Dear Mayor Tracy:

Thank you for your letter on behalf of the Town of Onoway and nine other municipalities, regarding medical first response (MFR) and co-response by fire services on emergency medical services (EMS) calls.

As you stated, with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, Alberta Health Services (AHS) made a decision to cease dispatching MFR agencies to non-life-threatening events. This step was taken to limit the number of resources dispatched to non-critical events (hence reducing potential front-line exposures), and to ensure the integrity of personal protective equipment (PPE) supply.

MFR agencies are still dispatched to life-threatening events (Delta and Echo calls), and may receive co-response requests from EMS as needed (e.g. for lift assists). MFR is not EMS and therefore not part of the health system; instead, MFR is an optional public safety service provided by municipalities, and funded through municipal budgets.

As you are aware, many MFR agencies are enrolled in the provincial MFR program administered by AHS EMS. These individual agencies have agreed with AHS to respond to certain call types, which vary among the agencies.

AHS understands there may be situations, for a variety of reasons, where an agency is not available to respond and assist EMS. One of the principles of the MFR Program is that MFR event response is voluntary and provided so long as the agency has the capacity to do so. Agencies can choose to withdraw their enrollment with the MFR program if they no longer wish to provide this assistance.

The decision to limit MFR response to Delta and Echo calls was made by AHS and implemented by the EMS dispatch system. Information about the new policy, which remains in place following the end of the public health emergency, is available on AHS' website for the MFR program at <u>albertamfr.ca</u>, and is also contained in AHS EMS' COVID-19 Interim Guidance document issued to EMS practitioners.

Re: North West Fire Rescue - Onoway Ltd - Medical First Response (MFR)

In reference to the above noted, please be advised that I am writing on behalf of the Town of Onoway and 9 other municipalities, being the Village of Alberta Beach and the Summer Villages of Castle Island, Nakamun Park, Ross Haven, Silver Sands, South View, Sunset Point, Val Quentin and Yellowstone. These municipalities have an agreement for the provision of fire services within our 10 municipal boundaries with North West Fire Rescue — Onoway Ltd. We also have a mutual aid agreement with Lac Ste. Anne County for the provision of fire services, which includes medical first response (MFR).

Our agreement with North West Fire Rescue – Onoway Ltd. includes medical first responses at no cost to the municipalities or to the individual to which they responded (the patient). We commenced this agreement with North West Fire Rescue – Onoway Ltd. in January 2016 and I can advise you of the following stats specifically for medical first responses in our first 4 years:

2016:	83	\$46,857.50
2017:	50	\$30,194.77
2018:	73	\$40.091.50
2019:	109	\$50,267.12

We are concerned with the decision to change the criteria for MFR dispatch whereby a notification is sent only in the instances of Delta and Echo level calls. Our rural municipalities disagree with a one size fits all approach as a response to COVID-19 spread. This decision doesn't consider lengthy ambulance response times that we face in rural Alberta.

The notification from the MFR Program also mentioned that MFR response may be reduced further --- this is our main concern. We strongly advocate for Delta and Echo calls to continue to dispatch MFR. While we all recognize the authority that the Government of Alberta has with respect to this matter, local government concerns need to be heard and we do not believe sufficient consultation has occurred. The 30 minute phone call with MFR agencies on March 18, 2020 had no context and each participating agency was asked to answer 3 questions, prior to the decision to make this change.

Before any other decisions are made, we respectfully request meaningful consultation. Thank you.

COVID-19 Status

Cases in Alberta

As of August 12, a total of 11,969 people in Alberta have been confirmed with COVID-19, with 1,036 active cases. Two weeks prior, on July 29, Alberta's active case count was 1,388. The average number of daily cases confirmed between August 6-12 is 97, compared to 84 the previous week, a 15 per cent increase. As of August 12, 50 people are in hospital with the virus, with 12 of those in an intensive care unit. In all, 10,713 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19 since August 12.

We are saddened to see COVID-19 continue to take the lives of Albertans. Since the COVID-19 outbreak began, 220 Albertans have died of causes related to the virus; 153 (or 70 per cent) of deaths have been in long-term care facilities or supportive living sites. As always, we offer our condolences to the families and loved ones of these individuals, and send our support to the caregivers who have lost patients to COVID-19

As of August 12, a total of 793,114 COVID-19 tests have been completed in Alberta since the start of the pandemic. In the past week 57,743 tests were completed, an average of 8,249 per day.

Currently, Alberta Health has designated six out of 142 regions in the province as being under watch status, meaning they have 50 or more active COVID-19 cases for every 100,000 people. See the Government of Alberta's interactive COVID-19 case map for details.

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

This data tracks the number of employees and physicians with AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) tested for COVID-19. The data includes the number of positive tests and those confirmed to have been exposed in the workplace.

As of August 12:

- 43,082 (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19, with 359 (or 0.83 per cent) testing positive.
- Of the 359 people who tested positive, 64 (or 17.8 per cent) were infected in the workplace; the source of infection for 67 of the 359 positive results is still being investigated.
- 2,748 physicians (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19, with 35 (or 1.27 per cent) testing positive.
- Of the 35 physicians who tested positive, three (or 8.6 per cent) were infected through workplace exposure; the source of infection for one of the positive results is still being investigated.

Things You Need to Know

Verna's Weekly Video Message: COVID-19 Fatigue

Every day, I (Dr. Verna Yiu) hear about the efforts being made to protect the health of Albertans and keep us on the right track with a focus on the future after COVID-19. But this has been hard work, and I understand how difficult it can be to balance other priorities at work and at home. We know COVID-19 fatigue is real and has taken its toll on all of us. It's important we all continue to take care of our physical and mental health for the weeks and months to come.

Returning to Alberta After Visiting Abroad

At this time, the Government of Canada is <u>recommending against non-essential international travel</u>. When Canadian citizens enter Canada from abroad, they must adhere to relevant measures in the federal *Quarantine Act* that require an isolation period of 14 days upon arrival. There is also a Provincial Order under the Public Health Act. Exemptions per the terms of both federal recommendations and the Provincial Order are required in order for an individual to be exempt from quarantine in Alberta.

In relation to exemptions for physicians and healthcare workers, although the federal Order contemplates scenarios where a licensed healthcare professional may need to enter Canada and provide health services, this does not extend to those returning from non-essential travel, and it restricts the healthcare professional by prohibiting them for caring for people 65 years of age or older. Because this is already detailed in the Federal Order, the Government of Alberta will not be issuing provincial quarantine exemptions for anyone returning from non-essential travel outside of Canada.

It is important for all physicians and healthcare workers deemed essential by the Alberta government, to keep this in mind when contemplating non-essential travel plans.

All Albertans choosing to travel internationally at this time will be subject to the mandatory 14-day isolation period upon their return.

Updated COVID-19 Relaunch Playbook

The <u>COVID-19 Relaunch Playbook</u> has been updated with new resources and information to support leaders and staff through our ongoing pandemic response. The updated playbook contains new resources for staff, including additional information on how to ensure your safety and well-being whether you are continuing to work from home, returning to the workplace, or remaining on-site.

While this document has been developed for AHS staff and leaders, we have made it available on our external website to aid other organizations who are developing their own return-to-office guides.


Bursaries for Students Working in Northern Alberta

Construction begins on foundation-funded enhancements to Canmore continuing care Long term care residents in Canmore are one step closer to having a place that they can say "Feels Like Home" now that renovations have begun on the enhancement project of the Golden Eagle View Long-term Care Unit at the Canmore General Hospital.

The enhancement project will create a more modern, residential look and feel, while maintaining the mountain character of Canmore that residents feel familiar with. Construction of Phase 1 of the enhancements began on July 13 and includes the dining room, bathrooms, hair salon and the administration office. The focal point of the upgrade will be the creation of a sun room/sitting lounge in the dining area where residents and their families will be able to enjoy breathtaking views and lots of sunshine, thanks to new panoramic windows, and a new fireplace.

The project is being funded entirely by donors to The Canmore and Area Health Care Foundation's "Feels Like Home" campaign, which has met the fundraising goal of \$1,500,000 to fund construction of the unit. Read more here.

"One skill I've found especially beneficial is learning more about food nutrition labels and what it means for your body. I feel much more knowledgeable and confident in making healthy meal choices."





COVID-19 Status

Cases in Alberta

As of Sept. 2, a total of 14,310 people in Alberta have tested positive for COVID-19, with 1,415 cases currently active. Two weeks ago, Alberta's active case count was 1,144. The average number of daily new cases confirmed for week ending Sept. 2 is 143, compared to 102 the previous week. This is a 40 per cent increase.

Currently, 46 people are in hospital with the virus and nine of them are in an intensive care unit. In all, 12,653 Albertans have recovered from COVID-19.

We are saddened to see COVID-19 continue to take Albertans lives. Since the COVID-19 outbreak began, 242 Albertans have died of causes related to the virus. Since our update last week, another five people have died. We offer our genuine sympathies to the families and loved ones of these individuals and share in their loss. We also send our support to the caregivers who have lost patients to COVID-19.

COVID-19 Testing for Healthcare Workers - The Latest Numbers

This data tracks the number of employees and physicians with AHS, Covenant Health and Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) tested for COVID-19 as well as the number of positive tests and confirmed exposures in the workplace.

As of Sept. 2:

- 46,549 (AHS, APL and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19, with 432 (or 0.93 per cent) testing positive.
- Of the 432 people who tested positive, 71 (or 16.4 per cent) were infected in the workplace. The source of infection for 102 of the 398 positive results is still being investigated.
- 2,987 physicians (AHS, APL, and Covenant combined) have been tested for COVID-19, with 37 (or 1.24 per cent) testing positive.
- Of the 37 physicians who tested positive, three (or 8.1 per cent) were infected through workplace exposure. The source of infection for three of the positive physician results is still being investigated.

APL Processes 1 Million COVID-19 Swabs

On Sept. 3, Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) processed the one millionth COVID-19 swab in Alberta. This represents about 790,000 unique Albertans having been tested for COVID-19 since late January.

This accomplishment speaks to the collaborative testing continuum. It includes our teams that created the online booking tool and our Health Link teams helping those who call for assistance and information. It also includes our frontline assessment centre workers and those transporting samples to our APL facilities, where our teams process each and every swab with care and diligence. And it includes our contact tracers, who follow up on every positive result, as well as thousands of team members from across all zones involved in the pandemic response to date.



This is a true team effort.

We began to offer COVID testing in Alberta on Jan. 23. Since then, we have progressed significantly in our approach, hitting many other milestones, including:

- January 2020: dedicated COVID testing available in Alberta
- March 2020: first Alberta case confirmed
- March 2020: online assessment tool goes live
- April 2020: testing offered to all symptomatic Albertans, and auto-dialer delivery of negative test results across the province
- May 2020: testing eligibility expanded to asymptomatic close contacts of confirmed positive cases
- June 2020: testing eligibility expanded to all Albertans, symptomatic or not
- May 2020: new online feature to a book a COVID-19 test went live as an extension to the online assessment tool
- August 2020: partnership with pharmacies including Shoppers Drug Mart, to expand accessibility
 of asymptomatic testing

We continue to drive innovation and improvements that will allow us to improve accessibility and efficiency of testing, end-to-end.

Health Link Receives More than a Million Calls

More than one million people have called Health Link since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared in mid-March. That's an average of more than 5,500 calls a day to the provincewide 24/7 telephone information and advice line. The milestone shatters normal averages, about 750,000 callers a year and between 2,000 and 2,500 callers a day.

Calls to Health Link began growing in January when reports from around the world noted a new virus, COVID-19. As the pandemic unfolded in March, callers dialed 811 by the tens of thousands. Increasingly anxious Albertans made more 248,000 calls to Health Link that month, with a peak of 12,000 on a single day. Callers focused on questions about whether it was safe to go out, COVID-19's signs and symptoms, where and when they could be tested and how could they isolate.



By then, all hands were on deck. Health Link received assistance from many areas across AHS and in any given 24-hour period pulled in some 275 extra staff from multiple departments.

Even in the face of continued high call volumes, Health Link has taken on many new roles and initiatives. Among them: the physician support line, the 844 Coordinated Early Identification and Response Line, negative test result notification and collaborating in the implementation of the Rehabilitation Advice Line. As well, this week the Addictions and Mental Health Helpline moved back under the umbrella of Health Link. The service supports Albertans with mental health and addictions needs, an area of increasing need during the pandemic.

Health Link is currently answering about 40,000 calls a week.

AHS launches parking app at the QEII Hospital (Grande Prairie) and Northern Lights Regional Health Centre (Fort McMurray)

The AHS Parking app allows visitors and patients to pay for parking using their mobile devices, receive alerts when their parking time is about to expire and extend or stop their parking without having to go back to a meter. AHS developed this app in response to visitors and patients who told us they wanted a more convenient way to pay for parking at AHS sites, especially in the cold winter months or for times when they are unsure how long their hospital visit may last.

AHS also encourages the use of the <u>AHS parking app</u> as a contactless option when paying for parking. As part of routine Infection Prevention and Control measures, AHS Parking Services has already enhanced cleaning, and will continue to regularly clean all parking payment machines.

Download the free AHS Parking app from the App Store and Google Play.

Public parking rates using the app are the same as found on AHS parking meters. Coins and cash will still be accepted at AHS parking meters and parking offices.

No healthcare funding or tax dollars are used in the construction or maintenance of most AHS parkades. Parking fees are therefore required to allow us to maintain safe and accessible parking, while ensuring healthcare dollars are focused on providing the best patient care possible.

Fall Immunization Programs Continue

Public Health routine immunization programs are considered essential and must continue in order to protect our population. Therefore, while some adjustments to immunization programs have been made during the COVID-19 pandemic, all routine childhood immunization appointments have continued to proceed as booked, and new appointments continue to be taken.

When schools were closed in March 2020 school immunization series that had been in progress were suspended. AHS Public Health will work with schools as they reopen to catch up immunizations for the 2019-2020 school cohort and plan immunization for the 2020-2021 school cohort. The goal is to complete immunizations for both these cohorts by the end of the 2020-2021 school year.

Timelines for immunization during the 2020-2021 school year will vary across zones and schools. Specific information regarding immunization schedules can be found here https://www.immunizealberta.ca/i-want-immunize/when-immunize.

During times of pandemic, such as COVID-19, we are reminded of how important it is to utilize the immunizations that protect us against vaccine-preventable diseases like measles and pertussis that are still present globally and locally. Programs and services provided by Public Health continue to follow physical/social distancing principles. We greatly appreciate the understanding of Albertans as we continue to triage staff and resources to respond to the most urgent and critical needs.

Education for Your Health

Goodbye Mealtime Struggles now online

Parents and guardians of children aged one to five years in central zone are invited to participate in

Goodbye Mealtime Struggles workshops.

Led by a registered dietitian and pediatric occupational therapist, the Goodbye Mealtime Struggles workshops offer tips and support in dealing with young picky eaters. Participants can call their community health centres to register, and will receive a Zoom link one day before the workshop.

Classes are moving online in order to follow public health guidelines on physical distancing during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Better Choices, Better Health workshops

People living with chronic pain are encouraged to take part in a free, six-week series of <u>Better Choices</u>. <u>Better Health</u> workshops. These workshops help participants take control of their health and improve their quality of life.

Workshops are led by people who have experience with a long-term health condition(s) in their own life. Together, participants and leaders learn from each other by sharing their experiences and exploring possible solutions.

Virtual workshops will be held on Wednesdays from September 23 to October 28, 2020 between 1:30 pm to 4:00 pm online using the virtual platform Zoom. To register or learn more, visit the website.

Free Classes for those living with Diabetes

Alberta Health Services (AHS) is offering free classes to individuals living with pre-diabetes, Type 2 diabetes, as well as those looking to prevent diabetes.

Tips for Eating: Pre-Diabetes and Diabetes is a new class in the Calgary Zone that covers topics such as healthy meal patterns, the role of carbohydrates and fiber in health, and physical activity.

The two-hour class is available through Zoom or by telephone, and is led by a registered dietitian through the AHS Alberta Healthy Living Program (AHLP). The AHLP provides information, education, skills and support to help improve the health and quality of life to those living with chronic conditions in communities throughout Alberta.



I am writing to share information about proposed amendments to the regional services commission (RSC) framework within the *Municipal Government Act* that were recently introduced in the Legislative Assembly as part of the Government of Alberta's overall red tape reduction strategy.

The changes are intended to streamline the approval framework and will allow RSCs to provide services with greater flexibility. We expect these changes to have minimal substantive impact on the governance and day-to-day operations of Alberta's existing 75 RSCs.

Please find attached a fact sheet that outlines the proposed changes. If passed, the legislative amendments will come into effect on September 1, 2020.

Regional Services Commissions Streamlining Approvals

Amendments to Part 15.1 of the *Municipal Government Act* (*MGA*) related to regional services commissions (RSCs) will come into force on September 1, 2020.

Why are changes being made to RSCs?

As part of the government's efforts to reduce red tape, the changes will reduce the required amount of provincial approvals for RSCs. The changes will ensure RSCs are accountable to their member municipal authorities and will operate in a more streamlined manner.

The operations of Alberta's existing 75 RSCs will continue with minimal impact and, going forward, will govern the services they provide without the need for additional provincial approvals.

What are the key changes?

Provincial approval will no longer be required for:

- changes to RSC services;
- changes to board of director bylaws;
- addition and removal of members or non-member municipal authority customers;
- disposal of assets; and
- RSC disestablishment.

For the establishment of a new RSC, Provincial Cabinet approval, through an Order in Council, is also no longer required. However, the Minister must be notified within 60 days of municipal authorities passing resolutions to establish an RSC. The RSC is established once a Ministerial Order is issued listing the Commission.

To supplement the governance of RSCs, the MGA will provide a list of required bylaws RSCs must have.

What is the legislative impact?

The changes will result in amendments to Part 15.1 of the *MGA*; however, much will remain the same in substance.

Eighty individual regulations, including the 75 existing establishing regulations, will be repealed as of September 1, 2020.

All existing RSCs will continue as though they were established under the new framework. This will be accomplished through a ministerial order that will be maintained by Municipal Affairs.

How will the powers and duties of RSCs be affected?

The powers and duties of RSCs will <u>not</u> significantly change.

- RSCs will continue to have the legal status of a corporation.
- RSCs will continue to have natural person powers, except as limited by the MGA or an RSC's bylaws.
- RSCs will continue to be eligible for capital borrowing through the Alberta Capital Finance Authority.
- RSCs will continue to have the ability to acquire or expropriate land.
- Changes will have no resulting impact to existing RSC service areas, membership, or non-member customers.

What are the governance implications for RSCs?

The members, board of directors, and chair of all existing commissions will continue according to the RSC's bylaws (or ministerial order in the cases of recently established regional services commissions still in transition).

RSCs will be subject to Sections 197 and 199 of the



MGA, which govern meetings held by municipal councils (including electronic meetings). This change will provide greater clarity and consistency for meeting standards.

Existing RSC bylaws and resolutions will continue unless repealed, amended, or replaced by the board of directors. RSCs must ensure adopted bylaws address:

- the services provided;
- administration;
- the process for changing directors of the board and the chair, as well as determining the terms of office;
- the process for adding and removing members;
- the fees to be charged for services provided to its customers or to any class of its customers;
- the disposal of assets; and
- the terms for disestablishment, including the treatment of assets and liabilities.

RSCs should also ensure they obtain a copy of their establishing regulation (or other legislative documents of importance) prior to their repeal on September 1, 2020, to consider transferring important elements to their bylaws. All existing regulations can be found on the <u>Alberta Queen's Printer website</u> by browsing the catalogue through alphabetical search.

What are the financial implications for RSCs?

There are minimal changes to the financial requirements of RSCs; those made intend to align the financial management of RSCs more closely with municipal financial processes.

Areas of alignment include:

- addressing financial shortfalls;
- requirements for capital budgets; and
- use of borrowed money.

Otherwise, financial provisions will remain generally the same, including, but not limited to, debt limit regulations, audited financial statements, and financial information returns.

RSCs will continue to be expected to operate on a non-profit, full cost-recovery basis. This means RSCs will continue to be prohibited from operating with the intention of making a profit or be able to distribute surplus funds to its members. If such factors exist within a regional service delivery model, other corporate structures, such as municipally controlled corporations, may be more appropriate.

What will RSCs need to do to transition?

RSCs should review and update their bylaws to comply with the requirements within one year of the amendments coming into effect. It is the responsibility of RSCs to ensure compliance with new legislation. The required compliance date is **September 1, 2021**.

Dear Chief Administrative Officer and/or Administrator:

I am writing to provide some additional clarification on the Municipal Stimulus Program (MSP). Under the program guidelines, it states: "Projects previously submitted under the MSI and/or federal GTF are not eligible for MSP funding." Previously submitted projects should be interpreted as projects submitted prior to the 2020 program year.

This means that MSP funding can be combined with 2020 MSI or GTF funded projects (whether they have been either submitted or approved). However, you will still need to attest that the project would not have otherwise proceeded in the 2020 or 2021 construction season without the MSP funding. This provides flexibility for those projects recently approved or submitted for MSI or GTF that were at risk of not proceeding due to local financial circumstances.

I would also like to remind you that the deadline for project applications is October 1. Any funding that has not been applied for by this time may be reallocated by the Minister. Additionally, all MSP funding must be expended by December 31, 2021, though the project does not need to be complete by this time if the remaining costs are funded by other sources.

The key dates below relate to finalizing the 2021 EA. We ask that your assessor report assessment revisions to the province by the required date so that the official EA reflects accurate municipal assessment data.

- Submission Date October 21, 2020 for the reporting of 2019 assessment year revisions.
- **Temporary Reporting Restrictions**: October 22 December 2, 2020 for reporting 2019 assessment year revisions.
- Issuance October 30, 2020 for the Official 2021 Equalized Assessment.

Municipal Affairs is aware that any future changes resulting from the assessment model review may impact the equalized assessment, and these impacts will be considered by government during the decision-making process.

Hello Mayors, Councillors, and CAO's,

I hope that you had an excellent summer and managed to take some time for yourself. I quite enjoyed my summer and was very happy that I could join Barry for one more day of his tour, where I was able to see a few more of our incredible communities and meet with fellow municipal leaders. In addition to the communities that I visited earlier in the summer, I had the pleasure of visiting Clive, Alix, and Delburne. I was able to meet with councillors from many other other communities as well. My biggest take away from my travels is that small communities are exceptionally innovative and resilient and we have strong partnerships. There are some really great ideas and initiatives happening. I also heard a lot of frustration from community leaders, particularly with our municipal/provincial relationship. It was really good to hear, first hand, what is happening in communities across the province.

I don't have a lot of new information, but would like to update you on a few items.

New Minister of Municipal Affairs

I am sure you have heard by now that we have a new Minister of Municipal Affairs, Minister Tracy Allard, MLA for Grande Prairie. Minister Madu is now the Minister of Justice and Solicitor General. The AUMA Executive had the pleasure of meeting the new minister this week. I found her to be very knowledgeable and engaged. The fact that she met with our executive during her first week of being a Member of Cabinet is promising.

Municipal Sustainability Program (MSP)

Yesterday the province sent an email to CAO's clarifying how the new Covid MSP funding can be used. MSP funding can be combined with 2020 MSI and GTF funds to complete a project. However, the project cannot be a project that would have proceeded in 2020 or 2021 without the new MSP funding. If you have questions on eligibility, I strongly suggest that you reach out to Municipal Affairs for clarification as the Oct 1 deadline for submissions is quickly approaching.

Assessment Model Review (AMR)

I don't have very much to share on this except that we are continuing to work on a solution with the province that is fair and equitable to both municipalities and industry, and is based on the principles of property assessment. As advised on August 5, 2020 through AUMA's Digest and on the AUMA's website, The Board of Directors of Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (herein "AUMA") hereby gives notice that at the 2020 Annual General Meeting (AGM) on September 24, 2020, the Board of Directors will be proposing the following Special Resolution to repeal and replace the current AUMA Bylaws with the amended Bylaws. The full wording for the special resolution has been included in the attached.

Also attached is a draft of the AUMA Bylaws, as they would appear if all amendments are approved at the AGM, as well as a redlined version identifying the proposed amendments.

As per the current AUMA Bylaw, a full review of the bylaw is required every subsequent year divisible by five (5). The summary of changes include:

The Board of Directors of Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (herein "AUMA") hereby gives notice that at the 2020 Annual General Meeting of the AUMA to be held September 24, 2020, the Board of Directors will be proposing the following Special Resolution to repeal and replace the current AUMA Bylaws with the amended Bylaws attached hereto as Schedule "A":

WHEREAS Section 16.01 of the current AUMA Bylaws states that "The Board of Directors or a Regular Member may propose a special resolution, as required by the *Societies Act*, R.S.A. 2000, c.S-14, or any amendments thereto, to amend these bylaws.";

AND WHEREAS the proposed amended Bylaws, attached as Schedule "A", are more comprehensive and add further clarity to certain of the provisions contained therein;

AND WHEREAS a redline compare of the Bylaws, attached as Schedule "B", highlights the revisions that are contained within the amended Bylaws as compared against the existing AUMA Bylaws;

AND WHEREAS the proposed amendment has been submitted to AUMA only after taking into consideration:

- a. AUMA's fundamental and paramount principle of ownership and control of AUMA by its Regular Members; and
- b. AUMA's tax exempt status under para. 149(1) (d.5) of the *Income Tax Act*, Canada as discussed by the Canada Revenue Agency in its letter dated March 14, 2007,

and that the proposed amendment herein will not, by its nature, content or description, compromise, modify, alter, affect or change in ay way the fundamental and paramount principle of AUMA (AUMA being owned and controlled by its Regular Members only) or AUMA's tax exempt status under para. 149(1) (d.5) of the *Income Tax Act*, Canada as same may be amended from time to time;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of Directors of AUMA proposes that a Special Resolution be passed at the Annual General Meeting of the AUMA to repeal and replace the existing AUMA Bylaws in their entirety with the Bylaws attached as Schedule "A".

ALBERTA URBAN MUNICIPALITIES ASSOCIATION

BYLAWS

Article I -- NAME AND DEFINITIONS

- 1.01 The name of the Association shall be the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association, referred to in these bBylaws as the "Association."
- **1.02** In these Bylaws, in addition to any other definitions contained herein, save where the contrary is expressed:
- (a) "Act" means the Societies Act (Alberta) and any statute that may be substituted therefor, and the regulations made thereunder, as from time to time amended, and in the case of such amendment, reference in the Bylaws shall be read as referring to the amended provisions thereof;
- (b) "appoint" includes "elect" and vice versa;
- (d) "Affiliate Member" has the meaning set forth in clause 4.02(c):
- (d) "Associate Member" has the meaning set forth in clause 4.02(b);
- (e) "Association" means the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association;
- (f) "Board" means the Board of Directors of the Association, as constituted from time to time;
- (g) "Bylaws" means these Bylaws and all other Bylaws of the Association from time to time in force and effect;
- (h) "Chief Executive Officer" means the person referred to in Article XIII hereof that is duly appointed as the chief executive officer of the Association by the Board from time to time:
- "Director" means a person who is from time to time duly elected or appointed as a Director of the Association;
- (j) "Elected Representative" means a member of the council of a Regular Member, elected pursuant to the MGA;
- "Good Standing" means a member in respect of whom the Association has received the membership fee for the current membership year or, in the case of a Regular Member, evidence of intention to pay satisfactory to the Board has been received;
- (f) "MGA" means the Municipal Government Act (Alberta) and any statute that may be substituted therefor, and the regulations made thereunder, as from time to time amended, and in the case of such amendment, reference in the Bylaws shall be read as referring to the amended provisions thereof;
- "Officers" means the officers of the Association including the elected or appointed officers that are elected or appointed by the membership as per the terms hereof, namely the President and Vice-Presidents (herein also referred to as the "elected Officers"), as well as those officers appointed by the Board, such as the Chief Executive Officer, and such other persons as would be construed as "officers" at law by reason of their senior roles of management with the Association.



- (n) "Regular Member" and "Regular Membership" have the meanings set forth in clause 4 02(a):
- (o) "Returning Officer" has the meaning set forth in clause 7.01;
- (p) "Special General Meeting" means a meeting of the membership other than the annual general meeting:
- "Special Resolution" has the meaning set forth in the Act.

Article II - PURPOSE OF BYLAWS

- 2.01 The purpose of these bBylaws is to conform to the provisions of the Societies Act, R.S.A. 2000, c. 5-14 Act and to set out how the Association will's membership, participation and leadership structures and processes to facilitate the Association's ability to provide leadership in advocating local government interests to the Provincial Government and other organizations, and for legislation and programs to the Alberta and Canadian governments and to other organizations that support effective municipal governance and municipal interests in general, and to provide services that address the needs of its membership.
- 2.02 These Bylaws establish, and shall continue to establish in each and every year of the Association's existence, a fundamental and paramount principle that the Association is owned and controlled, directly or indirectly, by the Regular Members (as referenced in Article IV) of the Association in every material way, and that the Association's Bylaws, or any other constating document of the Association, shall be interpreted by the Association's Members, any court of competent jurisdiction and any taxing authority having jurisdiction, in a manner consistent with this fundamental and paramount principle.

Article III - GENERAL

- 3.01 The Board of Directors may establish procedures for convening any meeting referred to in these Bylaws by electronic or other communication facilities including a conference telephone call, video-conferencing, facsimile, e-mail or such other technology as may become available.
- **3.02** Notwithstanding anything in these Bylaws, if by virtue of severe weather conditions, a pandemic or other emergency reason that is generally applicable, it is impossible for a quorum to participate in any scheduled or required meeting, then:
 - a) the time for undertaking any action, and
 - b) the terms of office of the Directors, President and Vice-Presidents re
 - shall be extended until the meeting can be reconvened.
- **3.03** When written notice is required to be provided under these Bylaws, the notice may be given by mail, facsimile or other electronic means which enables the recipient to review the entire text of the notice.
- 3.04 The classifications of Regular Members are Association shall comply with the governing privacy legislation to the extent it is applicable to the Association and/or its activities.

- 3.05 A reference in these Bylaws to "elected representative" means a member of the council of a Regular Member. [DRAFT NOTE: See definitions.]
- -3.06 A reference in these Bylaws to a "special general meeting" means a meeting of the membership held at a time other than the annual general meeting.[Draft Note: See definitions.]

Article IV - MEMBERSHIP

- 4.01 Any municipality, organization or business which:
 - a) desires to further the Objectone or more Objects of the Association,
 - b) qualifies under a membership category described in clause 4.02, and
 - c) pays the relevant membership fee, may become a member of the Association, but subject to Board approval where clauses 4.02(a)ii, and 4.05 are applicable, and subject to clause 4.09 as it pertains to reinstatement.

4.02 The categories of membership are:

- a) REGULAR MEMBERSHIP, such members being referred to as "Regular Members", which shall be available to:
 - i. any €city, ∓town, ¥village, Ssummer ¥village, or Sspecialized ₩municipality located in Alberta; and
 - ii. after July 1, 2007, upon Board approval, any successor municipality of a Regular Member referred to in subsection (i), above, including any Mmunicipal Delistrict or €county if the Mmunicipal Delistrict or €county is the successor municipality thereof;
- b) ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP, such members being referred to as "Associate Members", which shall be available to:
 - i. any municipality other than a municipality referred to in Articleclause 4.02(a)(i);;
 - any organization wholly owned by one or more municipalities that are eligible to be Regular Members or Associate Members, any municipally-related non-profit organization or special purpose board or commission;
 - any municipally-related non-profit organization or special purpose board or commission that holdsprovides a reciprocal membership that has been approved by the Board-of Directors; and
 - iv. any other local authority or related non-profit organization incorporated pursuant to provincial legislation:
- affiliate MEMBERSHIP, such members being referred to as "Affiliate Members", which shall be available to any company, organization or individual, in or outside of the Province of Alberta.



- 4.03 The classifications of Regular Members for the purposes of determining Board representation under Articles VII and VIII are as follows:
 - a) cities with populations over 500,000;
 - b) cities with populations up to 500,000;
 - c) towns:
 - d) villages; and
 - e) summer villages. [Draft Note: Moved from 3.04]
- 4.04 For purposes of determining membership classification, a Sspecialized Mmunicipality, Mmunicipal Ddistrict or County which shall be classified according to its population such that if it has a population equal to or greater than the population thresholds set out in the Municipal Government Act, R.S.A. 2000, c. M. 26, or any amendments thereto, for a MGA in relation to:
 - a) a city, it shall be considered a city;
 - b) a town, it shall be considered a town;
 - c) a village, it shall be considered a village; and
 - d) if less than the population set out for a village, it shall be considered a summer village.
- 4.944.05 The Townsite of Redwood Meadows, the Special Areas Board and an improvement <u>Pdistrict</u> are eligible for inclusion, <u>upon Board approval</u>, in the classification of Regular Membership appropriate to its population.

4.05 Repealed.

- **4.06** (a1) Subject to sub-clause (b2), any member may withdraw from membership in the Association at any time by notice in writing.
 - (b2) A Regular Member which wishes to withdraw from membership in the Association shall provide at least <u>twelve</u> (12) months' notice in writing to the Association accompanied by a certified copy of the resolution of council.
 - (3) Any notice of withdrawal of membership shall be presented to the Board of Directors.
 - (44) A member which withdraws from membership is not entitled to reimbursement of any membership fees.
- 4.07 The membership year is the calendar year.
- 4.08 A "member in good standing" is a member in respect of whom the Association has received the membership fee for the current membership year or in the case of a Regular Member evidence of intention to pay satisfactory to the Board of Directors has been received.

[Draft Note: See definitions - "Good Standing"]

4.09—For purposes of this section, "Association activities" means all activities of the Association under its mandate other than business services, and "business services" means any product or service provided, for the purposes of these Bylaws, shall mean the provision, directly or indirectly, of certain products or services by the Association to its members either directly or indirectlywhich shall typically be through a service delivery entity owned by or related to the Association. With respect to access to these activities and services:

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- a) Regular Members Regular Members are entitled to participate in all Association activities and business services, including the right to vote as set forth in Article V₃
- b) Associate Members Associate Members are entitled to participate in business services and may, on conditions set by the Board from time to time, be entitled to participate in some or all Association activities, not including but, for greater clarity, such participation shall not include the right to vote: on Association matters;
- Affiliate Members Affiliate members are not entitled to participate in business services but may, on conditions set by the Board from time to time, be entitled to participate in some or all Association activities, not including but, for greater clarity, such participation shall not include the right to vote on Association matters.
- e) 4.09 If a member ceases to be a member in gGood sStanding:

 Eligible Members (Regular and Associate Member Categories) Municipalities (a)

 municipalities or organizations eligible for thethat are Regular or Associate Membership categories Members shall not be entitled to participate in Association activities when not a member-in good standing nor have any voting rights under Article V but shall be entitled to participate in the Association's business services:
 - 4.10 , at the expiration of(b) for a period exceeding six (6) months from the date for which the membership fee was due, the member shallmay be automatically expelled from the Association and thereafterupon approval thereof by the Board, effective immediately upon notice from the Association to the Regular Member. Thereafter the member shall not be entitled to participate in association activities or enjoy membership privileges until the member has been brought into gGood sStanding and reinstated byupon approval of the Board of the Directors.

Article V - VOTING RIGHTS AT MEMBERS' MEETINGS

- 5.01 The persons entitled to votevoting rights of a Regular Member in Good Standing of the Association at any annual general meeting or sSpecial gGeneral mMeeting are those elected representatives in attendance whose municipalities are Regular Members of the Association in good standing shall be equal to one (1) vote for and by each Elected Representative of such Regular Member that is in attendance at such meeting.
- 5.02 Each person qualified to vote at any annual general meeting or special general meeting shall be entitled to one vote. For greater clarity, subject to clause 5.01, the maximum number of votes available to a Regular Member shall depend on the number of Elected Representatives it has on its council at the relevant time.

Article VI - NOMINATIONS

- **6.01** Nominations for <u>Directors and elected Officers</u> shall be conducted in accordance with the election procedures established by the Returning Officer, <u>designated pursuant to clause 7.01</u>.
- 6.02 To be eligible for nomination, a person must at a minimum:
 - a) be an ellected Representative of a Regular Member in good standing,

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- b) submit a completed nomination in the form prescribed by the Returning Officer, and
- c) be nominated by at least two other effected representatives of Regular Members in eGood sStanding,and
 - d) <u>Further</u>, for <u>the President or Vice-President positions</u>, <u>havethe nomination must be approved by a motion of the council of the nominee's municipality, village or summer village. Regular Member that the nominee is an Elected Representative of,</u>
- **6.03** A municipality shall not have more than one effected representative serving in a Director position, except for the cities of Edmonton and Calgary. In the event more than one effected representative from a municipality is nominated, the municipality's council needs to approve a motion for only one nominee.
- **6.04** The persons making a nomination and the person being nominated must be eligible to vote in the election for which the nomination is being made.
- 6.05 The persons eligible for nomination as Vice-President for a classification are the persons who are Association shall have five (5) Vice-Presidents who shall be elected or appointed as Directors for that classification provided that, for purposes of electing a Vice-President according to a classification system that is slightly modified from that set forth in clause 4.03, with the applicable classifications for which a Vice-President shall be appointed, or elected being as follows:
 - a) the City of Calgary shall be considered as one classification;
 - b) the City of Edmonton shall be considered as one classification, and;
 - c) cities with populations up to 500,000;
 - d) towns; and
 - e) Yvillages and 5summer Yvillages shall be considered one.

A person eligible for nomination as Vice-President for a classification must also be elected or appointed as a Director in the classification.

6.06 The President shall also be a Director but not a Director that has been appointed or elected pursuant to clause 8.02 in relation to a classification.

Article VII - ELECTIONS

- **7.01** The Board of Directors shall appointdesignate a person as to be the "Returning Officer" who shall be responsible for the fair and proper conduct of elections.
- **7.02** The Returning Officer shall establish and publish election procedures in accordance with these bBylaws and any applicable policies and procedures adopted by the Board from time to time.
- 7.03 Elections of Directors and elected Officers shall be held at the annual general meeting.
- **7.04** The Regular Members eligible to vote on the election of theor appointment of the Directors and elected Officers through their respective Elected Representatives are as follows:
 - a) President shall be conducted among all For the President of the Association, all persons, that meet the voting requirements under Article V:

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- b) Vice-Presidents shall be conducted among all of the persons from. For each Vice-President, only those persons that: (i) are Elected Representatives of Regular Members that fit within the relevant classification, as established in Clause 3.04set forth in clause 6.05, for which the Vice-President is being elected, and (ii) that otherwise meet the voting regularements under Article V;
- c) Directors shall be conducted among all of the persons from. For each Director, only those persons that: (i) are Elected Representatives of Regular Members; (ii) where in relation to a classification, only those Elected Representatives of Regular Members that fit within the relevant classification as established in Clause 3.04set forth in clause 4.03, and, if a town or village, the electoral zone if applicable who are eligible to vote and are in attendance at the meeting-for which the Director is being elected, and (iii) that otherwise meet the voting requirements under Article V.

Article VIII - BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

- 8.01 The Association shall have a Board of Directors consisting of
 - 14 fifteen (15) Directors. For greater clarity, one of whom shall also be the President.
- 8.02 The number of Directors representing each classification is:
 - two (2) Directors appointed by the City of Calgary, one of whom shall be designated by the City as Vice-President for Calgary;
 - b) two (2) Directors appointed by the City of Edmonton, one of whom shall be designated by the City as Vice-President for Edmonton;
 - three (3) Directors representing Ccities with populations up to 500,000;
 - b)d) three (3) Directors representing Flowns;
 - e)e) three (3) Directors representing \(\forall \) illages;
 - d)f) one (1) Director representing S₂ummer ¥villages;
 - for an aggregate total of fourteen (14) Directors elected or appointed in relation to a classification,
- 8.03 The Directors representing ‡towns and ½illages shall be elected byaccording to electoral zones designated by the Board.
- **8.04** For purposes of establishingThe Board shall establish the electoral zones, the Board of Directors shall group for towns and villages as follows:
 - a) Ttowns shall be grouped into three zones, designated as towns east, west and south, and otherwise in such a manner that the number of Ttowns in each zone is approximately the same.
 - b) Villages shall likewise be grouped into three zones, designated as villages east, west and south, in such a manner that the number of villages in each zone is approximately the

- 8.06 The termterms of office for the positions of Directors and elected Officers are as follows:

 - c) Director is+Two (2) years.

For greater clarity, Directors and elected Officers may be re-elected for one or more successive terms, provided they are otherwise eligible for the position.

- 8.07 (a1) The term of office for the following Director positions shall begin in odd numbered years:

 - ii. one (1) Edmonton Director:
 - iii. <u>two (2) for Ecities with populations</u> up to 500,000 population
 - iv: Ttowns Ecast

 - (b2) The term of office for the following Director positions shall begin in even numbered years:
 - i. one (1) Calgary Director:
 - ii. one (1) Edmonton Director;
 - iii. one (1) for cities with populations up to 500,000 population;
 - iv. ∓towns ₩west and South;
 - v. <u>Yvillages Ee</u>ast and <u>Ww</u>est.
- 8.08 (a1) A President who is no longer an e<u>E</u>lected <u>r</u>epresentative immediately ceases to be President and a member of the Board-of-Directors.
 - (b2) A Director who is no longer an eflected representative immediately ceases to be a member of the Board of Directors.
 - (e3) In the case of either (a1) or (b2) above, if the period until the next annual general meeting is longer than three (3) months, the position shall be deemed to be vacant.
- **8.09** Should the legal municipal status change of the municipality of which a Director is an executed #Representative:
 - a) the Director is eligible to remain in the position until the next annual general meeting,
 - b) if the term of office for the position does not expire at the end of the next annual general meeting a by-election shall be held at the next annual general meeting to fill the position for the remainder of the term.
- **8.10** Should the office of the President become vacant, the remaining Board of Directors shall forthwith appoint a member of the Board to serve as President until the next annual general meeting.

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- **8.11** (a1) Should a vacancy occur in a Director position other than a Director appointed by the City of Calgary or the City of Edmonton or in a Vice-President position, then:
 - (a) the Board may appoint a replacement to serve until the next annual generalmeeting, and
 - ii. (b) if the term of office for the position does not expire at the end of the next annual general meeting a by-election shall be held at the next annual general meeting to fill the position for the remainder of the term.
 - (b2) Should a vacancy occur in a Director position or a Vice-President position appointed by the City of Calgary or the City of Edmonton, the relevant city may appoint a replacement for the remainder of the term of office of the position.
- **8.12** A person appointed to fill a vacancy in any position must be eligible for election to that position if an election were held.
- **8.13** In carrying out the <u>rights and</u> responsibilities of a Director <u>or Officer</u>, every Director <u>and Officer</u> of the Association shall:
 - a) act honestly and in good faith with a view to the best interests of the Association,
 - b) exercise the care, diligence and skill that a reasonably prudent person would exercise in comparable circumstances,
 - c) comply with the Societies Act (Alberta) and any applicable law including the Act, its regulations under it and as with the and objects, bBylaws, policies of and procedures adopted by the Association,
 - maintain the confidentiality of all Association information given to the such Director or Officer that is considered confidential, except in the following circumstances:
 - the confidential information is or subsequently enters the public domain through no action of the Director or Officer; or
 - ii. the confidential information is required to be disclosed by law, and if the Director or Officer receives Association information that is considered confidential from his or her:
 - iii. such person's own independent sources; or
 - iv. any third party not under an obligation to keep the information Confidential, the Director will disclose to the Board that he or shesuch information has been received that information.
- 8.14 A member of the Board of Directors ceases to be a Director if:
 - the person is disqualified from Council pursuant to Section 174(1) of the Municipal Government Act; R.S.A. 2000, c. M. 26, or any amendments thereto MGA, or
 - b) the person misses three consecutive regular meetings of the Board, unless authorized by resolution prior to the conclusion of the missed third consecutive regular meeting of upon approval by the Board of the Director's removal, effective immediately upon notice from the Association to the Director.
- 8.15 The Board of Directors may, by resolution passed by at least three fourths (3/4) of the votes cast declare that a Board Member has ceased to be a Board member. The provisions of

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Article by those eligible to vote, remove a Director from the Board effective as of the date of the resolution or such later date as resolved by the Board. The provisions of clause 9.05 regarding notice and an opportunity to be heard apply to a resolution under this Article clause.

ARTICLE IX - DISQUALIFICATION OF BOARD MEMBERS DIRECTORS

9.01 In this Article:

- a) <u>"Board member"Director</u>'s family" means the <u>Board memberDirector</u>'s spouse <u>or adult interdependent partner</u>, the <u>Board memberDirector</u>'s children, the parents of the <u>Board memberDirector</u> and the parents of the <u>Board memberDirector</u>'s spouse <u>or interdependent partner</u>;
- b) "spouse" means:
 - includes a party to a relationship between a man and a woman who are living together on a bona fide domestic basis, and the spouse of a married person, and
 - ii. does not include a spouse who Is living <u>separate and</u> apart from the other spouse if the spouses have separated pursuant to a written separation agreement or if their support obligations and family property have been dealt with by a court order.

9.02 (1) A member of the Board of Directors has a pecuniary interest in a matter if:

- a) the matter could monetarily affect the <u>Board memberDirector</u> or an employer of the <u>Board memberDirector</u>, or
- b) the <u>Board memberDirector</u> knows or should know that the matter could monetarily affect the <u>Board member'Director</u>'s family.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1), a person is monetarily affected by a matter if the matter monetarily affects:
- a) the person directly,
- a corporation, other than a <u>distributing</u> corporation the shares of which are traded on a stock exchange(as defined under the governing legislation), in which the person is a shareholder, director or officer,
- a <u>distributing</u> corporation, the shares of which are traded on a stock exchange, in which
 the person beneficially owns voting shares carrying at least 10% of the voting rights
 attached to the voting shares of the corporation or of which the person is a director or
 officer, or
- d) a partnership or firm of which the person is a member.
- (3) A Board member Director does not have a pecuniary interest by reason only of any interest;
- a) that the <u>Board memberDirector</u> or a member of the <u>Board member'Director</u>'s family may have by reason of being appointed by the Board as a director of a company incorporated for the purpose of carrying on business for and on behalf of the Association or by reason of being appointed as the representative of the Board on another body;
- that the <u>Board-member Director</u> or member of the <u>Board-member Director</u>'s family may have with respect to any allowance, honorarium, remuneration or benefit to which the



- <u>Board memberDirector</u> or member of the <u>Board member'Director's</u> family may be entitled by being appointed by the Board to a position described in clause (a);
- that the <u>Board memberDirector</u> may have with respect to any allowance, honorarium, remuneration or benefit to which the <u>Board memberDirector</u> may be entitled by being a <u>Board memberDirector</u>; or
- that is so remote or insignificant that it cannot reasonably be regarded as likely to influence the Board memberDirector.
- 9.03 (1) When a <u>Board memberDirector</u>, or a Regular Member of which the <u>Board memberDirector</u> is an <u>eE</u>lected <u>rRepresentative</u>, has a pecuniary interest in a matter before the Board, a Board committee or any other body to which the <u>Board memberDirector</u> is appointed as a representative of the Board, the <u>Board memberDirector</u> must, if present:
 - a) disclose the general nature of the pecuniary interest prior to any discussion of the matter,
 - b) abstain from voting on any question relating to the matter,
 - c) abstain from any discussion of the matter, and
 - subject to subsection (2), leave the room in which the meeting is being held until discussion and voting on the matter are concluded.
 - (2) If the matter with respect to which the <u>Board memberDirector</u>, or the Regular Member of which the <u>Board memberDirector</u> is an Elected Representative has a pecuniary interest is the payment of an account for which funds have previously been committed, it is not necessary for the <u>Board memberDirector</u> to leave the room.
- 9.04 (1) A member of the Board of Directors ceases eligibility to be a Board Member if he or sheDirector if the Director:
 - a) as a Board Member, takes part in a decision of the Board knowing that the decision might further a private interest of:
 - i, the Board Member Director,
 - ii. a corporation, firm or partnership referred to in section 4.1.2(2) of this Article 4.1.clause 9.02(2), or
 - a Regular Member of which the Board member Director is an Elected Representative,
 - b) where applicable, does not declare an interest and withdraw from a meeting without voting on or discussing a matter before the Board-of-Directors which might further a private interest referred to in clause (a)(i), (ii), above, or
 - c) accepts:
 - a fee of any amount other than a fee or honorarium paid by the Association for the <u>Board memberDirector</u>'s services as a <u>Board memberDirector</u>, or
 - ii. a gift or other benefit having a value of more than \$100 that the maximum determined by the Board from time to time where such amount is received because the Board Member Director is a Board Member Director.



- (2) Subsection (1)(c) does not apply if a <u>Board MemberDirector</u> is invited to attend an event or function as a representative of <u>AUMAthe Association</u> and the <u>Board MemberDirector</u> discloses such attendance <u>and payment</u> in a manner approved by the Board from time to time.
- 9.05 (1) A meeting of the Board of Directors may be called under section clause 10.01 to determine whether a Board Member has ceased Director is no longer eligible to be a Board member Director under this Article.
 - (2) The Board Member Director:
 - a) shall be given notice of a meeting of the Board of Directors called under this section;
 - b) upon request:
 - shall be given particulars of the grounds on which it is alleged that he or shethe <u>Director</u> has ceased <u>eligibility</u> to be a <u>Board member Director</u>;
 - ii. shall be given an opportunity to make representations to the Board of Directors in writing or in person, or by legal counsel, or any combination of the foregoing;
 - is not entitled to be present while the Board-of Directors discusses the question whether or not the Board Member Director has ceased eligibility to be a Board Member Director.
- 9.06 (1) The Upon determination by the Board of Directors may by resolution state that the Board Member has ceased to be a Board Member. Director has ceased eligibility to be on the Board, the Association shall provide notice to the Director of the Director's removal from the Board effective the date thereof.
 - (2) The provisions of Article VIII relating to the filling of vacancies on the Board until the next annual general meeting apply to filling a vacancy under this Article.
- 9.07 A Board Member Director, by accepting appointment or election as a Board Member Director, agrees the Board Member Director will not be entitled to assert any claim or bring any legal action, whether for defamation or any other cause of action, against the Association or any officer, director Officer, Director or employee of the Association, in respect of anything done by any of them in good faith pursuant to this Article.

Article X - POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD

10.01 Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held as follows:

- a) pursuant to a regular schedule of meetings set by the Board at its organizational meeting following the annual general meeting, or
- b) at the call of the President, or
- c) upon the written request of four (4) Directors with at least 72 hours notice.
- 10.02 10.02 A quorum of the Board is eight (8) members.
- 10.03 10.03 At meetings of the Board of Directors, each Board Member Director present shall have one vote and, in the case of a tie, the motion shall be lost. A resolution in writing signed by all of the Directors, shall be valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of Directors duly called and constituted.
- 10.04The Board of Directorshas the authority to manage, or supervise the management of, the affairs of the Association. The Board has the authority and responsibility to carry out as

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appropriate, or delegate to its committees, the powers and duties conferred upon it by the Association and by law.

- 10.05 If the Board establishes and prescribes the terms of reference for any committee, or delegates that authority to the Executive Committee, the persons appointed as committee members may be:
 - a) Directors
 - b) effected representatives of members.
 - c) other persons, and/or
 - d) any combination of the above.
- 10.06 Members of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee shall receive an honorarium for their service and shall be reimbursed for expenses reasonably incurred in performing their duties on the Board of Directors or Executive Committee.
- 10.07 The Board shall have authority on behalf of the Association to approve and adopt policies and procedures from time to time relating to the Association and its operations.
- 10.08 In addition to the duties otherwise set forth herein, and for greater clarity, in exercising its operational authority, the Board, and each Director and Officer, shall comply with the then current objects, bylaws, policies and procedures of the Association.

Article XI - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- 11.01 The Executive Committee, also referred to as the Executive, shall consist of the President and the Vice-Presidents and may also include such other Directors of the Association that the Board may approve to be part of the Executive.
- 11.02A quorum for Executive Committee meetings shall consist of three (3) members of the
- 11.03 The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between meetings of the Board on emergent and time sensitive Issues in accordance with such rules as the Board of Directors may adopt provided that the Executive may only recommendations to the Board, and shall not determine, the following:
 - a) the employment or termination of the Chief Executive Officer of the Association,
 - b) the amount of membership fees under clause 15.04, and
 - c) borrowing money under clauses 15.07 15.06 and 15.08, 15.07.
- 11.04 The Executive Committee shall report any action taken under clause 11.03 at the next meeting of the Board.
- 11.05 The President and the Vice-Presidents of the Association shall have the duties and powers commonly assigned to such officers, set forth in these Bylaws as well as those associated with their position as set forth below:
 - (a) President The President of the Board shall, when present, preside at all meetings of the Board and of the members. The President shall, subject to the authority of the Board have general supervision of the activities and affairs of the Association and shall have such other duties and powers as the Board may specify:

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(b) Vice-Presidents – If the President is absent or is unable or refuses to act, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at the meetings of the Board and of the members. The duty to preside in the President's absence shall be undertaken by the Vice-Presidents on a rotation that is approved by the Board. The Vice-Presidents shall have such other duties and powers as the Board may specify.

Article XII - MEETINGS

- 12.01 The annual general meeting of the Association shall be held at such time and place as the Board of Directors may determine.
- 12.02Written notice of the date of the annual general meeting shall be provided to each memberRegular Member and the Association's auditor not less than twelve (12) weekstwenty-eight (28) days prior to the date of the meeting.
- 12.03 A 5Special gGeneral mMeeting of the Association may be held at the call of five (5) percent of the Regular Membership or by two-thirds (2/3) vote of all the Board and written notice shall be provided to each Regular mMember not less than fourteen (14) days before the date of the meeting: except where a matter is to be decided by a Special Resolution in which case the notice period set forth in clause 16.03 shall apply.
- 12.04 A quorum at an annual general meeting or sSpecial gGeneral mMeeting shall be representation from twenty-five percent (25%) of the Regular Membership in gGood sStanding and the quorum shall be determined within fifteen minutes of the posted starting time of the meeting. For the purposes of this determination, a Regular Member shall be deemed to be represented if:
 - (a) at an annual general meeting, one of its Elected Representatives is registered to attend the annual Association's conference and annual general meeting, regardless of whether such Elected Representative attends the said meeting:
 - (b) at a Special General Meeting, one of its Elected Representatives is in attendance.
- 12.05 The President or another member of, where applicable, a Vice-President or such other Director approved by the Board-delegated by the President, shall chair the annual general meeting and any sSpecial aGeneral mMeeting.
- 12.06The persons entitled to speak at an annual general meeting or ₅Special gGeneral mMeeting are:
 - a) those effected representatives in attendance whose municipalities are Regular Members of the Association in gGood-sStanding,
 - b) in the event a Regular Member is unable to be represented at the annual general meeting or sSpecial gGeneral mMeeting by an eElected rRepresentative, an official appointed by motion of the Council to represent it, provided that notice of such appointment is submitted in writing to the Chief Executive Officer at least three (3) days prior to the date



of the annual general meeting or and sSpecial gGeneral mMeeting, and for greater clarity, such person shall not have any voting rights.

- upon a motion from the floor, a representative of an Associate Member, and
 the Association's auditor and such other person(s) upon consent or invitation of the chair of the meeting.
- 12.07 Except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, the Rulesrules of Procedure procedure to be followed at meetings of the Board of Directors, the annual general meeting and any sepecial general meeting shall be those formal in nature following, generally speaking, the applicable procedures set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised:" with deviations as deemed appropriate by the meeting's chair, to facilitate consensus, discussion and collaboration.

Article XIII - CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

- **13.01** The Board shall appoint a Chief Executive Officer to manage the affairs of the Association. For greater clarity, the Chief Executive Officer shall not be a Director of the Association.
- 13.02 The Chief Executive Officer +5, as the chief officer of the Association and any of its subsidiaries, ensures that the policies and programs of the Association are implemented, and performs the duties and functions and exercises the powers assigned to the Chief Executive Officer by the Board of Directors.
- 13.03 The Chief Executive Officer may <u>cause the Association to</u> employ any <u>administrative</u> staff required within the expenditure authority included in the Association's budget.

Article XIV - SIGNING AUTHORITY

- 14.01 After they minutes are approved, the minutes of all Board meetings by the Board in relation to Board meetings and by the Regular Members in relation to membership meetings, the minutes shall be signed by the Chief Executive Officer, to indicate such approval.
- 14.02The Except where otherwise authorized herein, the Board of Directors shall designate signing authorities for any financial or other instrument and contract, document or agreement requiring the signature of the Association and grant authorizations for the use of the seal by Board resolution or in one or more Board approved policies.

Article XV - FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

- **15.01** The fiscal year of the Association shall be the calendar year<u>unless otherwise approved by the Board</u>.
- **15.02** Before the end of each fiscal year, the Board of Directors shall approve a budget for the next fiscal year which shall include revenues at least sufficient to pay the estimated expenditures.
- 15.03 The Board of Directors may approve an interim budget for part of the next fiscal year.
- **15.04** The Board—of Directors shall annually determine a method of calculating membership fees which will generate the membership fee revenue projected in the budget.



- 15.05 If any number of Regular Members agree to undertake a special initiative, the Board—of Directors may levy a special fee on those members to raise the required revenue.
- 15.06The membership fees in effect on the date that these bylaws are approved are continued until they are changed by the Board of Directors.
- 15.07 The Board of DirectorsBoard shall have the power to borrow on behalf of and authority to cause the Association and upon the credit of the Association borrow money for operating purposes, and to give security therefor, in an amount not in excess of sixty percent (60%) of annual fees or special assessments then levied or assessed by the Association to its membership but not yet collected.
- 15.0815.07 By a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the Board, the Association may borrow for capital purposes: on such terms as the Board determines appropriate.
- 45.0915.08 The Association may draw, make, accept, endorse, execute and issue promissory notes, bills of exchange and other negotiable instruments.
- 45.1015.09 The books and records of the Association shall be available for the inspection by any Regular Member of the Association at the Association's office during normal business hours except confidential information of the Association which may only be disclosed upon Board approval and on such terms as are required by the Board.
- 15.1115.10 In the event the Association is wound up or dissolved, the Association shall obtain and comply with the required authorizations and processes referenced in the Act. Further, in such event, all of its remaining assets after payment of its liabilities, if any, shall be paid to such registered and incorporated non-profit organization or organizations with purposes similar to those of the Association as a Majoritymajority of the Regular Members determine. In and in no event shall any Member become entitled to any remaining assets of the Association.
- 15.12 The Board of Directors-shall appoint by resolution an auditorindependent firm of chartered professional accountants as the Association's auditor to audit the annual financial statements of the Association and an audited annual financial statement shall be submitted to each annual general meeting.
- 15.1315.12 The Association may acquire by gift or purchase and have, possess and enjoy land, tenements, rents, annuities and other property of any kind whatsoever within the Province of Alberta
- 15.1415.13 The Association may from time to time sell, alienate, exchange, mortgage, let, lease or otherwise dispose of any part of its real or personal estate.
- 15.15.14 Every Director and officerOfficer of the Association and their heirs, executors and administrators, respectively, shall be deemed to have assumed office on the express understanding and agreement and condition that each shall, from time to time and at all times, be indemnified and saved harmless out of the funds of the Association from and against:
 - a) all costs, charges, damages and expenses whatsoever, including without limitation, an
 amount paid to settle an action or satisfy a judgment, which they sustain or incur in or
 about any action, claim, suit or proceeding which is brought, commenced or prosecuted
 against them by reason of being or having been a Director or Officer of the Association or



- who acts or acted at the Association's request as a director or officer of another entity in which the Association had a material interest or in respect of any act, omission, deed, matter or thing whatsoever made, done or permitted by them in or about the execution of the duties of their office; and
- all other costs, charges, damages and expenses which they sustain or incur in or about or in relation to any act, omission, deed, matter or thing whatsoever made, done or permitted by them in or about the execution of the duties of their office;
- except such costs, charges, damages and expenses as are occasioned by their own willful act, defaultmisconduct or dishonesty, and except in respect of an action by or on behalf of the Association or other said entity to procure a judgment in its favour.
- 15.15 The Association shall purchase and maintain, or otherwise ensure, there is directors' and officers' liability insurance for the benefit of the Directors and Officers of the Association, in such amounts and with such insurers as the Board may from time to time determine appropriate.

Article XVI - AMENDMENTS

- **16.01**The Board of <u>Directors</u> or a Regular Member may propose a <u>special resolutionSpecial</u> Resolution, as required by the <u>Societies Act R.S.A. 2000, c. S 14, or any amendments thereto</u>, to amend these Bylaws.
- **16.02** A proposed <u>s</u>Special <u>r</u>Resolution may be considered at the annual general meeting or at a <u>s</u>Special <u>g</u>General <u>m</u>Meeting.
- 16.03 Written notice of a proposed special Resolution shall be provided to each Regular mM ember not less than twenty-eight (828) weeksdays before the meeting at which the special Resolution is to be considered.
- 16.04 An amendment to the Bylaws shall not be made unless a three quarters (3/4) majority of the votes cast by representatives of Regular Members in good standing present at the meeting vote in favour of the amendmentapproved by Special Resolution.
- **16.05** Notwithstanding any other provision of contained in these Bylaws, every Special Resolution to amend these Bylaws shall contain the following preamble:
 - "WHEREAS the following proposed amendment has been submitted to the Association only after taking into consideration:
 - a) the Association's fundamental and paramount principle of ownership and control of the Association by its Regular Members; and
 - the Association's tax exempt status under para. 149(1)(d.5) of the Income Tax Act, Canada as discussed by the Canada Revenue Agency in its letter dated March 14, 2007,

and that the proposed amendment herein will not, by its nature, content or description, compromise, modify, alter, affect or change in any way the fundamental and paramount principle of the Association (the Association being owned and controlled by its Regular



Members only) or the Association's tax exempt status under para. 149(1)(d.5) of the Income Tax Act, Canada as same may be amended from time to time."

For greater clarity, failure to include the above preamble shall not invalidate a Special Resolution approved in accordance with these Bylaws and the governing law.

- **16.06**In 20152025 and every subsequent year divisible by five (5), the President shall establish a special committee to conduct a general review of the Bylaws of the Association.
- 16.07 In the event any provision of these Bylaws is in any manner determined to be inconsistent with, or in violation of, the fundamental and paramount principle of the Association set forth in Articleclause 2.02 above, then upon such determination being made by the Board acting reasonably, such provision shall be deemed to be void ab initio and of no force and effect, and such provision shall be deemed to be struck from these Bylaws without further notice or approval by the Regular Members. Further, the Regular Members and the Board shall take such steps and grant such approvals as are necessary to ensure the Bylaws are formally amended, approved and filed with Corporate Registry to reflect same.



ALBERTA URBAN MUNICIPALITIES ASSOCIATION BYLAWS

Article I - NAME AND DEFINITIONS

- **1.01** The name of the Association shall be the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association, referred to in these Bylaws as the "Association."
- **1.02** In these Bylaws, in addition to any other definitions contained herein, save where the contrary is expressed:
 - (a) "Act" means the Societies Act (Alberta) and any statute that may be substituted therefor, and the regulations made thereunder, as from time to time amended, and in the case of such amendment, reference in the Bylaws shall be read as referring to the amended provisions thereof;
 - (b) "appoint" includes "elect" and vice versa;
 - (c) "Affiliate Member" has the meaning set forth in clause 4.02(c);
 - (d) "Associate Member" has the meaning set forth in clause 4.02(b);
 - (e) "Association" means the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association;
 - (f) "Board" means the Board of Directors of the Association, as constituted from time to time;
 - (g) **"Bylaws"** means these Bylaws and all other Bylaws of the Association from time to time in force and effect;
 - (h) "Chief Executive Officer" means the person referred to in Article XIII hereof that is duly appointed as the chief executive officer of the Association by the Board from time to time;
 - (i) "Director" means a person who is from time to time duly elected or appointed as a Director of the Association;
 - (j) "Elected Representative" means a member of the council of a Regular Member, elected pursuant to the MGA;
 - (k) "Good Standing" means a member in respect of whom the Association has received the membership fee for the current membership year or, in the case of a Regular Member, evidence of intention to pay satisfactory to the Board has been received:
 - (I) "MGA" means the Municipal Government Act (Alberta) and any statute that may be substituted therefor, and the regulations made thereunder, as from time to time amended, and in the case of such amendment, reference in the Bylaws shall be read as referring to the amended provisions thereof;
 - (m) "Officers" means the officers of the Association including the elected or appointed officers that are elected or appointed by the membership as per the terms hereof, namely the President and Vice-Presidents (herein also referred to as the "elected Officers"), as well as those officers appointed by the Board, such as the Chief Executive Officer, and such other persons as would be



- construed as "officers" at law by reason of their senior roles of management with the Association.
- (n) "Regular Member" and "Regular Membership" have the meanings set forth in clause 4.02(a);
- (o) "Returning Officer" has the meaning set forth in clause 7.01;
- (p) "Special General Meeting" means a meeting of the membership other than the annual general meeting;
- (q) "Special Resolution" has the meaning set forth in the Act.

Article II - PURPOSE OF BYLAWS

- 2.01 The purpose of these Bylaws is to conform to the provisions of the Act and to set out the Association's membership, participation and leadership structures and processes to facilitate the Association's ability to provide leadership in advocating for legislation and programs to the Alberta and Canadian governments and to other organizations that support effective municipal governance and municipal interests in general, and to provide services that address the needs of its membership.
- 2.02 These Bylaws establish, and shall continue to establish in each and every year of the Association's existence, a fundamental and paramount principle that the Association is owned and controlled, directly or indirectly, by the Regular Members (as referenced in Article IV) of the Association in every material way, and that the Association's Bylaws, or any other constating document of the Association, shall be interpreted by the Association's Members, any court of competent jurisdiction and any taxing authority having jurisdiction, in a manner consistent with this fundamental and paramount principle.

Article III - GENERAL

- **3.01** The Board may establish procedures for convening any meeting referred to in these Bylaws by electronic or other communication facilities including a conference telephone call, video-conferencing, facsimile, e-mail or such other technology as may become available.
- 3.02 Notwithstanding anything in these Bylaws, if by virtue of severe weather conditions, a pandemic or other emergency reason that is generally applicable, it is impossible for a quorum to participate in any scheduled or required meeting, then:
 - (a) the time for undertaking any action, and
 - (b) the terms of office of the Directors, President and Vice-Presidents, shall be extended until the meeting can be reconvened.
- 3.03 When written notice is required to be provided under these Bylaws, the notice may be given by mail, facsimile or other electronic means which enables the recipient to review the entire text of the notice.



3.04 The Association shall comply with the governing privacy legislation to the extent it is applicable to the Association and/or its activities.

Article IV - MEMBERSHIP

- **4.01** Any municipality, organization or business which:
 - (a) desires to further one or more Objects of the Association,
 - (b) qualifies under a membership category described in clause 4.02, and
 - (c) pays the relevant membership fee,

may become a member of the Association, but subject to Board approval where clauses 4.02(a)ii. and 4.05 are applicable, and subject to clause 4.09 as it pertains to reinstatement.

- **4.02** The categories of membership are:
 - (a) REGULAR MEMBERSHIP, such members being referred to as "Regular Members", which shall be available to:
 - i. any city, town, village, summer village, or specialized municipality located in Alberta; and
 - ii. upon Board approval, any successor municipality of a Regular Member referred to in subsection i. above, including any municipal district or county if the municipal district or county is the successor municipality thereof;
 - (b) ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP, such members being referred to as "Associate Members", which shall be available to:
 - i. any municipality other than a municipality referred to in clause 4.02(a)i.;
 - ii. any organization wholly owned by one or more municipalities that are eligible to be Regular Members or Associate Members, any municipally-related non-profit organization or special purpose board or commission;
 - iii. any municipally-related non-profit organization or special purpose board or commission that provides a reciprocal membership that has been approved by the Board; and
 - iv. any other local authority or related non-profit organization incorporated pursuant to provincial legislation;
 - (c) AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP, such members being referred to as "Affiliate Members", which shall be available to any company, organization or individual, in or outside of the Province of Alberta.
- **4.03** The classifications of Regular Members for the purposes of determining Board representation under Articles VII and VIII are as follows:
 - (a) cities with populations over 500,000;
 - (b) cities with populations up to 500,000;
 - (c) towns;
 - (d) villages; and
 - (e) summer villages.



- **4.04** For purposes of determining membership classification, a specialized municipality, municipal district or county shall be classified according to its population such that if it has a population equal to or greater than the population thresholds set out in the MGA in relation to:
 - (a) a city, it shall be considered a city;
 - (b) a town, it shall be considered a town;
 - (c) a village, it shall be considered a village; and
 - (d) if less than the population set out for a village, it shall be considered a summer village.
- **4.05** The Townsite of Redwood Meadows, the Special Areas Board and an improvement district are eligible for inclusion, upon Board approval, in the classification of Regular Membership appropriate to its population.
- **4.06** (1) Subject to sub-clause (2), any member may withdraw from membership in the Association at any time by notice in writing.
 - (2) A Regular Member which wishes to withdraw from membership in the Association shall provide at least twelve (12) months' notice in writing to the Association accompanied by a certified copy of the resolution of council.
 - (3) Any notice of withdrawal of membership shall be presented to the Board.
 - (4) A member which withdraws from membership is not entitled to reimbursement of any membership fees.
- **4.07** The membership year is the calendar year.
- **4.08** For purposes of this section, "Association activities" means all activities of the Association under its mandate other than business services, and "business services", for the purposes of these Bylaws, shall mean the provision, directly or indirectly, of certain products or services by the Association to its members which shall typically be through a service delivery entity owned by or related to the Association. With respect to access to these activities and services:
 - (a) <u>Regular Members</u> Regular Members are entitled to participate in all Association activities and business services, including the right to vote as set forth in Article V;
 - (b) <u>Associate Members</u> Associate Members are entitled to participate in business services and may, on conditions set by the Board from time to time, be entitled to participate in some or all Association activities, but, for greater clarity, such participation shall not include the right to vote on Association matters;
 - (c) <u>Affiliate Members</u> Affiliate members are not entitled to participate in business services but may, on conditions set by the Board from time to time, be entitled to participate in some or all Association activities, but, for greater clarity, such participation shall not include the right to vote on Association matters.



- **4.09** If a member ceases to be a member in Good Standing:
 - (a) municipalities or organizations that are Regular or Associate Members shall not be entitled to participate in Association activities nor have any voting rights under Article V but shall be entitled to participate in the Association's business services:
 - (b) for a period exceeding six (6) months, the member may be expelled from the Association upon approval thereof by the Board, effective immediately upon notice from the Association to the Regular Member. Thereafter the member shall not be entitled to participate in association activities or enjoy membership privileges until the member has been brought into Good Standing and reinstated upon approval of the Board.

Article V - VOTING RIGHTS AT MEMBERS' MEETINGS

- 5.01 The voting rights of a Regular Member in Good Standing of the Association at any annual general meeting or Special General Meeting shall be equal to one (1) vote for and by each Elected Representative of such Regular Member that is in attendance at such meeting.
- **5.02** For greater clarity, subject to clause 5.01, the maximum number of votes available to a Regular Member shall depend on the number of Elected Representatives it has on its council at the relevant time.

Article VI - NOMINATIONS

- 6.01 Nominations for Directors and elected Officers shall be conducted in accordance with the election procedures established by the Returning Officer designated pursuant to clause 7.01.
- **6.02** To be eligible for nomination, a person must at a minimum:
 - (a) be an Elected Representative of a Regular Member in Good Standing,
 - (b) submit a completed nomination in the form prescribed by the Returning Officer, and
 - (c) be nominated by at least two other Elected Representatives of Regular Members in Good Standing.

Further, for the President or Vice-President positions, the nomination must be approved by a motion of the council of the Regular Member that the nominee is an Elected Representative of.

- 6.03 A municipality shall not have more than one Elected Representative serving in a Director position, except for the cities of Edmonton and Calgary. In the event more than one Elected Representative from a municipality is nominated, the municipality's council needs to approve a motion for only one nominee.
- **6.04** The persons making a nomination and the person being nominated must be eligible to vote in the election for which the nomination is being made.



- 6.05 The Association shall have five (5) Vice-Presidents who shall be elected or appointed according to a classification system that is slightly modified from that set forth in clause 4.03, with the applicable classifications for which a Vice-President shall be appointed, or elected being as follows:
 - (a) the City of Calgary;
 - (b) the City of Edmonton;
 - (c) cities with populations up to 500,000;
 - (d) towns; and
 - (e) villages and summer villages.

A person eligible for nomination as Vice-President for a classification must also be elected or appointed as a Director in the classification.

6.06 The President shall also be a Director but not a Director that has been appointed or elected pursuant to clause 8.02 in relation to a classification.

Article VII - ELECTIONS

- **7.01** The Board shall designate a person to be the "Returning Officer" who shall be responsible for the fair and proper conduct of elections.
- **7.02** The Returning Officer shall establish and publish election procedures in accordance with these Bylaws and any applicable policies and procedures adopted by the Board from time to time.
- **7.03** Elections of Directors and elected Officers shall be held at the annual general meeting.
- **7.04** The Regular Members eligible to vote on the election or appointment of the Directors and elected Officers through their respective Elected Representatives are as follows:
 - (a) <u>President</u> For the President of the Association, all persons that meet the voting requirements under Article V;
 - (b) <u>Vice-Presidents</u> For each Vice-President, only those persons that: (i) are Elected Representatives of Regular Members that fit within the relevant classification, as set forth in clause 6.05, for which the Vice-President is being elected, and (ii) that otherwise meet the voting requirements under Article V;
 - (c) <u>Directors</u> For each Director, only those persons that: (i) are Elected Representatives of Regular Members; (ii) where in relation to a classification, only those Elected Representatives of Regular Members that fit within the relevant classification as set forth in clause 4.03, and, if a town or village, the electoral zone for which the Director is being elected, and (iii) that otherwise meet the voting requirements under Article V.

Article VIII - DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS

- **8.01** The Association shall have a Board consisting of fifteen (15) Directors. For greater clarity, one of whom shall also be the President.
- **8.02** The number of Directors representing each classification is:



- (a) two (2) Directors appointed by the City of Calgary, one of whom shall be designated by the City as Vice-President for Calgary;
- (b) two (2) Directors appointed by the City of Edmonton, one of whom shall be designated by the City as Vice-President for Edmonton;
- (c) three (3) Directors representing cities with populations up to 500,000;
- (d) three (3) Directors representing towns;
- (e) three (3) Directors representing villages;
- (f) one (1) Director representing summer villages;

for an aggregate total of fourteen (14) Directors elected or appointed in relation to a classification.

- **8.03** The Directors representing towns and villages shall be elected according to electoral zones designated by the Board.
- 8.04 The Board shall establish the electoral zones for towns and villages as follows:
 - (a) towns shall be grouped into three zones, designated as towns east, west and south, and otherwise in such a manner that the number of towns in each zone is approximately the same;
 - (b) villages shall likewise be grouped into three zones, designated as villages east, west and south, in such a manner that the number of villages in each zone is approximately the same;

The Board shall publish the electoral zone information on its website by June 30 in each year except where there are no changes from the previous year.

- **8.05** The following applies to the term of office for each position on the Board:
 - (a) it commences at the organizational meeting of the Board following the annual general meeting, and
 - (b) it continues until the end of the applicable annual general meeting at which time the position is available for election.
- **8.06** The terms of office for the positions of Directors and elected Officers are as follows:
 - (a) President Two (2) years;
 - (b) Vice-President One (1) year;
 - (c) Director Two (2) years.

For greater clarity, Directors and elected Officers may be re-elected for one or more successive terms, provided they are otherwise eligible for the position.

- **8.07** (1) The term of office for the following Director positions shall begin in odd numbered years:
 - (a) one (1) Calgary Director;
 - (b) one (1) Edmonton Director;
 - (c) two (2) for cities with populations up to 500,000;
 - (d) towns east;
 - (e) villages south;
 - (f) summer villages.



- (2) The term of office for the following Director positions shall begin in even numbered years:
- (a) one (1) Calgary Director;
- (b) one (1) Edmonton Director;
- (c) one (1) for cities with populations up to 500,000;
- (d) towns west and south;
- (e) villages east and west.
- **8.08** (1) A President who is no longer an Elected Representative immediately ceases to be President and a member of the Board.
 - (2) A Director who is no longer an Elected Representative immediately ceases to be a member of the Board.
 - (3) In the case of either (1) or (2) above, if the period until the next annual general meeting is longer than three (3) months, the position shall be deemed to be vacant.
- **8.09** Should the legal municipal status change of the municipality of which a Director is an Elected Representative:
 - (a) the Director is eligible to remain in the position until the next annual general meeting, and
 - (b) if the term of office for the position does not expire at the end of the next annual general meeting a by-election shall be held at the next annual general meeting to fill the position for the remainder of the term.
- **8.10** Should the office of the President become vacant, the remaining Board shall forthwith appoint a member of the Board to serve as President until the next annual general meeting.
- **8.11** (1) Should a vacancy occur in a Director position other than a Director appointed by the City of Calgary or the City of Edmonton or in a Vice-President position, then:
 - (a) the Board may appoint a replacement to serve until the next annual general meeting, and
 - (b) if the term of office for the position does not expire at the end of the next annual general meeting a by-election shall be held at the next annual general meeting to fill the position for the remainder of the term.
 - (2) Should a vacancy occur in a Director position or a Vice-President position appointed by the City of Calgary or the City of Edmonton, the relevant city may appoint a replacement for the remainder of the term of office of the position.
- **8.12** A person appointed to fill a vacancy in any position must be eligible for election to that position if an election were held.
- **8.13** In carrying out the rights and responsibilities of a Director or Officer, every Director and Officer of the Association shall:
 - (a) act honestly and in good faith with a view to the best interests of the Association,



- (b) exercise the care, diligence and skill that a reasonably prudent person would exercise in comparable circumstances,
- (c) comply with the applicable law including the Act, its regulations as well as with the objects, Bylaws, policies and procedures adopted by the Association,
- (d) maintain the confidentiality of all Association information given to such Director or Officer that is considered confidential, except in the following circumstances:
 - i. the confidential information is or subsequently enters the public domain through no action of the Director or Officer; or
 - ii. the confidential information is required to be disclosed by law, and if the Director or Officer receives Association information that is considered confidential from:
 - iii. such person's own independent sources; or
 - iv. any third party not under an obligation to keep the information Confidential,

the Director will disclose to the Board that such information has been received.

- **8.14** A member of the Board ceases to be a Director if:
 - (a) the person is disqualified from Council pursuant to Section 174(1) of the MGA, or
 - (b) the person misses three consecutive regular meetings of the Board, upon approval by the Board of the Director's removal, effective immediately upon notice from the Association to the Director.
- 8.15 The Board may, by resolution passed by at least three fourths (3/4) of the votes cast by those eligible to vote, remove a Director from the Board effective as of the date of the resolution or such later date as resolved by the Board. The provisions of clause 9.05 regarding notice and an opportunity to be heard apply to a resolution under this clause.

ARTICLE IX - DISQUALIFICATION OF DIRECTORS

- **9.01** In this Article:
 - (a) "Director's family" means the Director's spouse or adult interdependent partner, the Director's children, the parents of the Director and the parents of the Director's spouse or interdependent partner;
 - (b) "spouse" means:
 - i. the spouse of a married person, and
 - ii. does not include a spouse who is living separate and apart from the other spouse if the spouses have separated pursuant to a written separation agreement or if their support obligations and family property have been dealt with by a court order.
- 9.02 (1) A member of the Board has a pecuniary interest in a matter if:
 - (a) the matter could monetarily affect the Director or an employer of the Director, or



- (b) the Director knows or should know that the matter could monetarily affect the Director's family.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1), a person is monetarily affected by a matter if the matter monetarily affects:
- (a) the person directly,
- (b) a corporation, other than a distributing corporation (as defined under the governing legislation), in which the person is a shareholder, director or officer,
- (c) a distributing corporation in which the person beneficially owns voting shares carrying at least 10% of the voting rights attached to the voting shares of the corporation or of which the person is a director or officer, or
- (d) a partnership or firm of which the person is a member.
- (3) A Director does not have a pecuniary interest by reason only of any interest:
- (a) that the Director or a member of the Director's family may have by reason of being appointed by the Board as a director of a company incorporated for the purpose of carrying on business for and on behalf of the Association or by reason of being appointed as the representative of the Board on another body;
- (b) that the Director or member of the Director's family may have with respect to any allowance, honorarium, remuneration or benefit to which the Director or member of the Director's family may be entitled by being appointed by the Board to a position described in clause a);
- (c) that the Director may have with respect to any allowance, honorarium, remuneration or benefit to which the Director may be entitled by being a Director; or
- (d) that is so remote or insignificant that it cannot reasonably be regarded as likely to influence the Director.
- **9.03** (1) When a Director, or a Regular Member of which the Director is an Elected Representative, has a pecuniary interest in a matter before the Board, a Board committee or any other body to which the Director is appointed as a representative of the Board, the Director must, if present:
 - (a) disclose the general nature of the pecuniary interest prior to any discussion of the matter,
 - (b) abstain from voting on any question relating to the matter,
 - (c) abstain from any discussion of the matter, and
 - (d) subject to subsection (2), leave the room in which the meeting is being held until discussion and voting on the matter are concluded.
 - (2) If the matter with respect to which the Director, or the Regular Member of which the Director is an Elected Representative has a pecuniary interest is the payment of an account for which funds have previously been committed, it is not necessary for the Director to leave the room.
- **9.04** (1) A Director ceases eligibility to be a Director if the Director:



- (a) takes part in a decision of the Board knowing that the decision might further a private interest of:
 - i. the Director.
 - ii. a corporation, firm or partnership referred to in clause 9.02(2), or
 - ii. a Regular Member of which the Director is an Elected Representative,
- (b) where applicable, does not declare an interest and withdraw from a meeting without voting on or discussing a matter before the Board which might further a private interest referred to in clause (a)i., ii. or iii. above, or
- (c) accepts:
 - i. a fee of any amount other than a fee or honorarium paid by the Association for the Director's services as a Director, or
 - ii. a gift or other benefit having a value of more than the maximum determined by the Board from time to time where such amount is received because the Director is a Director.
- (2) Subsection (1)(c) does not apply if a Director is invited to attend an event or function as a representative of the Association and the Director discloses such attendance and payment in a manner approved by the Board from time to time.
- **9.05** (1) A meeting of the Board may be called under clause 10.01 to determine whether a Director is no longer eligible to be a Director under this Article.
 - (2) The Director:
 - (a) shall be given notice of a meeting of the Board called under this section;
 - (b) upon request:
 - i. shall be given particulars of the grounds on which it is alleged that the Director has ceased eligibility to be a Director;
 - ii. shall be given an opportunity to make representations to the Board in writing or in person, or by legal counsel, or any combination of the foregoing;
 - (c) is not entitled to be present while the Board discusses the question whether or not the Director has ceased eligibility to be a Director.
- **9.06** (1) Upon determination by the Board that the Director has ceased eligibility to be on the Board, the Association shall provide notice to the Director of the Director's removal from the Board effective the date thereof.
 - (2) The provisions of Article VIII relating to the filling of vacancies on the Board until the next annual general meeting apply to filling a vacancy under this Article.
- 9.07 A Director, by accepting appointment or election as a Director, agrees the Director will not be entitled to assert any claim or bring any legal action, whether for defamation or any other cause of action, against the Association or any Officer, Director or employee of the Association, in respect of anything done by any of them in good faith pursuant to this Article.



Article X - POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD

- **10.01** Meetings of the Board shall be held as follows:
 - (a) pursuant to a regular schedule of meetings set by the Board at its organizational meeting following the annual general meeting, or
 - (b) at the call of the President, or
 - (c) upon the written request of four (4) Directors with at least 72 hours notice.
- **10.02** A quorum of the Board is eight (8) members.
- 10.03 At meetings of the Board, each Director present shall have one vote and, in the case of a tie, the motion shall be lost. A resolution in writing signed by all of the Directors, shall be valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of Directors duly called and constituted.
- **10.04** The Board has the authority to manage, or supervise the management of, the affairs of the Association. The Board has the authority and responsibility to carry out as appropriate, or delegate to its committees, the powers and duties conferred upon it by the Association and by law.
- **10.05** If the Board establishes and prescribes the terms of reference for any committee, or delegates that authority to the Executive Committee, the persons appointed as committee members may be:
 - (a) Directors,
 - (b) Elected Representatives of members,
 - (c) other persons, and/or
 - (d) any combination of the above.
- **10.06** Members of the Board and Executive Committee shall receive an honorarium for their service and shall be reimbursed for expenses reasonably incurred in performing their duties on the Board or Executive Committee.
- **10.07** The Board shall have authority on behalf of the Association to approve and adopt policies and procedures from time to time relating to the Association and its operations.
- 10.08 In addition to the duties otherwise set forth herein, and for greater clarity, in exercising its operational authority, the Board, and each Director and Officer, shall comply with the then current objects, bylaws, policies and procedures of the Association.

Article XI - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- 11.01 The Executive Committee, also referred to as the Executive, shall consist of the President and the Vice-Presidents and may also include such other Directors of the Association that the Board may approve to be part of the Executive.
- **11.02** A quorum for Executive Committee meetings shall consist of three (3) members of the Executive.
- 11.03 The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board between meetings of the Board on emergent and time sensitive issues in accordance with such rules as the



Board may adopt provided that the Executive may only provide recommendations to the Board, and shall not determine, the following:

- (a) the employment or termination of the Chief Executive Officer of the Association,
- (b) the amount of membership fees under clause 15.04, and
- (c) borrowing money under clauses 15.06 and 15.07.
- **11.04** The Executive Committee shall report any action taken under clause 11.03 at the next meeting of the Board.
- **11.05** The President and the Vice-Presidents of the Association shall have the duties and powers set forth in these Bylaws as well as those associated with their position as set forth below:
 - (a) <u>President</u> The President of the Board shall, when present, preside at all meetings of the Board and of the members. The President shall, subject to the authority of the Board, have general supervision of the activities and affairs of the Association and shall have such other duties and powers as the Board may specify;
 - (b) <u>Vice-Presidents</u> If the President is absent or is unable or refuses to act, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at the meetings of the Board and of the members. The duty to preside in the President's absence shall be undertaken by the Vice-Presidents on a rotation that is approved by the Board. The Vice-Presidents shall have such other duties and powers as the Board may specify.

Article XII - MEETINGS

- **12.01** The annual general meeting of the Association shall be held at such time and place as the Board may determine.
- **12.02** Written notice of the date of the annual general meeting shall be provided to each Regular Member and the Association's auditor not less than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the date of the meeting.
- 12.03 A Special General Meeting of the Association may be held at the call of five (5) percent of the Regular Membership or by two-thirds (2/3) vote of all the Board and written notice shall be provided to each Regular Member not less than fourteen (14) days before the date of the meeting except where a matter is to be decided by a Special Resolution in which case the notice period set forth in clause 16.03 shall apply.
- 12.04 A quorum at an annual general meeting or Special General Meeting shall be representation from twenty-five percent (25%) of the Regular Members in Good Standing and the quorum shall be determined within fifteen minutes of the posted starting time of the meeting. For the purposes of this determination, a Regular Member shall be deemed to be represented if:
 - (a) at an annual general meeting, one of its Elected Representatives is registered to attend the annual Association's conference and annual general meeting, regardless of whether such Elected Representative attends the said meeting;



- (b) at a Special General Meeting, one of its Elected Representatives is in attendance.
- **12.05** The President or, where applicable, a Vice-President or such other Director approved by the Board, shall chair the annual general meeting and any Special General Meeting.
- **12.06** The persons entitled to speak at an annual general meeting or Special General Meeting are:
 - (a) those Elected Representatives in attendance whose municipalities are Regular Members of the Association in Good Standing,
 - (b) in the event a Regular Member is unable to be represented at the annual general meeting or Special General Meeting by an Elected Representative, an official appointed by motion of the Council to represent it, provided that notice of such appointment is submitted in writing to the Chief Executive Officer at least three (3) days prior to the date of the annual general meeting or Special General Meeting, and for greater clarity, such person shall not have any voting rights,
 - (c) upon a motion from the floor, a representative of an Associate Member, and
 - (d) the Association's auditor and such other person(s) upon consent or invitation of the chair of the meeting.
- 12.07 Except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, the rules of procedure to be followed at meetings of the Board, the annual general meeting and any Special General Meeting shall be formal in nature following, generally speaking, the applicable procedures set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised" with deviations as deemed appropriate by the meeting's chair, to facilitate consensus, discussion and collaboration.

Article XIII - CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

- **13.01** The Board shall appoint a Chief Executive Officer to manage the affairs of the Association. For greater clarity, the Chief Executive Officer shall not be a Director of the Association.
- **13.02** The Chief Executive Officer, as the chief officer of the Association and any of its subsidiaries, ensures that the policies and programs of the Association are implemented, and performs the duties and functions and exercises the powers assigned to the Chief Executive Officer by the Board.
- **13.03** The Chief Executive Officer may cause the Association to employ any staff required within the expenditure authority included in the Association's budget.

Article XIV - SIGNING AUTHORITY

- **14.01** After minutes are approved by the Board in relation to Board meetings and by the Regular Members in relation to membership meetings, the minutes shall be signed by the Chief Executive Officer to indicate such approval.
- **14.02** Except where otherwise authorized herein, the Board shall designate signing authorities for any financial or other instrument, contract, document or agreement



requiring the signature of the Association and grant authorizations for the use of the seal by Board resolution or in one or more Board approved policies.

Article XV - FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

- **15.01** The fiscal year of the Association shall be the calendar year unless otherwise approved by the Board.
- **15.02** Before the end of each fiscal year, the Board shall approve a budget for the next fiscal year which shall include revenues at least sufficient to pay the estimated expenditures.
- 15.03 The Board may approve an interim budget for part of the next fiscal year.
- **15.04** The Board shall annually determine a method of calculating membership fees which will generate the membership fee revenue projected in the budget.
- **15.05** If any number of Regular Members agree to undertake a special initiative, the Board may levy a special fee on those members to raise the required revenue.
- 15.06 The Board shall have the power and authority to cause the Association to borrow money for operating purposes, and to give security therefor, in an amount not in excess of sixty percent (60%) of annual fees or special assessments then levied or assessed by the Association to its membership but not yet collected.
- **15.07** By a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the Board, the Association may borrow for capital purposes on such terms as the Board determines appropriate.
- **15.08** The Association may draw, make, accept, endorse, execute and issue promissory notes, bills of exchange and other negotiable instruments.
- 15.09 The books and records of the Association shall be available for the inspection by any Regular Member of the Association at the Association's office during normal business hours except confidential information of the Association which may only be disclosed upon Board approval and on such terms as are required by the Board.
- 15.10 In the event the Association is wound up or dissolved, the Association shall obtain and comply with the required authorizations and processes referenced in the Act. Further, in such event, all of its remaining assets after payment of its liabilities, if any, shall be paid to such registered and incorporated non-profit organization or organizations with purposes similar to those of the Association as a majority of the Regular Members determine and in no event shall any Member become entitled to any remaining assets of the Association.
- **15.11** The Board shall appoint by resolution an independent firm of chartered professional accountants as the Association's auditor to audit the annual financial statements of the Association and an audited annual financial statement shall be submitted to each annual general meeting.



- **15.12** The Association may acquire by gift or purchase and have, possess and enjoy land, tenements, rents, annuities and other property of any kind whatsoever within the Province of Alberta.
- **15.13** The Association may from time to time sell, alienate, exchange, mortgage, let, lease or otherwise dispose of any part of its real or personal estate.
- **15.14** Every Director and Officer of the Association and their heirs, executors and administrators, respectively, shall be deemed to have assumed office on the express understanding and agreement and condition that each shall, from time to time and at all times, be indemnified and saved harmless out of the funds of the Association from and against:
 - (a) all costs, charges, damages and expenses whatsoever, including without limitation, an amount paid to settle an action or satisfy a judgment, which they sustain or incur in or about any action, claim, suit or proceeding which is brought, commenced or prosecuted against them by reason of being or having been a Director or Officer of the Association or who acts or acted at the Association's request as a director or officer of another entity in which the Association had a material interest or in respect of any act, omission, deed, matter or thing whatsoever made, done or permitted by them in or about the execution of the duties of their office; and
 - (b) all other costs, charges, damages and expenses which they sustain or incur in or about or in relation to any act, omission, deed, matter or thing whatsoever made, done or permitted by them in or about the execution of the duties of their office; except such costs, charges, damages and expenses as are occasioned by their own willful misconduct or dishonesty and except in respect of an action by or on behalf of the Association or other said entity to procure a judgment in its favour.
- **15.15** The Association shall purchase and maintain, or otherwise ensure, there is directors' and officers' liability insurance for the benefit of the Directors and Officers of the Association, in such amounts and with such insurers as the Board may from time to time determine appropriate.

Article XVI - AMENDMENTS

- **16.01** The Board or a Regular Member may propose a Special Resolution, as required by the Act, to amend these Bylaws.
- **16.02** A proposed Special Resolution may be considered at the annual general meeting or at a Special General Meeting.
- **16.03** Written notice of a proposed Special Resolution shall be provided to each Regular Member not less than twenty-eight (28) days before the meeting at which the Special Resolution is to be considered.
- **16.04** An amendment to the Bylaws shall not be made unless approved by Special Resolution.



16.05 Notwithstanding any other provision contained in these Bylaws, every Special Resolution to amend these Bylaws shall contain the following preamble:

"WHEREAS the following proposed amendment has been submitted to the Association only after taking into consideration:

- (a) the Association's fundamental and paramount principle of ownership and control of the Association by its Regular Members; and
- (b) the Association's tax exempt status under para. 149(1)(d.5) of the *Income Tax Act*, Canada as discussed by the Canada Revenue Agency in its letter dated March 14, 2007.

and that the proposed amendment herein will not, by its nature, content or description, compromise, modify, alter, affect or change in any way the fundamental and paramount principle of the Association (the Association being owned and controlled by its Regular Members only) or the Association's tax exempt status under para. 149(1)(d.5) of the *Income Tax Act*, Canada as same may be amended from time to time."

For greater clarity, failure to include the above preamble shall not invalidate a Special Resolution approved in accordance with these Bylaws and the governing law.

- **16.06** In 2025 and every subsequent year divisible by five (5), the President shall establish a special committee to conduct a general review of the Bylaws of the Association.
- 16.07 In the event any provision of these Bylaws is in any manner determined to be inconsistent with, or in violation of, the fundamental and paramount principle of the Association set forth in clause 2.02 above, then upon such determination being made by the Board acting reasonably, such provision shall be deemed to be void *ab initio* and of no force and effect, and such provision shall be deemed to be struck from these Bylaws without further notice or approval by the Regular Members. Further, the Regular Members and the Board shall take such steps and grant such approvals as are necessary to ensure the Bylaws are formally amended, approved and filed with Corporate Registry to reflect same.



WATERSHED STEWARDSHIP GROUPS







WATERSHED MODELLING SYMPOSIUM

The **Watershed Modelling Symposium** was held by the NSR WaterSHED Steering Committee in July. The purpose of this symposium was to showcase the "State Of" various

modelling techniques in the NSR. This is part of an overall strategy to align and integrate water quality and hydrology modelling efforts for the NSR basin and develop a 5 year modelling strategy. Presentations are on the NSWA website.

LA FARGE KESTREL BANDING



Lafarge Canada has an active conservation program for various species at the Berrymore Pit located on the south banks of the North Saskatchewan River near Tomahawk. Kestrels are banded and monitored for health, and nest box cameras have provided a wealth of information on kestrel behavior. This photo shows the banding and monitoring of a male kestrel this spring. Observations are also made on saw-whet owls.

In addition to raptors, Lafarge also monitors amphibians and mammals on-site, using techniques such as game cameras, frog call surveys and tadpole counts. Several frog species and over 17 mammals such as coyotes, elk and moose have been documented. These observations, as well as the owl and kestrel monitoring efforts, provide valuable data on these species' population trends, migration and breeding patterns over time.


