. Please see https://www.alberta.ca/isolation.aspx

YES. Although our office will be closed from December 25 to January 4, you can email any time sensitive inquiries to ma.lgsmail@qov.ab.ca inbox, which will continue to be monitored.

2021 Municipal Elections

The 2021 nomination period starts when municipal offices reopen in January 2021. For municipalities with nomination deposit bylaws, the *Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA)* requires nomination deposits to be in cash, certified cheques, and money orders. Are there other paperless options available to encourage the current COVID-19 pandemic?

YES. On December 14, 2020, the Honourable Tracy Allard, Minister of Municipal Affairs. signed Ministerial Order No. MSD:103/20 to amend specific requirements under Section 30(1) of the *LAEA* to allow deposits to be provided to the returning officer by in-person payments using a debit card or a credit card, in addition to the current cash, certified cheque, or money order options. This modification is only in effect for the 2021 general election year.

If a nomination deposit bylaw states the form of payment, do municipalities need to amend their bylaw to include the new methods of payment?

YES. The MO No. MSD:103/20 does not amend a local bylaw. If a municipality's local bylaw includes provisions that limit the way in which payments can be made, the bylaw would need to be amended to enable debit and credit card payments for 2021 only.

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Can our municipal office remain open to accept nomination forms?

YES. Employers shall require employees to work from home, unless their physical presence is required to effectively operate the workplace. Municipal offices could remain open to accept nominations papers. Determining what constitutes an essential service remains a local operational decision, and individual municipalities are encouraged to choose a process for accepting nomination forms that they deem appropriate. Nomination forms can be accepted at specific times set by the returning officer, by appointment, or at a secure drop box.

General Questions

Can we provide an option for households to rent public facilities (pools, indoor rinks) for personal use?



NO. Alberta's Chief Medical Officer of Health's current recommendation is that municipal recreation facilitates should not be rented out to individual households, as this is difficult to determine whether social gathering restrictions are being adhered to.

Are there resources available to ensure municipal messages are consistent with the provincial public health guidance?

YES. The Government of Alberta collection of COVID-19 visual resources is updated and also includes a new mandatory masking poster that municipalities and your community partners may use. Information posters and fact sheets can be accessed and downloaded online.



In order to adhere to social distancing requirements, our municipality has moved council meetings to the community hall. Given the current orders restrict the use of community halls, is council required to change the location?

YES. As community halls are to remain closed except for a permitted use, councils should conduct meetings electronically per the Public Meeting Procedures (COVID-19 Suppression) Regulation. If meetings have already been scheduled to take place in the community hall, councils must call a special meeting to change the location of the meeting. If time does not permit a special meeting to be called, municipalities should review their procedural bylaw, which may set out the process for adjourning a meeting should council not achieve quorum.

COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution

is there an update to the plan to distribute the COVID-19 vaccine in Alberta?

YES. In December, Premier Kenney announced the launch of the COVID-19 vaccine task force responsible for distributing vaccines. More than 56 per cent of vaccine doses in stock have been administered as of this week.

Up-to-date information on the phased implementation plan and additional information Albertans need to know about the vaccine is available at www.alberta.ca/covid19-vaccine.aspx.

Has it been determined in what phase of the vaccine roll-out plan that the vaccine will be available to municipal first responders and firefighters?

NO. The vaccination roll-out started on December 15, 2020. The <u>roll-out plan</u> involves three phases. Phase 1A includes health-care workers in home care and emergency departments.

Phase 1B will begin in February and include:

- Seniors 75 and over
- First Nations, Métis and persons 65 years of age and over living in a First Nations community or Metis Settlement
- Health-care workers in medical, surgical and COVID-19 units or operating rooms

The second phase is scheduled to start in April 2021 and will continue targeting populations in sequence. At this time, the order of vaccinating populations has not been defined.

Phase three is targeted for Fall 2021 and involves the roll-out to the general public.

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Municipal Elections

Due to the ongoing pandemic, are legislative changes being considered for the *Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA)* for the upcoming municipal elections?

YES. Municipal Affairs has met with key municipal stakeholders to discuss potential risks relating to the 2021 municipal general election and have identified some temporary modifications that could be made, if needed, to specific requirements under the *LAEA*. An example is the approval of Ministerial Order No. MSD: 130/20, enabling nomination deposits to also be paid by debit or credit card. The need for certain modifications will continue to be monitored and reviewed to ensure municipalities will have the appropriate ability to align election operations with public health orders or recommendations.

The nomination period began January 1, 2021. As a way to avoid in-person contact, can candidates submit nomination papers electronically?

NO. Currently, nomination papers cannot be submitted electronically. In addition to being delivered in person, the specific requirement of section 28 of the *LAEA* to submit nomination forms to the local jurisdiction office can be met by having forms mailed or delivered by courier. Nomination forms can also be accepted at specific times set by the returning officer, by appointment, or at a secure drop-off box.

Council Meetings

Can councils still hold council meetings inperson with members of the public present?

YES. Since municipal council meetings are business meetings and not social meetings, they can be held in person, including with members of the public; however, because of the elevated risk, it is strongly recommended to move to virtual meeting formats wherever possible.

Is the Public Meeting Procedures (COVID-19 Suppression) Regulation still in effect?

YES. The Public Meeting Procedures (COVID-19 Suppression) Regulation remains in effect until it has been repealed. The regulation enables municipalities to follow the Chief Medical Officer of Health's orders for physical/social distancing by conducting meetings electronically. While councils are encouraged to consider electronic meetings to ensure compliance with the public health orders regarding public gatherings, the decision on how to conduct meetings remains at the discretion of the council, committee or commission, while ensuring the process used complies with current public health orders.

General Questions

Has a timeline been established as to when the current public health measures will be changed?

NO. On January 7, 2020, it was announced that the current public health measures that came into effect on December 13, 2020, are extended and will remain in place until at least January 21, 2021. These provisions and the situation will be evaluated closer to January 21, 2021.

Are there different authority levels for the ongoing enforcement of current restrictions?

YES. Enforcement is currently undertaken by several different authorities. Alberta Health Services Public Health Inspectors respond to business-related complaints and continuing care complaints.

Response to any time-sensitive complaints about distancing, social gatherings, and isolation breaches can be made by:

- Police Officers
- Uniformed Community Peace Officers Level 1
- Uniformed Alberta Peace Officers Level 2



As the warm weather continues, our outdoor recreation and skating facilities continue to be popular destinations. Has there been any further clarification made to the guidelines of use for these municipal facilities and on outdoor skating?

YES. On December 23, 2020, Dr. Deena Hinshaw signed Order 44-20, which helps clarify the use of outdoor rinks and outdoor group physical activity, including hockey, and other concerns brought forward by municipalities.

Section 38(2) provides additional clarity, and states "...a person may participate in an outdoor group physical activity consisting of less than 10 persons if a minimum physical distance of 2 metres between all participants is maintained at all times."

Is there a timeline established for when municipalities may reopen arenas?

NO. CMOH Order 42-2020 is in effect until at least January 21, 2021.

How long arenas will remain closed will be determined at the same time the stronger health measures put in place on December 13, 2020 are re-evaluated.

Renovations and construction continue during the pandemic. Inspections under the *Safety Codes Act* are still necessary. Are there public health measures that impact our safety codes officers?

YES. Safety codes officers can continue inspections. Officers must mask while inspecting indoor public spaces, including construction sites, and can enter occupied houses for the purpose of inspection, according to CMOH Order 42-2020.

Are Volunteer Fire Departments allowed to continue training?

YES. Volunteer fire departments are permitted to undertake training activities as long as appropriate protocols are being followed. If this training can be safely delayed until mid-January when the current measures are expected to be reviewed, then delaying is recommended.



AUMA Villages West Update

Hello all,

I hope that everyone had a good Christmas and New Years. Hopefully you were able to take some time off and connect with family, in some fashion. I am sure that it has been a trying time both personally and professionally for many of us.

Here is a brief update of what I and the AUMA have been working on (in no particular order). This is by no means an inclusive list and I have not touched on anything where there is no significant new information. As always, please feel free to reach out to me if you have any specific questions, would like more information, or just want to chat and let me know what is happening in your community.

2020 Convention Resolutions

We have been working on progressing the resolutions that were passed at our Virtual Convention in September and have started receiving initial responses from the province on some of our resolutions. To view information on our active resolutions, please visit the AUMA Resolutions Library.

Covid 19

We continue to offer information and resources on our online <u>Covid 19 Hub</u>. In addition, we continue to raise municipal concerns and work towards solutions with the provincial government. In particular, we are advocating for increased communication, data, and information sharing with municipalities (including information on how decisions are being made) so that we can make informed decisions locally and help combat misinformation.

Municipal Measurement Index (MMI)

The province launched the MMI shortly before Christmas. The AUMA Board was given an advanced preview of the tool and were allowed to offer comments. Unfortunately, the province did not make changes to the tool, based on our input, and we are disappointed that it was released in its current form. The MMI has been unofficially dubbed the 'Municipal Report Card', although, in reality, it is not a report card, but a tool to compare municipalities.

In principle, the MMI is a great idea and could be used to increase awareness, accountability, and transparency in local government. However, some changes need to be made to achieve this, which we are recommending. In its current form, the MMI deals strictly with financial data and lacks information and details that explain differences in tax rates, accumulated surplus, debt, etc. It does not account for differences in service levels, infrastructure deficits, utilities, or differences in municipal tax structures. Without this kind of information, the numbers can be deceiving and could easily lead to public misunderstanding or misperceptions of municipal finances. It also allows you to compare municipalities that are exceptionally different; although there is a rating system that should flag if two municipalities are not comparable it is not accurate. For example, according to the Index the MD of Bighorn and the City of Spruce Grove are comparable municipalities.

Broadband

The Small Communities Committee is working diligently on this file, which has become increasingly more important in light of the pandemic. Unfortunately, I don't have any new information to share, but I would like to share successes that some of our villages have had. The Villages of <u>Delburne</u> and <u>Hythe</u> have both successfully undertaken projects to bring Fibre Optics to their community. **Congratulations on the success of your hardwork!** I would love to hear if other municipalities also have success stories to share.

Policing

Policing will continue to be a hot topic throughout 2021 and I will do my best to keep you informed of what is happening. The AUMA will be releasing some information soon on upcoming events and initiatives, so please be on the lookout for that!

The Interim Police Advisory Board continues to make progress, albeit slowly. By the end of this month we will be submitting our first report to the Minister which will outline our policing priorities, based primarily on feedback received through our survey (thank you again to all who filled that out). After that we will move on to creating governance documents for the permanent board. The Interim Board will be putting out a formal update near the end of the month outlining our work done to date.

2021 Provincial Budget

We continue to advocate for municipal priorities in the provincial budget. In addition to maintaining an adequate level of capital and operating funding, we are working to ensure that the province avoids transferring costs and responsibility onto municipalities while they work to balance their budget. There is, afterall, only one taxpayer.

Thank you for all that you do for your community. I wish you and your community all the best in 2021!

AUMA responds to removal of MLA Pat Rehn

AUMA responds to removal of MLA Pat Rehn

A fundamental responsibility of every elected official is to listen, engage, and work with other levels of government to best represent their constituents. This responsibility has taken on an even greater importance as governments at all levels across the country work together to confront the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

It is imperative for MLAs to be engaged with the cities, towns, villages, summer villages and counties they represent. It is therefore particularly regrettable that Slave Lake, High Prairie, and other municipal councils from the provincial constituency of Lesser Slave Lake had to take the unprecedented step of publicly reporting their struggles with building a productive relationship with MLA Pat Rehn. By failing to engage with and advocate for his constituents, MLA Rehn broke public trust of his local councils and failed to be accountable to his constituents.

AUMA agrees with Premier Kenney that people in positions of public trust must be held to a higher standard, and we support Premier Kenney's decision to remove MLA Rehn from the government caucus due to his lack of commitment to representing his constituency appropriately. Further, we join the town of Slave Lake in calling for Mr. Rehn's resignation as the MLA for the Lesser Slave Lake constituency.

We appreciate the willingness of the provincial government to listen to municipal concerns and needs and provide the necessary supports. We trust that this will enable municipalities in Lesser Slave Lake to achieve accountability with their provincial government and effectively collaborate over the remainder of the UCP government mandate.

There can be no economic recovery in Alberta without strong communities, and the partnerships between municipalities and their provincial government representatives are critical to achieving this. AUMA looks forward to building constructive relationships with all MLAs as we advance AUMA member priorities, including stable and predictable funding, partnerships for jobs and growth, and overcoming the challenges of COVID-19 to build a stronger, more resilient Alberta.

 - o (same as prior year)
- ✓ Penalties on Outstanding Accounts 2% of subject balance outstanding after 30 days.
 - (same as prior year)

Happy New Year everyone! Further to our October 23rd, 2020 meeting, and subsequent committee meetings, please be advised of the following:

- -outstanding fire incident invoices with Lac Ste. Anne County for highway responses have been paid
- -attached is the 5-year contract extension agreement between your municipality and the Town of Onoway. <u>Please execute and return two copies, and we will return to you one fully executed copy for your records.</u> This same agreement is being executed between each member municipality and the Town of Onoway.
- -for your information, we have also attached a copy of the 5-year contract extension agreement between North West Fire Rescue and the Town of Onoway
- -a copy of the approved 2021 Budget which includes both the North West Fire Rescue
 contract costs, and the annual admin.\operating costs, along with the revised parcel
 counts. You will find your municipality's 2021 total costs on page 2 of this document,
 high-lighted in yellow, for your budget purposes. As in past years, your municipality
 will receive quarterly invoices from the Town of Onoway for these 2021 costs.

We are continuing to work with the Province on utilization of our AFRRCS radios, and we have confirmed a date of Wednesday January 27 early afternoon for a meeting (exact time

and location/platform will be shared closer to – and will be dependent on AHS restrictions at the time). Please mark your calendars for Jan. 27!

On a final note, currently our municipalities as well as Lac Ste. Anne County receive their 9-1-1 dispatch services through Parkland County Emergency Call Centre. Lac Ste. Anne County is considering moving this service from Parkland County to Yellowhead County. We understand the County is considering this from both a financial point of view (will save approx.. \$0.70/capita) as well as service delivery (will receive a much broader and arguably better level of dispatch service). If the County does change their dispatch service provider we will be encouraging our municipalities to consider the change as well. More information will be shared as it becomes available, and as County reps will be at the Jan. 27 AFRRCS meeting maybe we can take a few minutes then to further discuss dispatch services.

THIS AGREEMENT is made effective the 1st day of January, 2021.

BETWEEN:

THE TOWN OF ONOWAY

of Box 540, Onoway, AB TOE 1V0 a municipality incorporated under the laws of the Province of Alberta, (hereinafter referred to as the "Town")

-AND-

THE VILLAGE OF ALBERTA BEACH

Of Box 278, Alberta Beach, AB. TOE 0A0 a municipality incorporated under the laws of the Province of Alberta, (hereinafter referred to as "the Village")

(Each a "Party" and collectively the "Parties" as the context requires)

BACKGROUND

WHEREAS the Town and the Village signed a Fire Services Agreement effective as of December 31st, 2015 (the "Fire Services Agreement");

AND WHEREAS paragraph 3 of the Fire Services Agreement provided that, at the Town's option, the Term of the Fire Services Agreement could be extended for a further term of five (5) additional years on the same terms with the exception of the fee schedule for the Fire Services;

AND WHEREAS the Town exercised its option to extend the term of the Fire Services Agreement for a further five (5) years, with such extended term being for the period January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2025 (the "Extended Term");

AND WHEREAS the Parties have worked cooperatively and in good faith to determine the fee schedule for the Extended Term and the purpose of this Agreement is to confirm such fee schedule;

AND WHEREAS the Town has contracted with North West as its Fire Services Organization to provide firefighting and related services to, and on behalf of, the Town to other municipalities including the Village. As a result, the fee schedule attached outlines the fees applicable to each of the municipalities to which the Town provides Fire Services (the "Member Municipalities"), including the Village;

Notice of Motion

Background:

The province has changed the rules governing Municipal Commissions. As a result, the TVRSSC is undertaking a bylaw review to ensure the Commission meets all of its legal requirements. It is prudent for the village to provide comment on the review and recommend changes that better reflect the villages and commissions needs moving forward.

After reviewing the bylaws, the following are potential areas for improvement;

- 1. Service Fees currently the percentage of costs paid by each municipality is dictated in the bylaw with no ability to adjust based on new development. Because the Commission is unable to bill as a utility based on actual usage, the fees paid by each municipality should be based on a formula or principle as opposed to a fixed percentage. The fee structure should be put into a schedule that would be reviewed regularly. Additionally, tax exempt properties do not contribute to the cost of sewer operations. These amenities (eg. Alliance Church, School, Agliplex, Senior's Center) service all 3 municipalities, therefore the sewer costs associated with these properties (based on the formula) should be borne by all 3 municipalities.
- 2. Chair and Vice Chair Bylaw 7-2015 states that the chair and vice chair shall be appointed for a 1 year term based on a majority voter by the board. This contradicts with Bylaw 5-02 which states that the board shall appoint a chair and vice chair for a one year term on a rotating basis amongst the municipalities. The TVRSSC has been utilizing a rotating chair. This has the potential to lead to a lack of consistency, accountability, and leadership. The chair and vice chair should be appointed annually based on a majority vote.
- 3. Representation on the Board When the Commission was established all 3 municipalities were summer villages. Since then, Alberta Beach has grown and become a village. As a result, the board no longer reflects the municipalities that make up the commission. Alberta Beach pays 63% of the operating costs of the commission, but only has 33% of the vote. A more equitable board structure should be established.
- 4. Change in municipal structure with both Alberta Beach and Sunset Point submitting ACP grant applications to look into potential municipal restructuring, the board must consider what will happen in the case of municipal restructuring. Specifically, the board should consider what will happen should a municipality dissolve into or amalgamate with a municipality that is not a member of the TVRSSC.

Motion: That Alberta Beach sends a letter to the TVRSSC outlining the changes (as presented or amended) that the village would like made during the TVRSSC bylaw review.
